Legal Weights and Measures of Canada

The legal weights and measures of Canada are the Imperial yard, Imperial pound avoirdupois, Imperial gallon, and the Imperial bushel.

By Act of Parliament and Amendments, it is provided: That in contracts for sale and delivery of any of the undermentioned articles, the bushel should be determined by weighing, unless a bushel measure be specially agreed upon, the weight equivalent to a bushel being as follows:

Wheat, 60 lbs. Indian Corn, 56 lbs. Rye, 56 lbs. Pease, 60 lbs. Barley, 48 lbs. Malt, 35 lbs. Oats, 34 lbs. Beans, 60 lbs. Flax Seed, 56 lbs. Hemp, 44 lbs. Blue Grass Seed, 14 lbs. Lime, 80 lbs. Castor Beans, 40 lbs. Potatoes, 60 lbs. Turnips, 60 lbs. Carrots, 60 lbs. Parsnips, 60 lbs. Beets, 60 lbs. Onions, 50 lbs. Bituminous coal, 70 lbs. Clover Seed, 60 lbs. Timothy, 48 lbs. Buckwheat, 48 lbs.

By the same Act the British hundred-weight of 112 pounds and the ton of 2,240 pounds were abolished, and the hundred-weight was declared to be 100 pounds, and the ton 2,000 pounds, avoirdupois, thus making uniform the weights of Canada and the United States.

TERMS AND SITTINGS OF COURTS
Supreme Court of Canada

sits at Ottawa on third Tuesday in February, first Tuesday in May, first Tuesday in October.

The Exchequer Court of Canada, sits at such places and times as the Court may appoint.

The Court of Appeal for Ontario Sits at Toronto at such time as the Court may appoint.

The High Court of Justice.

The Divisional Court sits on the first Monday in each month. The Divisional Court and Court of Appeal do not sit on Saturdays.

A single Judge sits as and for the Court at Osgoode Hall, on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday in each week, and in chambers on Tuesday and Friday of each week. Sittings for trials with and without juries are held in Toronto and in the county towns at such times as are appointed by the High Court.

Long Vacation, both in the High Court of Justice, and the Court of Appeal, consists of the months of July and August.

A Judge of the High Court will sit in Toronto during the long vacation to hear such applications as may require to be promptly heard.

Christmas Vacation—from 24th December to 6th of January, both days inclusive.

County Court.

OUTSIDE THE COUNTY OF YORK.

Sittings for trial are held with a jury, commencing on the second Tuesday in June and December; and without a jury commencing on first Tuesday in April and October. County Court Sittings in Banc—four—to commence second Monday in January and first Monday in April, July and October, ending on Saturday of the same week.

IN THE COUNTY OF YORK.

Sittings for trial with and without a jury, are held commencing the first Tuesday in March and December, and second Tuesday in May and September, and three Non-Jury Sittings in addition to above to commence on the first Monday in February, the second Monday in April and the third Monday in October.

County Court sittings in Banc—four—to commence on second Monday in January, June and October and the first Monday in April, ending on Saturday of the same week.

County Court Judges may sit and act at any time for the transaction of business.

Surrogate Terms

commence on the second Monday in January, and on the first Monday in April, July and October, and end on Saturday of the same week, except in York, where terms commence second Monday in January, June and October, and first Monday in April, and end on Saturday of the same week.

General Sessions of the Peace.

Sittings to be held, except in County of York, semi-annually, commencing on the second Tuesday in the months of June and December, subject to Sec. 21 of Local Courts Act.

In the County of York the said Courts are held four times in the year, commencing on the first Tuesday in the months of December and March, and on the second Tuesday of the months of May and September.

The County Court Judges' Criminal Court sits out of Sessions, without a Jury, for trial of prisoners. In York this Court usually sits every Wednesday.

Division Courts

are held in each Division once in every two months or oftener, in the discretion of the Judge, at times and places appointed from time to time, except in Toronto, where in the two divisions, weekly sittings of the Court are held, except in August; 10th Division Court Thursday, and 1st Division Court Tuesday.

In each of the Toronto divisions, Judgment Summons Court is held every fourth Monday; 1st Division Court at 10 a.m., and 10th at 2 p.m.

In Toronto Jury cases may be tried in February, May, September and December. Judges' Chambers are held every Monday at 10.30 a.m.

Valuable Information for Business Men

NOTES.

DEMAND NOTES are payable on presentation without grace, and bear legal interest, after a demand has been made, if not so written. An endorser on a demand note is holden only for a limited time.

A **NEGOTIABLE NOTE** must be made payable either to bearer, or be properly endorsed by the person to whose order it is made. If the endorser wishes to avoid responsibility, he can endorse "without recourse."

