I have at length thoroughly examined all your recent Ostracoda, and have put them up in a parcel for transmission to you, but will wait until I hear your present address.

The specimens have given me a great deal of trouble on account of their puzzling relations to our well-known European species. I have embodied what I have to say about them in a short paper which I have sent to the "Annals of Natural History" and of which I shall have the pleasure of sending you a copy when printed. I have taken the liberty of retaining a few specimens of the new species as "types": - If one could have had a larger series of examples the work would have been much easier.
