CONSTITUTION.

(1) The name of this Society is the "Society of Alaskan Natural History and Ethnology."

(2) The purpose is to collect and preserve in connection with the Sitka Industrial Training School, specimens illustrative of the Natural History and Ethnology of Alaska, and publications relating thereto.

(3) The membership of the Society shall consist of the founders, the officers and teachers of the Sitka Industrial Training School, and such others as may from time to time be elected to membership. Non-residents of Alaska interested in the work of the Society and willing to contribute to its funds, may be elected Corresponding Members. Parties who have rendered distinguished service to Alaska may be elected Honorary Members.

(4) The affairs of the Society shall be administered by an Executive Committee of five, three of whom shall be officers or teachers in the Sitka Industrial Training School. The Superintendent of the Training School shall be ex-officio member of the Executive Committee. The elected members of the Committee shall serve for two years or until their successors are chosen.

(5) The Officers of the Society shall consist of a President and Secretary. The Secretary shall be ex-officio Treasurer.

(6) The Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority of those present, provided the proposed amendment does not remove the Society and its property out of the control of the Sitka Industrial School. By-laws shall be adopted from time to time by the Executive Committee for the carrying out of the purposes of the Society.

B Y - L A W S .

1.—The regular meetings of the Society shall be held on the second Monday in each month at 8 o'clock p. m.

2.—Special meetings may be called by the President, or in his absence, by the ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

3.—The names of all candidates for active membership shall be voted upon by ballot, and three Noes shall be sufficient to debar such a candidate from membership for a period of one year. All accepted Members shall sign the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association before they will be recognized as Members.

4.—The names of all candidates for Corresponding Membership shall be submitted at any regular meeting. A majority of the votes cast shall decide the question.

5.—There may be Active and Corresponding Members.

6.—The Active Members shall consist of those who originally formed the Association and all persons who hereafter may be admitted as Active Members. Corresponding Members shall be entitled to all privileges offered by the Association to its Active Members, except the right to vote.

7.—Any Member who shall act contrary to the dignity and decorum of the Association, shall make himself liable to be tried before a Council composed of the Executive Committee, upon charges signed by three Members of the Association and accepted at a regular meeting. And the Council shall have the power to cite before them the three Members who signed the charges, as witnesses, and shall upon due deliberation of the facts presented before them report their findings for final action to the first regular meeting.

8.—At all regular meetings of the Association the order of business shall be as follows:

Roll Call.

Reading of minutes of previous meeting.

Reports of Officers.

Reports of Special Committees.

Report of Finance Committee.

Motions relating to the welfare of the Association.

New business.

Nomination and election for membership.

Adjournment.

9.—Members shall have the right to introduce any lady or gentleman, a resident or non-resident of Sitka, at any regular meeting, but the person so introduced shall have no power to vote.

10.—Each Member shall be furnished by the Secretary with a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws.

11.—The Finance Committee shall raise funds for the use of this Organization in whatever manner they may deem proper. The funds so collected shall forthwith be turned over to the Treasurer.

12.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all moneys belonging to the Organization, and to pay out the same only upon warrants issued by the Executive Committee.

With these objects in view, the Institute invites your hearty cooperation and assistance in its work, and begs leave to direct your attention to the following, as being some of the reasons which it considers render the establishment and encouragement of such an institution, in this locality and at the present time, of no small importance:—

(1.) The District ~~of Saskatchewan~~, over which the Institute proposes to prosecute its investigations, covers an area of about 400,000 square miles.

(2.) The Town of Prince Albert is the farthest northern town in the Dominion of Canada, and is surrounded by remnants of powerful Indian tribes, who are changing their customs and habits under the influence of civilization, forgetting their legends and traditions, and neglecting the preservation of their mythology and folk-lore, and unless the present time be taken advantage of, much information valuable to science and literature will have been lost; and as many members of the Institute speaking the languages of these different tribes fluently are brought into daily contact with them, the Institute expects, through these members, to secure and preserve much of the foregoing before it is buried in oblivion.