A **JOINT NOTE** is one signed by two or more persons, who each becomes liable for the whole amount.

THREE DAYS' GRACE are allowed on all time notes, after the time for payment expires; if not then paid, the endorser, if any, should be legally notified to be holden.

NOTES FALLING DUE ON SUNDAY, or on a legal holiday, are paid the day following, except when holiday falls on Sunday when they are payable on the Tuesday following.

ALTERING A NOTE in any manner by the holder makes it void.

NOTES GIVEN BY MINORS are void.

THE MAKER of a note that is lost or stolen is not released from payment if the amount and consideration can be proven, but he is entitled to indemnity against the lost note.

AN ENDORSER has a right of action against all whose names were previously on a note endorsed by him.

STANDARD TIME.

Standard Time is used throughout Canada. It is divided into five divisions, each division being one hour earlier the further west it is.

POSTAL RATES

LETTERS.

Register all valuable letters. Letters addressed to places in Canada and United States, including Porto Rico, Hawaii, Guam and Philippine Islands and Mexico, 2 cents per ounce or fraction thereof. Letters to places in United Kingdom, Newfoundland and British Possessions and Protectorates are 2 cents for each ounce, or fraction thereof. Letters to other places in Postal Union countries, 5 cts. for each oz., and 3 cents for each additional oz. or fraction thereof.

On "Drop" letters, whether posted in the city or at a suburban office, addressed to any point within letter carriers' delivery, the rate is 2 cents per oz.

The postage on letters for suburban offices is 2 cents per oz.; from suburban offices to city, 2 cents.

Drop letters posted at any suburban office for delivery therefrom, 1 cent per oz., except where free delivery by letter carrier has been established, when the rate is 2 cents per oz.—Toronto Junction, which includes Carlton West and Davenport, Wychwood Park, Bracondale, Todmorden, Doncaster, East Toronto, and Balm Beach.

Letters posted at any suburban office for another suburban office are not considered drop letters; the postage on such letters is 2 cents per oz

POSTAL CARDS.

Canada, United States and Mexico, 1 cent; United Kingdom, Newfoundland and all countries in Postal Union, 2 cents.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Re-directed letters are not liable to any additional postage if handed back to the Post Office with a changed address at the moment of delivery or as soon as possible thereafter, provided always the change in the address does not require the letter to be sent to any place to which the postage rate is higher than was at first payable. In this case the additional postage, if not prepaid, will be collected on delivery.

Re-directed letters should not be dropped into a Post Office box or receiver unless additional postage has been put on to carry them to their second destination.

REGISTRATION.

Money letters should always be registered. Every article intended for registration must be handed in at the wicket, and a receipt obtained therefor.

The fee on all classes of articles addressed to countries to which matter may be registered is five cents.

The sender of a registered article addressed to any Postal Union country may entitle himself to a certificate as to the disposal of the said article by the Postmaster at the office addressed on prepayment of an additional fee of five cents. All classes of matter may be registered to all destinations in Canada and throughout the Postal Union, except Parcel Post; and letters may be registered to most of the countries not included in the Union.

The public are reminded that registered letters are only carried on trains that are accompanied by railway mail clerk. Hence a registered letter and an ordinary letter posted simultaneously will often be received at different times.

Second Class Matter.

NEWSPAPERS FROM OFFICE OF PUBLICATION.

Newspapers and periodicals posted from office of publication are permitted to pass at the bulk rate of ¼ of a cent per lb. within 300 mile zone with the exception of cities in the zone when rate is ½ a cent per pound. Rate to regular subscribers outside of zone in Canada, Mexico, Newfoundland, United Kingdom, and several other British

States. Sealed tins containing fish, lobster, vegetables, meats, &c., if put up in a solid manner and labeled in such a way as to fully indicate the nature of their contents, may be sent as fourth class matter within the Dominion, but no sealed matter can be forwarded to the United States under this head. Liquids, oils and fatty substances may be sent to places in Canada and the United States as fourth class, if securely put up.

PATTERNS AND SAMPLES.

Bona fide Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, not exceeding 3 pounds in weight, and not of salable value, may be sent to any place in Canada at 1 cent per 2 oz. or fraction thereof. Must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, *not being actually Patterns or Samples*, are not admissible. Limit of size, 30 in. in length by 1 ft. in width or depth.

An exception is made in favor of newspapers and periodicals published more frequently than once per week and addressed to regular subscribers to post offices situated within a circular area of 40 miles in diameter, the centre of which must either be the place of publication or some point not more than 20 miles distant therefrom. Such papers will continue to enjoy exemption from postage as heretofore.

