Report of Regimental Committee for the period 31st March 1945 to 31st March 1946 - combining also Report on Training for the same period.

This report embraces the fiscal year rather than the calendar year as heretofore, since it will probably be the last report of the present Committee, in view of the change of command.

As no visit had been made to Pointe Platon in 1944, and in view of the fact that the present officers would not have another opportunity, it was decided to make every effort to hold the usual Pointe Platon week-end in August 1945. No serious military scheme was attempted in connection with this week-end, unless the 'Golf Tournament' held on the Island of Orleans could be considered under that heading.

A number of ex-officers were invited and took part in the visit, and the Contingent had the opportunity of entertaining Capt. and Mrs. A.J. delotbiniere and their family at the Chateau Frontenac before proceeding to Pointe Platon. It was most unfortunate that the visit was undoubtedly spoiled to some extent for the C.O., owing to illness, as result of which he had to go to hospital on his return to Montreal.

The C.O. was laid up and on sick leave for a consierable time, from August into October. As a result, Major Greenwood attended the Annual Meeting of the C.O.T.C.s at Ottawa, about which a full report was submitted. The main business of the meeting was to inform the C.O.T.C.s submitted. This dinner was attended by something like 175 all told, about 100 of which were officers and ex-officers of the Contingent. The band of the Grenadier Guards was in attendance as well as the Pipers of the Contingent. It was hoped that the Hon.D.C. Abbott would have been present, but at the last minute he was unable to attend. Guests of honour were -

and a number of Officers commanding Reserve Units in M. D. No.4, etc.

During the course of the evening a small presentation was made by the officers of the Contingent to the C.O. on his retirement.

The financial statements will be presented in due course so that there is no necessity to go into them further at this time, but mention might be made of the fact that, in addition to the arrangements contemplated for disposal of the Contingent's surplus (and reported on at the last Annual Meeting), in conjunction with the students a certain portion of the pay due to them for local Headquarters was ear-marked for contribution to the McGill war Memorial Campaign.

TRAINING:

In continuation of the report of the Chief Instructor made at the last meeting, the 38 Cadets who had failed in the special paper set (to which he refers) were reported to the J.S.U.T.C., and it was finally decided that they should be warned that they could not report to the University for the next academic session, but could present themselves again for consideration at the following session, if they so desired. In this connection the names of a number of Cadets, who failed to report for Camp No.6, were also reported to the J.S.U.T.C., who decided that the same action should be taken in their case. This action, however, was rescinded by the Senate, except in the case of the Cadets who failed to report for No.6 Camp. Those who had failed in the examinations were allowed to return to the University in the Autumn of 1945 but warned that they would not be allowed any supplementary examination in the event of failure.

During the course of No.1 Camp at Petawawa, V. E. Day took place and the Cadets missed a day's training as a result, since they were given a holiday (although confined to Camp).

The training at Petawawa was practically the same as had been carried out the previous year. A suggestion had been made that a little more advanced training should be given, but the Commandant informed us that there were not sufficient instructors available to do this. At the same time, the Cadets attending the Camp were introduced to various types of engineering equipment, and for those attending the Camp for the first time, it was undoubtedly very instructive.

The Camp at Vimy was a very small one and consisted of those Cadets who had received Signal training under Capt. Warner during the Winter months.

The Sherbrooke Camps were perhaps the most enjoyable in view of the fact that it being a Basic Training Centre a great deal of entertainment was provided for the men, which the Cadets were also able to enjoy, i.e., Troop Shows, Sports Days, Boxing Contests etc. The Cadets were extremely well fed, and were given a good deal of freedom under the Camp regulations, i.e., visits to Sherbrooke.

At each of the two Camps held at Sherbrooke, the Contingent profided the basic items for a Mess Dinner in the Officers' Mess, and the Officers of the Centre were their guests: the C.O. came down for the dinner in each case.

Major J.McCullogh was Chief Instructor for the Camp at Macdonald College, which was well handled by Capt. C.A.V.Barker, the Cadets living in the College and messing in the College Cafeteria.

The last Camp held at Farnham Summer Camp was chiefly for Medical and Dentals students, and in view of the declaration of V.E.Day a number of Cadets did not report and were dealt with as stated above.

It will be understood that after the last Camp was held, as a result of the war in Europe being over, no further training was carried out, and there have been no parades since that date.

As soon as the C.O. came on duty he took steps to make enquires regarding his possible successor and was engaged in this until late in January 1946. He also interviewed the Minister of Defence with regard to the ear-marking of surplus funds for a Trust Fund for the Contingent in the future, and it is hoped that permission for this will be given at an early date.

On the 5th October 1945 McGill held a special Convocation to confer Honorary Degrees on the heads of the fighting services, including General H.G.D.Crerar. In the absence of the C.O., who was still ill, Major E.deL.Greenwood presented General Crerar for his degree.

(Report to the Principal and Vice-Chancellor on McGill University Contingent C.O.T.C. Training for the Period 1944-45).

.... During the training season, and before the camp periods this Spring, events of special interest were as follows:

Completion of the Quartermaster Stores at a total cost of some \$6,500.-

The decision of N.D.H.Q. that Third anf Fourth Year training be increased from one hour to three hours, as compared with the previous training season.

The Annual Church Parade on November 12,1944, attended also by the U.N.T.D. and the U.A.S., was attended in all by some 1400, and the Salute at the March Past was taken by Major General F.R.Phelan, C.B., D.S.O., V.D.

