Dear Mr. Warrington

I have yr note of today & hasten answer it as I leave this p.m. for New York for the meeting of the Mining Engineers. I am sorry that you feel I did wrong in speaking as I did the other evening. I only echoed the sentiments of Mr. Shearer & Mr. Ross. The only members of the Society present. Ross & Shearer, the only members present, that I decided to put off the lecture. (Rev. Mr. Campbell came later) I have perhaps erred, as you suggest in my choice of a subject, but I thought a rehearsal of the history of the B. C. A.