The postage on newspapers and periodicals issued less frequently than once a month, and addressed to regular subscribers or news agents, and on all specimen newspapers, is 1c. per lb. or fraction of a lb. British and other foreign newspapers or periodicals, other than those published in the United States, as well as Canadian publications, recognized as Second Class Matter, may be posted by newsgalers for transmission by mail to subscribers in Canada at the bulk rate of 1 cent per pound.

NEWSPAPERS, PERIODICALS, &c.

Transient Newspapers for any place in Canada, Newfoundland or United States, 1 cent per 4 ozs.; but a paper not more than 1 oz. will go for 1/2 cent. Local newspapers and periodicals not weighing more than 1 oz. for delivery in city, 1/2 cent each.

Other printed matter to Newfoundland, all British possessions and countries in Postal Union, and not in Union, 1 cent per 2 oz. Transient Newspapers (Canadian origin), for certain British possessions, United Kingdom, 1 cent per 4 oz.

Third Class Matter.—BOOKS AND PRINTED MATTER.

On books (printed), Pamphlets, Circulars printed or produced by a multiplying process), Catalogues, Prices Current (printed), Hand-Bills, and other matter wholly printed or lithographed, such as Calendars, Show Cards, etc., addressed to Canada, the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain and all other countries, the rate is 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof. The limit of weight for Canada is 5 lbs., but for a single book 10 lbs. The limit of weight for United States and Mexico 4 lb. 6 ozs., and United Kingdom is 5 lbs. For other Postal Union Countries, 4 lbs. No packet of printed matter addressed to Canada may exceed 30 inches in length or 12 inches in width or depth, nor may the combined length and girth of any packet exceed 6 ft. When addressed to other countries the limit of size is 2 ft. in length by 1 ft. in width or depth, unless in the form of a roll, when 30 inches is allowed.

LEGAL DOCUMENTS AND COMMERCIAL PAPERS.

Legal Documents and Commercial Papers and all other matter either wholly or partly in writing (except the matter specially mentioned under Third Class) are liable to letter rate of postage, 2 cts. per oz., when posted for delivery in Canada.

These papers may be sent to Great Britain, Newfoundland, United States, and all Foreign countries at 5 cents for the first 10 ounces and 1 cent for each additional 2 ounces. Must be sent in covers open at the end, so as to be easy of examination.

Printed stationery, photographs, maps, proofs, drawings, engravings, music, to Canada, United States, Great Britain and Europe, 1 cent for 2 ozs. Circulars type-written are liable to letter rate.

Fourth Class Matter.—MERCHANDISE, ETC.

comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage. When addressed to places in Canada, the postage is 1 cent per oz. or fraction thereof. Limit of weight, 5 lbs.; of size, 30 inches in length by one foot in width or depth, but the combined length and girth of any packet must in no case exceed 6 feet. Matter claiming to be fourth class must be open to inspection and there must be no correspondence enclosed (except invoices and accounts of the articles enclosed). Packages of fourth class matter may be sent to the United States, including Porto Rico, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, and the Panama Canal zone, if prepaid 1 cent per oz., but the contents will be

POSTAL NOTES.

The Postal Note System established by the Post Office Department affords a cheap and convenient means for remitting small sums.

Are sold and paid at more than 7,000 Post Offices in Canada. May be bought as quickly as stamps. May be bought during all post office hours. Can be crossed to insure safety.

Odd cents may be made up by affixing Canadian Postage stamps not exceeding 9c. in value to the face of a Postal Note, if the same is for remittance to a place in Canada.

Additional postage stamps must not be attached to note by office. Canadian Postal Notes can be made payable at any Post Office in the United States transacting Money Order business. If the payee resides in a city the Notes must be drawn on the main city office, not on a sub-office or station.

Postage stamps must not be affixed to Postal Notes drawn for payment in the United States.

Canadian Postal Notes are payable only in Canada and United States.

TWO CENT STAMP BOOKS.

For public convenience the Post Office Department is furnishing the two cent denomination of Postage Stamps in small bound books of 12 stamps of postage value 24 cents, the pages of which are interleaved with waxed paper to prevent premature adhesion. They are sold at an advance of 1 cent on the stamp value to cover cost of manufacture, and may be obtained at any of the Branch Offices, and from the Licensed Vendors. **POST BANDS AND STAMPED ENVELOPES.**

One cent post bands for newspaper or book packet wrappers, and one and two cent stamped envelopes are issued by the Department; also two cent perforated letter cards.

UNUSED POSTAGE STAMPS.

