I suppose that by
this time you have safely
reached & taken some stock
of your asylum in the
Adairmeadows. I have been
detained here, day after day,
but have a prospect of getting
off tomorrow night. You
are lucky to have escaped
the very hot weather of the
past few days & the
perhaps better of the home,
for there is as yet no appearance

of relief from the steamy
 atmosphere which would
 I am sure have been very
 trying to Eric. I hope that
 you will be able to look
 about a little & decide
 whether or not the place you
 love you to is the best.

I am somewhat doubtful
 about 'farms' for so much
 depends upon the kind of
 people they belong to & if
 there are other boarders,
 upon their character &
 habits. Again I should
 fear that you may be very
 isolated on a farm. If you

do not find everything
 satisfactory & the sanitary
 & food conditions good

I think you should make
 a change. The sum you
 mention as being charged
 seems to me to imply rather
 primitive accommodation.

The extra cost of a better
 place - should there be such
 - ought not to be seriously
 considered, as it is your
 present business to get the
 best conditions possible. If
 it will be a convenience to