(3) The Institute will also be a channel of communication through which a considerable quantity of information relative to the northern Indian tribes may be obtained, valuable to older societies of a similar character.

(4) The fact that many of the old settlers and natives of the country are rapidly passing away, from whom can be gathered instructive and interesting information concerning the early history of the country, and its settlement and development by the Hudson's Bay Company, makes it of vital importance that no time should be lost in collecting and reducing such information to writing.

(5.) The natural history and resources of this section of the Territories are practically unknown and untouched and offer a large field of work for the Institute.

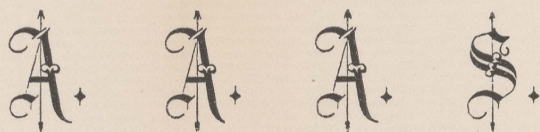

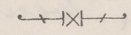

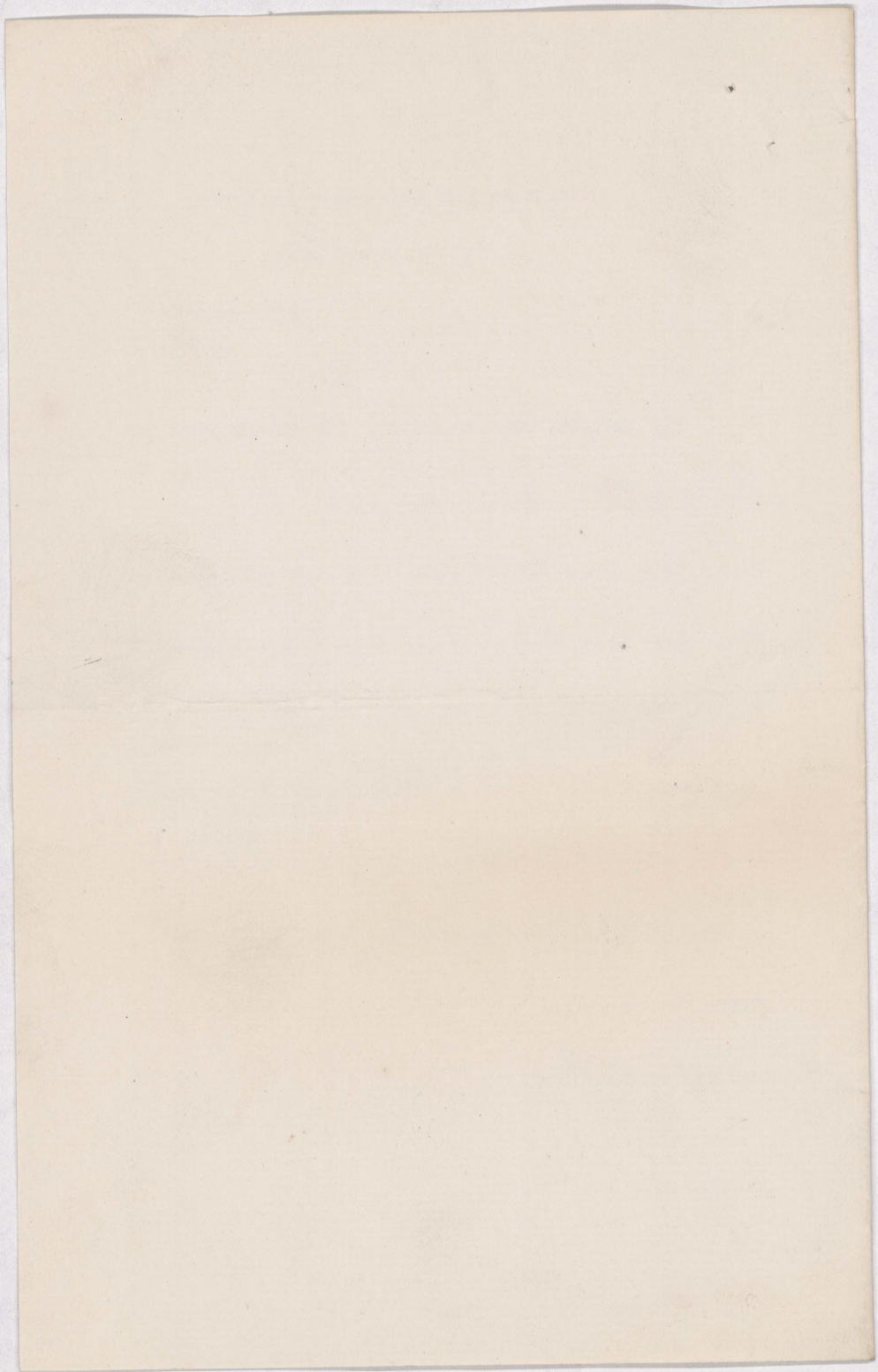

AS TO ELECTION, SUBSCRIPTIONS AND PRIVILEGES
OF FELLOWS.

IMPERIAL INSTITUTE OF THE UNITED KINGDOM, THE COLONIES AND INDIA.

ELECTION, SUBSCRIPTIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF FELLOWS.

I. AS TO PRIVILEGES OF FELLOWS.

Every Fellow elected in the manner provided by the Regulations approved under the Charter of Incorporation, shall, during the continuance of his Fellowship, be entitled to attach to his name the distinctive designation "F. I. Inst."

Every Fellow, upon his election, shall receive a diploma, or other emblem of his Fellowship.

Fellows shall be entitled to the Annual Report of the Institute, and to Publications issued from time to time by the Institute, subject to such arrangements as may be made by the Executive Council as to the delivery or transmission of the same.

Fellows shall have access to the Commercial and Industrial Collections on two days in the week when they are *not* open to the public, and shall on any one of those days have the privilege of introducing two Visitors to the Collections.

A special Refreshment Department, including Smoking Room, will be provided for the use of Fellows, to which they will be entitled, on any day, to introduce two Visitors.