The decision by the Regimental committee (requiring confirmation by N.D.H.Q.) to apply the accumulated Corps Funds as follows:

- (a) \$30,000. as a Memorial Trust Fund in Perpetuity for future C.O.T.C. activities:
- (b) To donate \$5,000. to the McGill Campaign organized by Mr. J.W.McConnell:
- (c) To donate \$5,000. to the McGill Graduate Society Campaign for the McGill War Memorial:
- (d) The balance of the fund to be retained under a Trust Agreement, the preparation of which is in progress.

Following approach by, and consultation with a Committee of the

Students! Council, it was agreed that a liberal proportion of the Assigned Headquarters! Pay of the Students in training for the season 1944-45 wouldbe donated to the McGill War Memorial Campaign, on the following basis:

Assuming that the Headquarters' Pay (exclusive of the Command Pay and Allowance at the rate of \$1.60 per Cadet (per annum) received for all Cadets in training in Montreal and at Macdonald College would total \$20,000.-, \$5,000. was to be held to cover total annual training expenses, leaving an amount of \$12,000.- to be turned over to the War Memorial Fund as a donation from the Students direct: but it was distinctly understood and agreed that if the pay received fell short of that amount, that the donation from the 1944-45 pay would stand reduced accordingly, the amount to be made up from Assigned Pay in the following year or years, and this basis was so reported to the War Memorial Campaign Committee.

As it turned out, N.D.H.Q. refused to authorize Headquarters' Pay for a strength in excess of our previous establishment, although they authorized Camp Pay in full to all Cadets in training. Further, we were advised that, with the consent of McGill University, Macdonald College proposed to establish their own War Memorial, making no contribution direct to the McGill Memorial in consequence. This resulted in reducing the net amount available to the Memorial Campaign out of the 1944-45 funds to approximately \$8,000., and the balance will require to be made up out of subsequent Assigned Headquarters' Pay......

MESS OPERATIONS:

Until the close of training in the Spring of 1945 the Men's Canteen in the charge of Mrs. Johnson was operated under the control of the Mess Committee and as an integral part of the Mess. The Canteen was opened before and after parades and during breaks, and was well patronized by the cadets.

During the 1944-1945 training season a Sergeants' Mess was operated. This Mess was independent of the Mess Committee, but its supplies were purchased from Mess Stock.

Since the Spring of 1945 the Sergeants' Mess has been closed, but A/I's and attached N.C.O's are permitted to make purchases from the Mess.

George Johnson acted as Mess Steward for the Month of October, 1944. From November, 1944, to April 15th 1945, two students, Kenton Winter and Roger Vornhold were hired on a part-time basis as Stewards. Since then George Johnson has again taken over the Steward's duties, and the Committee wishes to express its appreciation of his willing and valuable services.

The only Camp Canteen operated by the Mess during the period under review was that at Farnham, from the 17th of June to the 30th of June, 1945. Mr. George Foster was in charge of this Canteen, which was successful in every way.

REPORT OF THE ACTIVITIES OF THE BAND

McGILL UNIVERWITY CONTINGENT - C.O.T.C.

For the year ended 31st December 1945.

Sir:

In such a well-disciplined Unit it will not be expected that I should depart from the manner of previous reports on the state and activity of the Band. After all, our Band is a Pipe Band p A Highland Band. You will remember, with me, the reply of that eminent Scottish soldier, the Earl of Breadalbane, who, when asked to render an account of the money voted to pacify the Highlanders, declared that "The money is spent, the Highlands are quiet, and this is the only way of accounting among friends" and in the long years since 1940, the Band has won the friendship and the appreciation of all of us.

My own interest in all things Scottish has brought me many interesting contacts and around them have gathered many of the most pleasant recollections and associations of my sojourn here on earth. I like to reflect that in this instance we have been able to share this culture with you so that, with your greater appreciation of these things, there remains for you a widened opportunity for similar enlarged contacts. I am reminded of the story of three members of the Glasgow City Police, an Inspector, a Sergeant, and a Constable seated in a South-bound train on the Oban-Glasgow Line. They were returning to duty from their homes in the North where they had been on holiday. Much to the annoyance of a mere Glaswegian crouching in the corner of the Compartment, these braw Highlandmen told yarn after yarn in the Gaelic and sun Gaelic songs to one another in rotation, without intermission. Their boisterous behaviour quite deafened the Sassenach fellow-passenger whose ignorance of the ancient tongue precluded him from entering into the spirit of the journey. "For the love o' God, dinna come in here if you're no Hielan'" he exclaimed in exasperation as the train drew up at a station en route and another passenger sought to enter the compartment.

Well, Sir., I fell that though we have not the Gaelic the thorough appreciation that has come to the unit of Pipers and Pipe Music might make us all welcome to such a gathering. The other day I came across this paragraph which, I am sure, you will appreciate: "There wes acht o' us in Lucky Mackintosh's back pairlour in the Canongate 6' Edinburrie and we wes a' playin' the pipes at wan time and we wes a' playin' different tumes and, Man, Ah jist thocht Ah wes in Heavin' " - That, in a few words, epitomizes an enthusiast's idea of the grandest sound to which mortal man can harken, and while you may not come so far, you have come to an appreciation of the fact that the Pipe music is the most martial music in the world, and, being well played, nothing else can grip the heart of strong men like the "Lament".

The Rev. Aeneas Gordon, who for 52 years, was Minister of the Fife Parish of Kettle, left this clause in his Will: "I die a Highlander, I lived a Highlander, and have been indebted to Highland associations all my life. The last tribute of respect I can pay to my Highland ancestry is to be buried to the music of the bagpipes, which I beg my executors to provide, and to pay the pipers well. "I mention this only to point out, should any of you gentlemen, by your association with the band, be similarly moved, that provision can be made for acceeding to your wishes, particularly if your executors carry out the last part of the instructions.