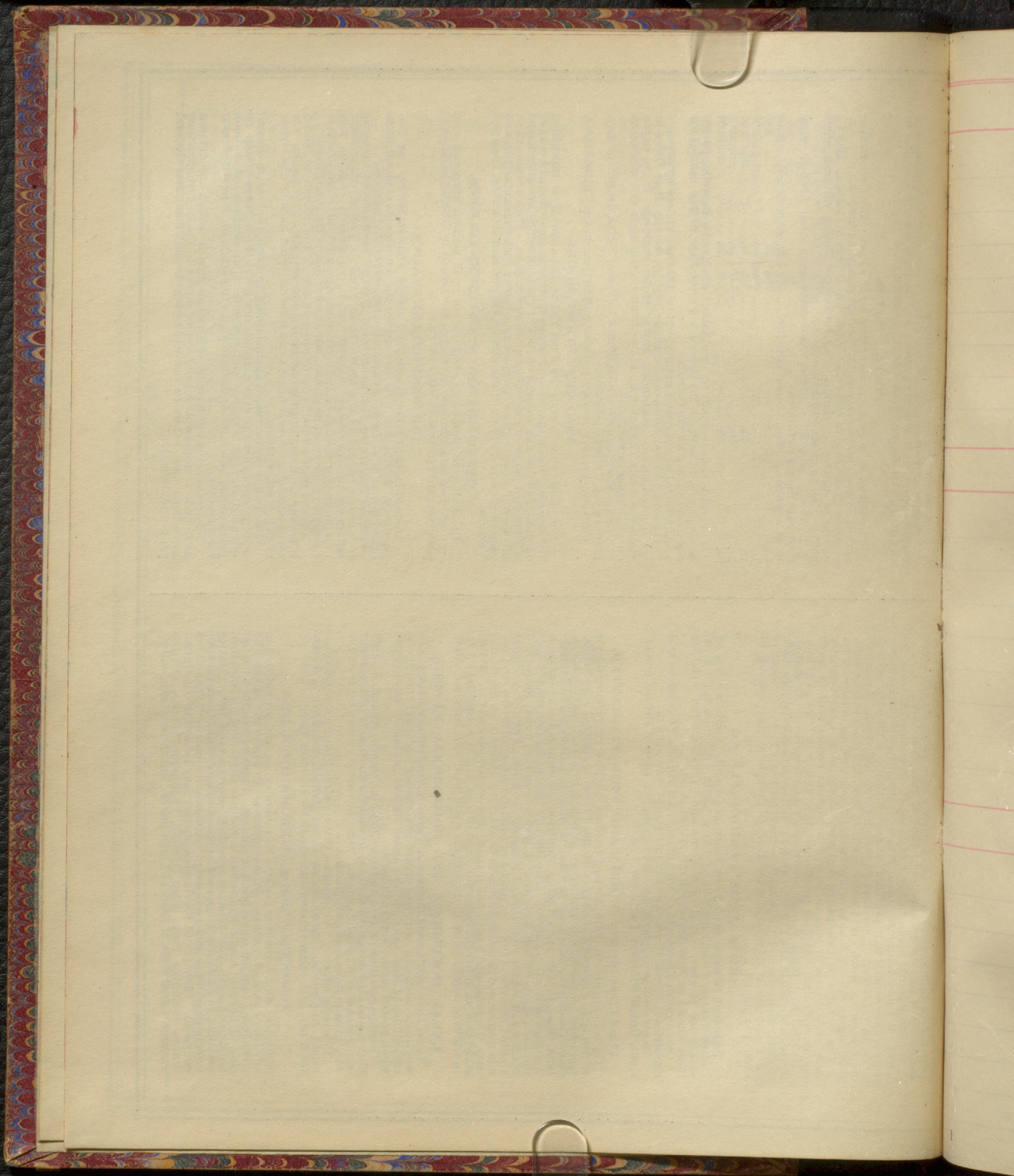
Unused Postage Stamps, being no longer redeemable by the Department, should not now be used for the remittances of small sums of money. Postal notes have been introduced for that purpose.

All Newspapers, Books, Printed Matter, Samples and Patterns to be sent by any of the above Mails must be posted half an hour before the time of closing. Letters can be re-directed without any new charge for postage to and from countries in Postal Union. Letters for registration must be posted half an hour before the mail closes.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer or to any other person.

The public are cautioned against doing up book packets in Envelopes notched at the ends or corners; nor must the postage stamp be attached to both wrapper and contents. The contents of a book packet must be so tied or fastened up as to permit of being withdrawn for inspection.

Letters bearing mutilated stamps, or stamps so soiled and defaced as to make it impossible for the sorting clerks to decide whether they have been used before or not will be sent to the Postmaster General for his adjudication.