The accommodation provided for the use of Fellows will include a Post Office and *Poste Restante*, Telegraph, Telephone and Messenger Departments, Cloak Room and Parcels Office, and Private Lavatory.

Fellows will have the free use of the Library, the News Room and Reference Department connected therewith, the Map Room, Reading Rooms, Writing Room and Conference Rooms, and shall be entitled to introduce one Visitor on any day to those rooms. The Conference Rooms will include Special Rooms for the Australasian, the North American and the African Colonies, for India, and for the Crown-Colonies. Facilities will be afforded to Fellows, at moderate charges, for holding business Conferences at the Institute, involving the exclusive occupation of a room for specified periods, with or without clerical assistance.

Fellows will be entitled to admission to special conferences, addresses, discussions, or lectures, under regulations to be determined upon by the Council, and will have the privilege of introducing visitors, in conformity with those regulations.

The Commercial Intelligence or Information Department will be open to Fellows between the hours of 10 a.m. and 1 p.m.; and 2 p.m. and 4 p.m., on Mondays to Fridays inclusive; and between 10 a.m. and noon on Saturdays.

Facilities will be afforded to Fellows to inspect or to specially examine, or to be supplied with, samples of materials and products included in the collections, under regulations and conditions to be determined by the Council, and, if necessary, upon payment of such fees as will compensate the Institute for any loss or special outlay connected with such inspection, for which special localities and appliances will be provided.

II. AS TO PROPOSAL AND ELECTION OF FELLOWS.

(Abstract of Regulations.)

A Candidate for admission as an Ordinary Fellow, must be proposed and seconded by two Fellows from personal knowledge; such proposal, which shall specify the rank, profession, or occupation, and place of abode of the Candidate, must, in addition, be signed by two Fellows at least.

The certificate of proposal thus filled up, as soon as it has been delivered to the Secretary, shall be exhibited in a conspicuous place in one or other of the public rooms of the Institute for at least one week previous to the date of election.

