DEAR SIR,

At the request of the Natural History Society of this city, the ROYAL SOCIETY OF CANADA, whose meetings have heretofore been held only in the Capital of the Dominion, has consented to hold its annual meeting in Montreal, beginning on the twenty-seventh day of May, 1891.

For the purpose of extending to the Royal Society that welcome and hospitality which its importance deserves, a Council of Citizens, under the presidency of Sir Donald A. Smith, K.C.M.G., M.P., and several special committees, were formed. We have the honor, in the name of the Council, to solicit your interest in the auspicious occasion, which shall attract to our city, not only many learned and thoughtful men of our own Dominion, but also some of the most distinguished men in Science and Letters from the British Isles, France, Belgium and the United States.

As the financial requirements for the successful and honorable carrying out of all matters in connection with this great and influential gathering, which, we doubt not, shall be of great practical good to our city, by considering the extent and development of natural resources, must be very great, we desire to ask your monetary assistance by any of the following ways:—

First.—By an absolute subscription,

Second.—By subscribing to a guarantee fund, 25 p. c. of which, as occasion requires, may be called for to defray expenses,

Third.—By becoming an Associate Member of the Society for the year,—Gentlemen's tickets \$3.00, Ladies' tickets \$2.00. Each ticket to admit the holder to all the meetings and entertainments, private and public.

We shall require at least a sum of \$10,000, and while relying upon a gratuity from the City Council, we shall, nevertheless, have to depend for a considerable share of this on the generous subscriptions of the notably liberal citizens of Montreal.

A neat and comprehensive pamphlet has been carefully prepared for the use of Members and Associates of the Society and all visitors to the city. It contains the history of the Society from its formation by His Excellency the Marquis of Lorne, and brief historic accounts of Montreal and surroundings, also a synopsis of the entertainments prepared for the occasion.