I am happy to relate that the six members of our Band who served in the Active Forces Overseas have returned to duty with the Band and that the ordinary peacetime procedure is being followed with Pipe Major John MacIver, who was decorated and Mentioned in Dispatches, taking active Command. You will be interested, I am sure, to know that great drummer and splendid fellow, Jock Smith, is to continue. I am sure that all of us who have had long association with the Unit recognize the great personal contribution he has made, particularly to the success of our different camps. He has proven himself to be a real leader of men, and his aid in maintaining morale at the high peak it reached can scarcely be over-estimated.

I am happy to report the prospects of re-accoutering the Band have been greatly helped by the authorization, by the Colonel, of the transfer of \$500.00 to the Band Committee for this specific purpose, and I appeal to the Officers that, if their own Fund, built up during the War Years, can stand the strain after the Lucullian feast which we had the other evening, that they too may make a similar contribution. With all this it will take at least an additional \$2,000.00 to be raised privately to properly clothe the Band.

This, Sir, will be my last appearance before you in this capacity. Report on Musketry (other than Musketry given for training) for the Calendar year 1945

During the months of January, February and March the McGill C.O.T.C. Rifle Association fired in the D.C.R.A. Small Bore Rifle Competitions. It was hoped at the beginning of the season that with the rifles purchased in the previous year, plus ten which had been vouchered to the Contingent by the St.Jerome Training Centre, we would make a considerably better showing than in the previous year.

On receipt of the results for January, we thought out hopes were well justified, since the first team came 5th in Canada with a score of 477 out of 500: unfortunately we were beaten by Queen's University with 480. Our second team came 18th, and our third team was even in the prize money. With our hopes high, we thought that with a score of 479 in the February shoot, we would have been higher still. In this case, however, we only came 13th and were beaten by the following C.O.T.C.s.-O.A.C., Queen's University and University of Toronto.

This poor result rather disheartened the members of the Association, but they practised hard and managed to obtain 479 in the March shoot, which placed them in 15th place only. Again we were beaten by Queen's University.

With regard to the final scores, we came second as far as the C.O.T.C.s were concerned, viz.,

Queen's - 1446, McGill - 1435, U.of T. - 1420, O.A.C. - 1419 out of a possible 1500.

After the D.C.R.A. Competitions were completed, a match was fired against the University of Montreal C.O.T.C. which again resulted in a win for McGill, but not by anything like as big a margin as in the previous year. In the evening after this match, the University of Montreal Rifle Assin entertained McGill Rifle Association at the former's Armoury, to a dance and supper.

Due to the cessation of training on account of V.E. and V.J.Days no further shooting took place during the year 1945 as far as the C.O.T.C. was concerned. A number of ex-members of the McGill Rifle Association, however, formed the McGill Rifle Club, with Major E.del.Greenwood as Hon.-President, and, through the kindness of the C.O., were given the use of the miniature range and the Cooey Rifles. It is understood that this Club functioned very satisfactorily and took part in a number of local small bore competitions. +++

In addition to the McGill Rifle Club, the range was losned by the C.O. to Dongue Pointe Ordnance Depot and the High School Air Cadets for two days each week.

Report on Contingent Musketry for the year 1944

In continuation of my report for the year 1943, we were very glad to obtain early in the year 10 Cooey Rifles at a cost of approximately \$5.- each. In addition, thanks to your efforts to obtain extra rifles, another 10 were vouchered to the Contingent from the St. Jerome Training Centre. This meant that the members of the Rifle Association were well supplied with rifles for their competition in the D.C.R.A. Unfortunately the 20 rifles were not obtained until after the January match had been fired, and, consequently, our score for the match was very low, i.e., 447 out of 500. At the same time we were awarded a team prize of \$5.- for this match.

In the February match we did a great deal better, our first team came eighth, with the second team thirty-fifth. Two prizes were won of \$10.- and \$5.-. In the February match the University of Manitoba was the only team from a C.O.T.C. ahead of us. For the third and last match held in March we did not do quite as well and the first team came 12th only. In this match, however, we were only beaten by one other C.O.T.C., viz., Queens University. In the grand aggregate, as far as C.O.T.Cs were concerned, McGill came 4th as under:

The Commanding Officer and Mrs.Morris attended and the latter presented the prizes to the McGill team. The Trevor-Penny Shield for the best shot was won by CQMS Farmer, H.F., and small silver trays were presented to the members of the first team for each of the three shoots.

No more shooting took place until the Autumn when the Rifle Association was revived and the following officers elected:

Hon.President - Major E.del.Greenwood Captain - Sgt. Ince, G. Sec.Treas. - Sgt.Gooding, G.

Our grateful thanks are due to Mr.E.G.Brewer for his efficient services as coach until March 1944. He was most energetic and helpful to the Association in every way possible.

Captain Furniss arranged for Capt. A.B.Holmes to coach the team during the season. It was only after some practices had been fired that it was discovered that the D.C.R.A. had changed the target for the new season to a half bull's-eye, which was much more difficult than the old taget. However, nothing daunted, the Cadets reset their sights, and on breaking off just before Christmas, were making better scores than last year. Just prior to Christmas, the usual Officers' and staff shoot was held. Owing to the fact that it had not been possible to get the Officers together for

an outdoor shoot, it was decided that the Morris Cup should be awarded on the results of the indoor Christmas shoot. The cup was won by Capt. C.V.Heward. About 20 Officers, ex-Officers and Musketry Instructors took part. Several other Officers, including one of the Musketry Instructors, Mr.Coulter, won prizes through drawings in the sweepstake, etc.