Candidates proposed as Fellows shall, from time to time, be submitted for election at a meeting of the Executive Council, in accordance with the prescribed Regulations.

III. AS TO SUBSCRIPTIONS TO BE PAID BY FELLOWS.

(Abstract of Regulations.)

The annual subscription to the Institute shall, subject to the provisions contained in the regulations next following, be *Two Pounds*. From and after such date as may be appointed by the Executive Council, an Entrance Fee may be imposed.

Any Fellow who intends to be absent from the United Kingdom during the whole time for which the Annual Subscription is payable, shall, on his giving due notice in writing to the Secretary of such intention, pay an Annual Subscription of *One Pound* only, during the continuance of such absence. If such Fellow returns to the United Kingdom, he may, on communicating the fact in writing to the Secretary, and on paying such sum as may be required to make up his subscription for the current year to the full amount of *Two Pounds*, be re-admitted to all the privileges of the Institute.

Any Fellow who, at the time of his election, is resident out of the United Kingdom, shall pay an Annual Subscription of *One Pound* only, during the continuance of such residence. If such Fellow comes to the United Kingdom, he may, on communicating the fact in writing to the Secretary, avail himself, for a period not exceeding three months from the date of his arrival, of all the privileges of the Institute. If he resides within the United Kingdom beyond that period, he will be required to make up his subscription for the current year to the full amount of *Two Pounds*.

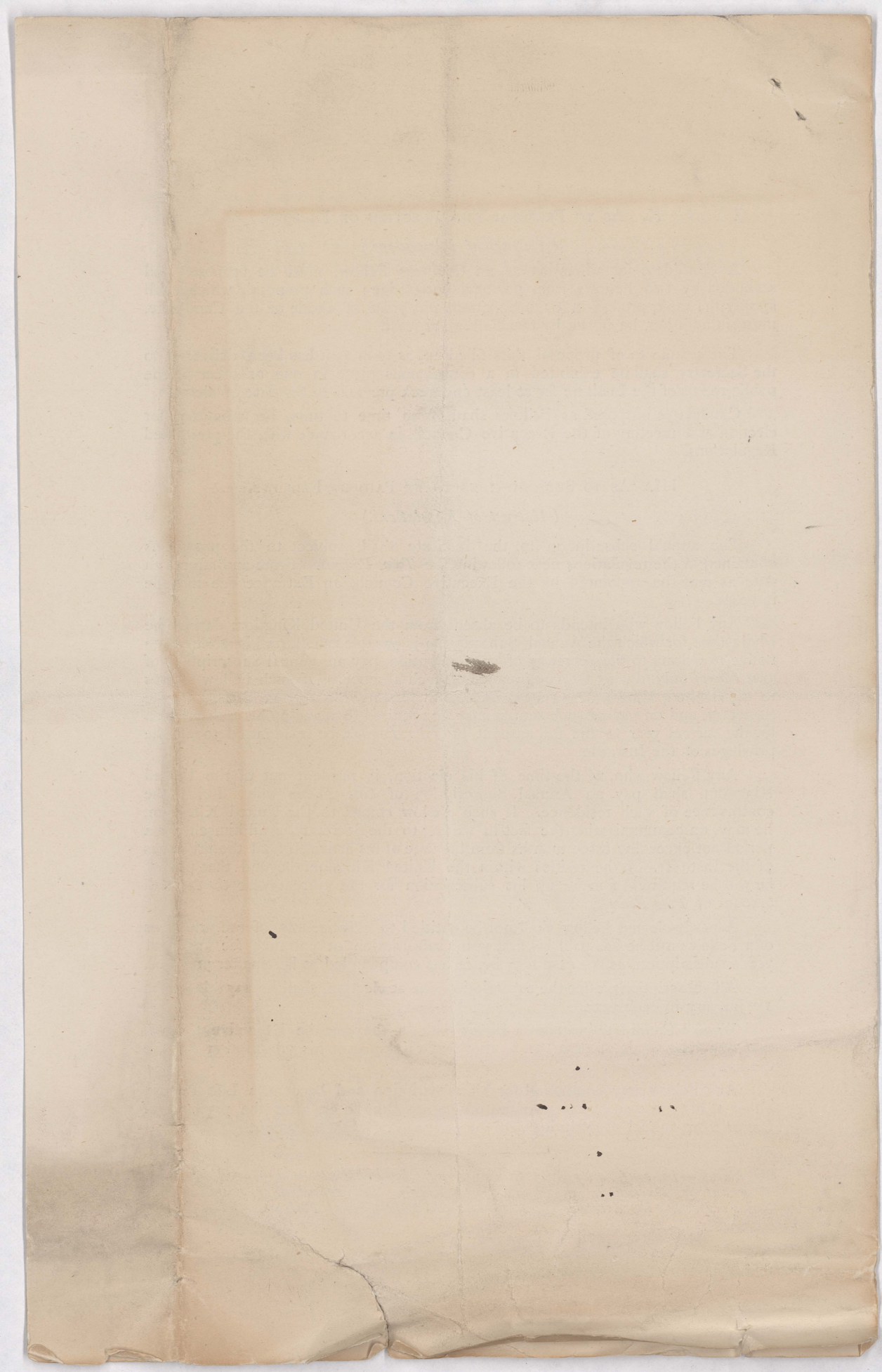
A newly-elected Fellow shall not be entitled to exercise any of the privileges of a Fellow until he has paid his first year's subscription, or entrance fee and first year's subscription, as the case may be, or has compounded as hereinafter provided.

