

FRENCH PROTESTANT CHURCH AND MISSION BUILDINGS, MONTREAL.

The Committee of the French Canadian Missionary Society earnestly appeal for aid to erect a Church and Mission Buildings in this city. For many years the Congregation at this station has felt the great need of a place of worship, and the Committee in their Annual Reports have urged its erection. The way seeming now open, a suitable lot has been secured, at the corner of Craig and St. Elizabeth Streets, at the east end of the Champ de Mars, on which it is proposed to erect :

1. A Church of stone, containing 450 sittings, with a lofty basement for School and Lecture Room.

2. Adjoining, on Craig Street, of cut stone, a Book Depot, Library, and Reading Room, with accommodation above for the school teacher.

3. On St. Elizabeth Street, of brick, a house for the pastor, sufficient accommodation being provided for such students as may be trained for the ministry.

The whole cost of these buildings, from actual tender, and the ground will



be \$15,000 of which \$5,000 is already provided for by sale of the rear portion of the farm at Pointe aux Trembles and from other sources ; leaving \$10,000 to be raised.

The property will be held by Trustees, under a Deed approved of by the Committee, the provisions of which will be in accordance with the doctrines set forth in the Society's Constitution.

The Committee do not consider it requisite to make any lengthened statement regarding the importance and necessity of this object, these will be at once recognised by the friends of the Mission.

It is hoped that this appeal will receive a liberal response, more especially when it is considered that so many and costly edifices are being erected among us by the Church of Rome, for the purpose of maintaining their sway over the minds of the people of this City and Province.

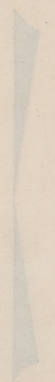

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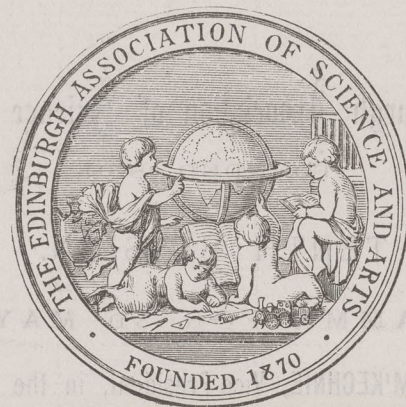
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Edinburgh Association of Science and Arts.

Article from "The Vancouver Province".

Feb. 12 1938.

On one of the visits of the late Dr. George W. Dawson, Canada's most noted geologist, to British Columbia fifty years ago, his survey of nature's handiwork took him to the Stump Lake area, lying between Merritt and Kamloops.

He reported exhaustively on that section of the province which he called the "Interior Plateau" and named a portion of it Mineral Hill. His conclusions have been upheld by subsequent development of the principal metalized veins in the area.

There have recently come to light the original capital ores collected by Dr. Dawson. Mining men generally and geologists particularly are keenly interested in this collection, each sample being described and numbered in the handwriting of the man whom the world recognizes as one of the outstanding geologists of all time.

During his investigation in this province, Dr. Dawson was the guest of Dr. William Fraser Tolmie, who also was keenly interested in geology, natural history and botany, at the latter's home, Cloverdale Farm, near Victoria, where three generations of Tolmies have lived. In fact, one of Dr. W. F. Tolmie's sons, Henry Work Tolmie, now in his eighty-first year, worked with Dr. Dawson on his geological survey in the field. "Buckshot" Tolmie, as he is known, is still hale and hearty.

Returning from his work in the Stump Lake section, Dr. Dawson presented his friend, Dr. Tolmie, with several specimens of the ore from Mineral Hill, where in the '70's it is said fifteen hundred men were prospecting until a placer strike on Granite Creek, Similkameen district, turned them in that direction.

The specimens were placed carefully by Dr. Tolmie in a little box that he had brought around the Horn when he came to this part of the world in 1832 as medical doctor and chief factor of Fort Nisqually, a Hudson's Bay post in what is now southern Washington at that time British territory prior to establishment of the forty-ninth parallel as the boundary. He settled at Cloverdale Farm in 1858.

Following the death of Dr. Simon Fraser Tolmie, a former British Columbia premier, and son of the pioneer Hudson's Bay factor, many prized relics were obtained by collectors some time ago when an auction was held at the old Tolmie farm.

The historical box of mineral specimens had been handed on from the founder of the family here to Dr. Tolmie and from him to his son who carries the name of his distinguished grandfather and resides in Vancouver.