Report on Contingent Training for 1944

In the Training Report presented at the Annual Meeting in 1944 a change was made, in that the report was brought down to the conclusion of the local Headquarters training. With permission, the same procedure will be adopted at this time.

Four camps were held in 1944, No.1 under command of Major E.del. Greenwood at Petawawa, No.2 at St.Johns, Que., under command of Lt.-Col.J.M. Morris, MC, VD, No.3 at Petawawa and No.4 at Farnham, Que., the two latter under command of Major E.C. Morris.

The annual problem of a camp for the Engineers who complete their academic course in April was unexpectedly solved by N.D.H.Q. approving our request that these students might be accommodated at C.E.T.C. A-5 Petawawa. After a preliminary trip by Majors Greenwood and Morris to arrange syllabus and other details, the No.1 Camp detachment consisting of 5 Officers, 7 A.I's and 84 Cadets left Montreal on the night of 22 Apr 44, arriving at Petawawa the following morning. A hard training syllabus had been set up and the cadets time was well occupied, working on Bridging, Forts & Mines and Demolitions. The highlight of the camp was the construction of a Bailey Bridge across an eighty foot water gap. A night defensive wiring scheme and night war Noises exercises are worthy of note.

No.3 Camp, for those Engineering students who had to attend Survey School, had been arranged to take place at St. Johns, Que. However, in view of the success of No.1 Camp representations were made through the usual channels to hold No.3 at Petawawa. This arrangement was agreed to by N.D.H.Q. This Camp consisting of 5 Officers, 7 A.I's and 102 Cadets left Montreal on Saturday night, 20 May 44 and returned Sunday, 4 Jun 44. A syllabus similar to that of No.1 Camp was laid out and, unique in the annals of military history, it was followed out as laid down without any deviation whatever. On the last day of camp a sports day was organized and McGill C.O.T.C. ran away with every event except the tug of war, much to the chagrin of the Centre.

Throughout both of these camps the unfailing courtesy of Col.Richards, the Commandant of A-5, and all his officers and staff, was most heart warming. The high quality and variety of rations was a source of pleasurable surprise to the boys attending both camps.

No.2 Camp comprised the bulk of students enrolled in other than Engineering and Medical faculties. The Contingent left the Armoury on Sunday morning 7 May 44, proceeding to St. Johns by train. The weather was generally favourable and the syllabus followed bore a striking resemblance to the one drawn up prior to arrival at camp. In addition to a certain amount of drill, everyone was put through the miniature range, firing both rifle and Bren, followed up by a day at the Farnham open range, in the second week. A night compass march, the famous Greenwood Circus, military sketching, the assault course, elementary instruction in mine laying and a scheme in which they had to find their way through several R.V's from the west bank of the L'Acadie River, constituted the balance of the training, which culminated in a scheme in which the whole Contingent participated centering around the C.P.R. bridge over the L'Acadie River. In fact, the time seemed all too short. This programme involved a large amount of transport, which was very well handled by our own drivers who had qualified during the winter D & M Trucks were supplied from the 34th Res. Bde. pool. course.

No.4 Camp was composed mostly of first year Medical students. The Camp paraded at the Armoury and proceeded to Farnhan on Sunday, 11 Jun 44, returning Saturday, 24 Jun 44. Unfortunately, the weather during this camp was not at all propitious, being very cool with quite an unnecessary amount of rain which hampered training to an appreciable extent. It is a pleasure to record, however, that the spirits of the cadets attending the camp refused to be dampened by the weather.

Half of the training was devoted to R.C.AM.C. subjects under the officers and instructors of the 6th (R) C.C.S., and covered such subjects as

nd r ttee c Board Hand Carriage, Stretcher Bearing, Battle First Aid and Camp Nursing, with a visit and inspection of the hospital at A-12. The work under Corps instructors consisted of Map Reading subjects, miniature and open ranges, including firing with the pistol, short conditioning marches and refresher periods in weapon training. The cadets took a special pride in keeping the lines clean and the Camp Medical Officer on two occasions brought parties from other units to demonstrate how a camp area should be maintained. We were honored by having a visit from the C.G.S., Lieut-Gen. J.C.Murchie. On the Sunday spent in the camp we combined with 6th C.C.S. in Divine Service, which was conducted by CQMS Stark, K.A., and Sgt. (now P/2/Lt.)H.O.L.Murray, both of McGill C.O.T.C., which was a really unforgettable experience on the part of those privileged to be there.

In considering the 1944-45 Local Headquarters training season, several developments took place which had a profound effect. They may well be dealt with at the outset, and may be summarised as follows:

- 1. The enrolment of students in the University was much heavier than had been anticipated and, added to this, N.S.S. permitted a considerable group of technical faculty students to return to the University, whose academic status had been in question.
- 2. Every student was required to undergo a Pulhems examination, with the result that quite an appreciable number, who had been previously exempted on medical grounds, were found fit and had to report for training. In addition to this, the University authorities checked up on the student body more strictly, the result of these two factors being that there were a number of senior students who had received little or no training and whose academic hours played havoc with any schedule of military training hours.
- 3. It follows that the years spent by the senior students at the University parallel the years that the whole world has spent in the throes of this terrible war, and it also follows that, rightly or wrongly, these senior students have been able to reconcile the peaceful pursuit of their academic studies with the very urgent call for men in the Services, and these peaceful academic years have only been made possible by the sacrifice and devotion to duty of those other youg men nearly 6000 from McGill University alone who could not so reconcile themselves, and who, by their splendid deeds, have helped to keep the horrors of war from this country.
- 4. Hours of training were revised and set at 110 hours at local Headquarters and two weeks at camp, except for the students who had completed 220 hours of local H.Q. training and two 2-week camps. The training for this latter group was set at 60 hours for local H.Q. and two weeks at camp.
- 5. Owing to pressure of business the ranks of the Reserve Officers became very seriously depleted, it would seem more particularly among those who used to take part in the training. This proved and is still proving a very serious handicap to the carrying out of a training schedule.
- 6. In January 1945 the University Air Squadrons were discontinued and the C.O.T.C. had to take all personnel over from No.5 U.A.S.