All subscriptions, after the subscription due at election, shall be payable on the 1st January in each year.

When a Candidate becomes a Fellow late in the year the Executive Council may remit the whole or such part as they may think just of his subscription for the current year.

Any Fellow may compound for his subscription and become a Life Fellow, either at his entrance by the payment of *Twenty Pounds*, or, after the payment of five or more annual subscriptions, by the payment of *Fifteen Pounds*.

NOTE.—In conformity with Clause 67 of the Constitution approved by Royal Warrant, the Executive Council may, from time to time, repeal, alter, or add to these Rules respecting the Election, Subscriptions and Privileges of Fellows.



THE ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF LONDON.

THIS Society was instituted in 1826, under the auspices of Sir HUMPHREY DAVY, Bart., Sir STAMFORD RAFFLES, and other eminent individuals, for the advancement of Zoology and Animal Physiology, and for the introduction of new and curious subjects of the Animal Kingdom, and was incorporated by Royal Charter in 1829.

During the period which has elapsed since the opening of the Gardens in the Regent's Park in 1828, a very large number of species of MAMMALS, BIRDS and REPTILES has been obtained, detailed lists of which will be found in the published Catalogues of the Collection. To these were added, in 1849, collections of FISHES and of the LOWER AQUATIC ANIMALS, both marine and freshwater, and in 1881 a House for the breeding and exhibition of Insects and other Articulata.

The Society consists of Fellows, and Honorary, Foreign and Corresponding Members, elected according to the Bye-Laws.

The Gardens in the Regent's Park are open from Nine o'clock a.m., till Sunset; and the Offices and Library (3, Hanover Square, W.), where all communications should be addressed, from Ten till Five, except on Saturdays, when they close at Two o'clock p.m.

The Meetings of the Society for General Business are held at the Office on the Thursday following the third Wednesday in every month of the year, except in September and October, at Four p.m.

The Meetings for Scientific Business are held at the Office twice a month, except in July, August, September and October, at half-past Eight o'clock p.m.

The Anniversary Meeting is held on the 29th April, at Four p.m.

THE ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF LONDON.

TERMS FOR THE ADMISSION OF FELLOWS.

FELLOWS pay an Admission Fee of £5, and an annual Contribution of £3, due on the 1st of January, and payable in advance, or a Composition of £30 in lieu thereof; the whole payment, including the Admission Fee, being £35.

