This is the most bewitching place, all the names are very familiar to me, & many of the ways, because mother so often referred to them. This may I had an interview with a fish-wife who climbed these long stairs to sell us two eel haddocks - I have received letters both from Clare & Kulla with good news, & only time is wanting to write you pages - It sh^d not be indignant at Mrs Bay about the names, she & I always look over the papers to get clear the difficulties, of the individual children, & the way in which their minds are maturing. It is not of much importance as to their places, but whether they really are

gaining, even we specially note
for being younger, it wd not do to
let her get muddled.

I am so glad that matter
looks better & I think R. must be
doing better. I was so pleased
with the photo of him & mother
& Margaret, so very nice, & it would
be quite a pleasure to her also
I got the draft for 20 £. I don't
exactly know what mother
wishes me to do with it but
will write. The weather is cold
& we have really only had hints
of sun ever since I landed.
Today for the first time in Edin. I
have seen specks of blue, & there is
an evident attempt of sun to break
forth. already the streets are flut-
tering with picnics, & bonfires
are built on all the hills =