To start the season a Weapon Circus was organized which summarised instruction in all Infantry weapons, from the 6 pdr and Oerlikon down to the trench knife. This proved a popular feature.

Owing to a more or less justified opinion expressed from time to time by senior students that basic training subjects tended to become monotonous, an experiment was made with the 60 hour group. Nine platoons were organized as follows:

two Platoons to take Military Engineering under Major Greenwood one Platoon to take Signals Training under Capt. Warner one Platoon to take Driving & Maintenance course under

As the season progressed it became apparent there was considerable lack of attention, and it was decided to impose tests.

nd r r ttee c Board Of the Engineering Platoons 76 wrote the test and 31 failed to obtain 120 marks out of a possible 300. At the test for the "B" Syllabus platoons 212 wrote and 174 failed to obtain a pass mark of 150 out of a possible 300. This poor result was duly reported to the JSUTC who instructed that the failures would revert to a basis of 110 hours instead of 60 as formerly.

This order necessitated a considerable reorganization, the drawing up of a new syllabus and an officer to take over the new, and somewhat disgruntled, platoons. Under the time honored system of "I want three volunteers, you, you and you", Major J.B. Brown undertook this work. After the preliminary parades under the new regulation these platoons seemed to settle down to the extent that the Corps was prepared to recommend to the Unfortunately, JSUTC that the three-hour week might be reconsidered. however, at a parade of the whole group, Major Brown failed to get any response to questions he put based on previous lectures, and felt compelled to dismiss the parade and the whole question was reported to the A further meeting of the JSUTC was called to consider the matter, which was left in the hands of the Commanding Officer. Representations were made to him by the students to the effect that they knew the work, but that on the evening in question there was a sort of mass nervousness which brought about the impasse. The Commanding Officer decided to impose another test, the paper being drawn up by Major Brown and based on points he had stressed. At this test 160 wrote the paper. Avery careful marking was made and all papers were again gone over by the C.O. personally. It was found that 38 had failed and, in accordance with the warning given to the students, these names had to be reported to the JSUTC, but before doing so the C.O. and C.I. interviewed every one of those who had failed, and, where any extenutating circumstances were adduced, the same were marked on Final action is still pending. the report made to the Committee.

From the beginning it had been hoped that N.D.H.Q. might recognise our "B" Syllabus course and allow candidates to sit for the promotion examination, but this view was not accepted. However, District very kindly ination, but to some extent and an examination on a "B" Syllabus paper was helped out to some extent and an examination on a "B" Syllabus paper was held under their auspices. The results of this examination were very gratifying as of 78 writing the paper only four failed and the average was very high.

Medical students were divided into five platoons, the first three being first year and the other two being second year. The first year received largely basic military subjects and a course on First Aid by Dr.Martin. The Secondyear received almost entirely subjects called for on the military side of R.C.A.M.C. training, such as Map Using, Vehicle Recognition, Mines and Booby Traps, slit trenches and shelter, special lectures on the M.O's part in Chemical Warfare etc.

The Annual Inspection was made in February by Maj.-Gen.Tremblay. No deviation from the regular training syllabus was made and the boys, realising they were on their mettle, put up a really marvelous show. The realising they way in which they fell in, called the roll and broke up into soldierly way in which they fell in, called the roll and broke up into instructional groups, would warm the heart any 'Old Sweat' present to see it.

on the Western Front and just what course Military training may take in the 1945-46 season it is, of course, impossible to foresee. However, if the status quo is more or less maintained some suggestions may be in order.

An effort should be made to build up the cadre of Reserve Officers. With the Contingent swollen to some 1200, the permanent staff cannot do a creditable job and the great bulk of the training had, of necessity, to be borne by them during the 1944-45 season. In any event, if the day time hours are fully utilised, a great deal of the trouble could be obviated and the University authorities will no doubt cooperate in this connection, if proper representations are made.

Students who have been sitting at lectures all day cannot be expected to make the best soldiers, if they are asked to sit at another three hours military lectures at night. There is not accommodation for anything else with the large night groups, however.

Although there was an effort made to meet the expressed wishes If students for a more "interesting" syllabus, the cry this year was that they preferred drill and weapons. It is a case of the old fable of "The Man, the Boy and the Donkey". After the experience of the past season I believe the answer is a straight N.C.O's course for the senior years, with a District examination and qualification at the end. This combines features of both arguments. A test should be given before the Christmas break and those who do not meet requirements dropped to straight basic.

Partially with this in view, and also for other reasons, more time should be taken by the instructional staff in the first organization parades, and for those cadets who are taking second and later years each individual record should be examined and where requirements have not been met, the requirements of the regulations adhered to. By getting the whole of the instructional staff on the job at registration time, this should not be too difficult.

Undergraduate officers should not be appointed unless they are willing to devote extra time to the Corps, and to study for qualifying examinations.

The Second year Medicals agitated for a larger proportion of straight medical subjects, such as surgery etc. Same might be considered, though I doubt if it would meet with the approval of N.D.H.Q.