FELLOWS elected after the 30th of September are not liable for the Subscriptions for the year in which they are elected.

PRIVILEGES OF FELLOWS.

FELLOWS have Personal Admission to the Gardens with Two Companions daily, upon signing their names in the book at the entrance gate.

FELLOWS of the Society receive a Book of Saturday, and a Book of Sunday Orders. These Orders admit *two* persons to the Gardens on each Saturday and *two* on each Sunday in the year. But the Saturday Orders are *not* available if the FELLOW uses his privilege of *personally* introducing two companions on the *same* day.

FELLOWS, if they wish it, can exchange the Book of Saturday Orders for Twenty Tickets, available for any day *during* the year of issue. The Book of Sunday Orders can also be exchanged for a similar packet of Twenty Tickets. These Tickets will admit only one person, whether child or adult.

FELLOWS also receive Twenty Free Tickets (Green), each valid for the admission of one adult any day of the week, including Sunday. Children's Tickets (Buff) can be had in lieu of Green Tickets in the proportion of two Children's Tickets to one Adult's. These Tickets, if not made use of in the year of issue, are available for following years.

The Books of Orders and the Free Tickets are sent to all FELLOWS who shall have given a General Order for their delivery on the 1st of January in every year, at any specified address. Forms for this purpose are supplied on application.

The WIFE of a FELLOW can exercise all these privileges in his absence.

FELLOWS have the privilege of receiving a complete set of the Society's Publications on payment of the additional Subscription of One Guinea every year. This Subscription is due upon the 1st of January and must be paid before the day of the Anniversary Meeting, after which the privilege lapses. FELLOWS are likewise entitled to purchase the Transactions and other Publications of the Society at 25 per cent. less than the price charged to the public. A further reduction of 25 per cent. is also made upon all purchases of Publications issued prior to 1871, if above the value of Five pounds.

FELLOWS also have the privilege of subscribing to the Annual Volume of the Zoological Record for a sum of £1, payable on the 1st July in each year, but this privilege only holds good if the subscription is paid before the 1st of December following.

FELLOWS may obtain, on the payment of One Guinea annually, an IVORY TICKET, which will admit a named person of their immediate family, resident in the same house with them, to the Gardens with One Companion daily.

They may also obtain a TRANSFERABLE IVORY TICKET admitting Two Persons, available throughout the whole period of Fellowship, on payment of Ten Pounds in one sum. A second similar ticket may be obtained on payment of a further sum of Twenty Pounds.

Any FELLOW who intends to be absent from the United Kingdom during the space of one year or more, may, upon giving to the Secretary notice in *writing*, have his name placed upon the "dormant list," and will be thereupon exempt from the payment of his annual contribution during such absence.

Any FELLOW, having paid all fees due to the Society, is at liberty to withdraw his name upon giving notice in *writing* to the Secretary.

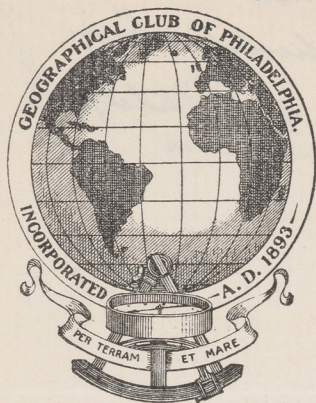

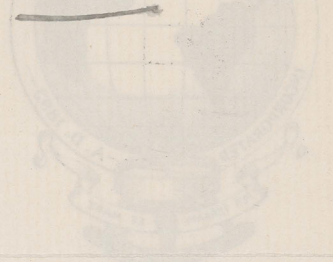

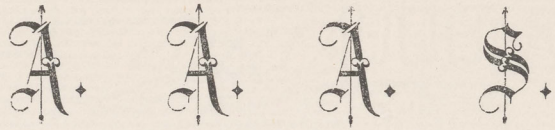