Apology is tendered for the constant use of the Officers' Mess as a class-room. If the lecture room could be devoted to the exclusive use of the C.O.T.C. the necessity for this would be largely eliminated.

One last word and an emphasis on a former paragraph. Do everything possible to have all daylight hours utilised. It is my belief that some of the troubles we have run into during the past year would never have arisen, had we made full use of our facilities and staff during the daytime. It is only natural that at night, instructors and cadets alike, are bound to be more tired and more irritably inclined.

Report on Military Rngineering for 1944-45

This past season a number of cadets of 3rd and 4th years
Engineering have been given special instruction in Military Engineering
for the 3-hours per week training allotted to these students: 40 cadets
attended the first lecture: by the second lecture the group was increased
to 75.

I was very ably assisted in the instruction by Lieuts.L.A. Geddes and L.J.M.Poitevin, and on one occasion by Lieut. A.T.Farmer. At the same time we found it extremely difficult to efficiently instruct such a large number of Cadets on engineering subjects, especially as we were trying to cover a great deal in the short time available.

During the Autumn we were able to take three Saturday afternoons for practical work. The first at Verdun Auditorium, in order to make use of the equipment of the 4th Divisional Engineers. Unfortunately, they did not have as much equipment as we had expected and the programme laid down was not carried out in its entirety.

The second and third afternoons were spent behind Loyola College, the latter of which was probably more instructive than the former.

Lectures were given by two assistant officers and myself along the lines of the Syllabus submitted to the Chief Instructor. It was found extremely difficult to hold the attention of the large group and a very poor spirit of enthusiasm, if any, was shown by the Cadets. Report on Signal Section for 1944

During Spring training, your Officer i/c Signals, was on command to the 34th Field Regt., R.C.A., in charge of all signal training in this Unit.

He attended the Artillery Camp at Petawawa from 2 to 16 JUL 44 (inclusive) as a guest of the 34th Field Regt., and was in charge of Signals for the Reserve Artillery, and responsible for communications in the camp area during this period.

With the commencement of Fall training at McGill C.O.T.C., No.23 Platoon was organized into a Signal Platoon, and have been receiving Signal training for 3 hours every Tuesday night, covering Signal Training, Part I.

During this course Capt. Warner was ably assisted by Sgt. D.J.Follett (now P/2/Lt.Follett) whose devotion to duty was of a high order.

The interest shown in this course has been most disappointing being decidedly below that of any course we have conducted for the reserve units.

To become efficient operators, it is absolutely essential that extra time be spent in practice, but our offer of holing voluntary parades for this purpose, met with no support.

This compares most unfavorably with other Signal courses we have conducted over the past four years, where these voluntary parades were held every week with an attendance of never less than 80%.

Lieut. W.C.J.Meredith was unable to assist in this course owing to ill health, but managed to continue supervision of Signal Training for No.3 Air Cadet Squadron, and has again been congratulated by the Squadron O.C. for his work on their behalf.

In conclusion, our thanks must be expressed to Major E.C.Morris for his unfailing support and interest in this work.

COMMANDING OFFICER'S REMARKS

The reports which have been submitted require no further summarising by me, as they have given you a clear review of the activities which they embrace.

There are, however, a few points not covered in these reports which I wish to touch on. In September last there was a meeting convened in Ottawa between the three Services and the Executive Committee of the Canadian Universities Conference, which gave birth to the Joint Services University Training Board (J.S.U.T.C.), under whose jurisdiction is now the control of Compulsory University Training throughout Canada.

Functioning under this Board, Committees were set up in each University, known as Joint Services University Training Committees, which under the J.S.U.T.C., control all military matters on the respective campuses.

The hours of training laid down were 110 hours at local H.Q., and two weeks in Camp per annum for a period of two years. Students and two weeks in Camp per annum for a period of two years. Students are qualified subsequently to have their local H.Q. training reduced to 60 hours with two weeks camp training in each year, for the balance to 60 hours with two weeks camp training in each year, for the balance of their academic term - these being minimum periods and subject to the proviso that the standard of training must be to the satisfaction of the Commanding Officer.

This involved no change for Students in their First and Second Years, but was a definite step-up from the schedule of the previous year when the Third and Fourth Year students in Technical Courses were required to complete an average of only one hour per week H.Q. training.

Our Undergraduate Officers have been promoted to commissioned rank for no other reason than that their general attitude and aptitude have been above average, and they should be the best medium for detecting

Take, for example, the situation which came to a head this year with respect to assigned Headquarters pay.

The only pay, other than the Cadets' pay, which comes to a Reserve Unit from National Defence, is the Command pay and Training Allowance of \$1.60 per Cadet per annum - obviously a hopelessly inade-quate amount for the proper conduct of any self-respecting Corps. A University which applies for permission to operate a C.O.T.C. definitely assumes a responsibility for providing all necessary accommodation, with certain further provisions for reimbursement for space, etc., which may be provided, which does not enter into the picture so far as we are concerned with our own armoury. Because of this, it has been the time honoured practice for Cadets to assign their pay to the Corps, and until very recently it was done cheerfully without question - even their Camp pay; but if, additional to Camp pay, the Students were to receive their Headquarters pay, where is the revenue to come from to supplement the \$1.60 per Cadet, unless the University is prepared to make up the deficiency.

With the exception of one small University in Ontario, the Universities conducting C.O.T.Cs in every other Province, are supported by the Provinces, whereas McGill - apart from some intermittent grants of relatively small amounts - gets no Provincial support, and which is true in varying degrees of other C.O.T.Cs in this Province. If the University is to find this money, additional to the fact that it is costing them from \$450.- to \$600.- a year more than the amount received in fees from the individual Students, suggests that it would result in increased University fees; whereas the assignment of Headquarters pay not only makes no demands on a student, but every cent of this amount not used for training and administration has and will be used within the four walls of the University for the benefit of the Student Body.

REPORT OF REGIMENTAL COMMITTEE for the year 1943

In continuance of the report on the activities of the McGill C.O.T.C. (submitted at the Last Annual Meeting) it will be recalled that the Contingent was, in the autumn of 1942, divided into "A" Wing (pre-Officer training), and "B" Wing (Basic Training).

During the months of January and February 1943, "A" Wing Cadets received instruction in "Special-to-Arms", viz., Artillery, Engineers, Machine Gun and Infantry, while "B" Wing carried out training as laid down in the policy of training for the Reserve Army. For further information on training see Report of the Officer i/c Training.

During the year the Contingent purchased further equipment as aids to training. The most important purchase was a moving-picture projector, which has been used extensively since the Contingent was able to obtain it through the kind offices of the Hon. Lieut-Colonel, Lt.-Col. T.S. Morrisey, D.S.O.

Another item of great usefulness was the set of mirrors which were fixed on the North wall of the Gymnasium-Armoury.

Towards the end of the year, it was decided that steps should be taken to provide increased accommodation for Quartermaster Stores. In view of the fact that Ottawa refused to provide finances for the extra building, the C.O.T.C. decided to do the work themselves.

Thanks to the kind co-operation of the D.E.O., Lt.-Col. Rooney, R.C.E., Lieut. Roy, R.C.E. arranged for the work to be done, ordered the materials and arranged for the necessary labour. McGill authorities were most enthusiastic since they felt the building might be of use to them after the war. Just prior to the year's end, work started on this building situated at the North end of the Gymnasium-Armoury. The Contingent voted an outside sum of \$5000.00 for its construction and equipping.

It was decided this year, for the first time, that Cadets should be allowed to retain their pay for the Camp period, alloting their pay for training at local Headquarters to Corps funds as heretofore. The under-graduate officers would be allowed to retain pay for camp on basis of C.S.M. rank, the rest of their pay to be allotted to the Corps and Officers' Reserve funds as in the past.

It was also decided that \$2.00 per Cadet should be ear-marked from Corps funds for entertainment of the Cadets during the year. As regards "B" Wing, this money was spent on a troop show followed by a dance, which was held in the Gymnasium in the Spring. "A" Wing used

their allowance at Niagara to provide transportation for a visit to Niagara Falls on May 23rd. All members of "B" Wing in Camp, attached Army personnel and civilians, were the guests of "A" Wing in connection with this visit to the Falls.

Owing to the fact that a number of Cadets wished to engage in civil work during the Summer months, and in order to fit in with Convocation, it was found necessary to hold the Annual Camps at an exceptionally early date.

During No. 2 Camp, over the period May 21st = 23rd, Lt.-Col.

D.S.O., E.D., Honorary Colonel, and Lt.-Col. T.S. Morrisey, D.S.O., E.D.

Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel, visited the Contingent in Camp. Colonel

Magee left on the night of May 22nd, Lt.-Col. Morris on May 23rd and

Lt.-Col. Morrisey returned with the Contingent to Montreal.

An outstanding event during No. 2 Camp, apart from the visit to Fort Niagara reported elsewhere, was the twelve-hour leave given to all ranks on Bunday, May 23rd. In addition, transportation was provided from and to Niagara Falls, so that every one was able to visit the Falls, both American and Canadian sides, and in some cases Cadets proceeded as far as Buffalo. It should be noted that on the morning of May 24th no cadet, N.C.O., or other rank (attached for duty from the Active Forces) nor any of the civilian personnel, was A.W.L.

From the end of Camp No. 3, to the beginning of training in September 1943, as has been customary in latter years, there was little activity in the Contingent.

While one of the Reserve Army Camp periods was in progress, Major Greenwood and 2/Lieuts. Geddes and Poitevin, went to Farnham in order to add further detail to a special map which had been prepared in 1942 by members of the Contingent, and which was being exclusively used by the Units of the Reserve Army in Camp. This arrangement was made by Major H.S.L. Brown, a former officer in charge of "B" Wing, McGill C.O.T.C.

The usual Officers Map Using week-end at Pointe Platon was held 20th to 23rd August. About eighteen officers attended, and the event proved, as in the past, very successful. On this particular occasion, Mrs. Churchill and her daughter, Miss Mary Churchill, visited Platon during the time when the Officers were there.

During the months of August and September at various Senior Officers' Meetings, the question of the future of the McGill C.O.T.C. generally, was discussed, and in September a meeting of representatives from all the C.O.T.Cs in Montreal was held in the Armoury. This was presided over by Lt.-Col. P. Ranger, O.C., U. of M. C.O.T.C., in the absence of Lt.-Col. Morris. A unanimous recommendation was drawn up for submission to M.D. 4.

In the meantime, however, at a Meeting of all C.O.T.C.s in Canada attended by Lt.-Col. Morris, which was held in Ottawa, it was found that the chance of Cadets from C.O.T.Cs obtaining Commissions as a result of C.O.T.C. training would in the future be practically non-existent. The C.O.T.Cs were informed that if one Undergraduate out of fifty obtained C.O.T.Cs were informed that if one Undergraduate out of fifty obtained a Commission, he would be lucky. This, of course, altered the whole basis of the training which had been given hitherto by the Contingent.

During the course of the Summer, Major J.C. Hope, who had successively been Chief Instructor "A" Wing and Officer i/c "B" Wing (1942-43), was appointed to command the 2nd Army Course (McGill University). The loss of Major Hope, who had been with the Contingent since its re-formation at the beginning of the War, was a great blow. Major E.C. Morris was appointed Chief Instructor.

Prior to Major Rexford's departure, our exceedingly popular, hard-working and well-loved Chaplain and Honorary Major, G.G.D. Kilpatrick, D.S.O., was taken away from us by Ottawa and put in charge of the Department of Army Education, with the rank of full Colonel. Our congratulations naturally go to the Padre, but we miss him sorely.

After the start of the training in the Autumn, another Senior Officer left us in the person of Major G.F. Savage, also an 'original' dating from September 1939. He started with the Corps in the Infantry wing as a Lieutenant, and in due course rose to the rank of Major as 2 i/c wing as a Lieutenant, and in due course rose to the rank of Major as 2 i/c "A" Wing, and finally as Officer in charge of "A" Wing. He is attending a course at Kingston in preparation for joining A.M.G.

Various visits were made by the Officers of the Contingent, viz: The C.O. to Ottawa for meeting of C.O.T.C.s throughout Canada on 10th January and again in the Autumn of 1943. Major J.C. Majors Greenwood, Hope, Savage and Bagg to Niagara-on-the-Lake tee in April in connection with preparation for the Camp. It was with very keen regret that we heard of the death of Lt .- Col. W. Nicholson, D.S.O., M.C. Colonel Nicholson had given a great deal of his time to helping with the training of the C.O.T.C. Cadets in machine gun work, particularly in the early part of the war, and he was considered almost a member of the officer establishment of the Contingent. Owing to illness, Capt. G. T. Hyde felt compelled to resign his appointment as President of the Mess Committee on June 23rd, 1943. His place was taken by Major E.C. Duff. A return Shooting Competition with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology was held on 20th February, 1943, followed by a dance in the Officers' and Cadets' Mess. Approximately seven members of the M.I.T. were present. The visit was most successful, andthis time the M.I.T. won the Competition by a considerable margin. In the Autumn the Annual Officers' Rifle & Revolver Shoot for the Morris Cup was held at Mount Bruno, and resulted in a win for Captain C.A.V. Barker (Macdonald College Company). In October a Contingent Rifle Association was formed in order to participate in the D.C.R.A. Competitions to be held in January, February and March 1944. Practices started in November, and Lieut. E.G. Brewer very kindly consented to act as Coach. It was felt that practice for these Competitions would be of great benefit to the Cadets, especially if they were to engage in another Competition with the M.I.T. Thanks to the efforts of the Commanding Officer, a number of extra 22 rifles were obtained for the use of the Cadets taking part in these practices. As pointed out in last year's report, a number of District Qualification Courses for Members of the Canadian (Reserve) Army were given by McGill C.O.T.C. with, on the whole, very satisfactory results in the examination held in March 1943. A number of Reserve Officers were given instruction for "D" and "C" Syllabi (M.G.) by Major E.C. Morris, and one Officer for "D" Syllabus R.C.E., and one for "C" Syllabus R.C.E. were given instruction by Major Greenwood. Other qualification courses for Reserve Army Officers were carried out in the Autumn of 1943 under arrangements made by M.D. No. 4. Some Officers of the R.H.C., however, obtained extra instruction in Map Using, through the Contingent, during the Autumn of 1943. During the year subscriptions were made from the C.O.T.C. to the Fourth and Fifth Victory Loans: in the former case the sum subscribed was \$10,000.00 and in the latter case the amount of \$1000.00. The resignation due to ill health of Captain George T. Hyde, President of the Mess Committee, since 1940, and the transfer from COMMITTEE: the Corps of practically all the members who were serving on the Committee during the first half of the year, necessitated complete reconstitution of the Committee. This was accomplished during the summer season and the new Committee took over on 9 September 1943. It is made up of the following members:-

GENERAL REMARKS

Financially the Mess was self supporting until 1942, when due to reduction in officer training activities and consequent reduction in the use of the Mess, the surplus which had been built up had practically vanished at the end of 1942 and, to continue the same service, financial assistance was required. Early in 1943 the Commanding Officer authorized transfer to the Mess of \$1.00 per Cadet and \$6.00 per officer from assigned pay as Mess dues, and the officers of the A. and T. Staff to pay \$6.00. With this additional income, together with a substantial reduction in overhead expense, particularly between August and November when there was little use of the Mess and we were able to get along without a full time steward, the Mess completed the year with a substantial surplus.

During the period under review, it was decided that the refreshment counter, known as the Canteen, should be combined with the Mess. The reason underlying this amalgamation was that the Cadets are members of the Mess, and consequently, there is no need to keep separate accounts.

USE OF MESS

At the commencement of training for the present College year, in October, there was for some time very little use of the Mess BY CADETS by the Cadets. It is a pleasure to report, however, that there has subsequently been a great improvement in this condition and the Committee has in hand at least one change which it is hoped will provide further incentive for the Cadets to use the Mess. Also, with the Commanding Officer's approval, the facilities of the Mess are being granted to the various companies to arrange entertainments, dances, etc., which the Committee hopes will serve to make the cadets further conscious of their Mess privileges.

U.N.T.D.

Privileged membership in the Mess has been granted to the Officers and Cadets of the University Naval Training Detachment and U.A.T.C. the University Air Training Corps. The arrangements had not been settled during the period that this report covers, but subsequently - 2 -

it has been arranged that the U.N.T.D. will pay a flat contribution of \$25.00 and the U.A.T.C. \$100.00 toward the expenses of the Mess for the year 1944. The Officers Commanding these Units are invited to attend meetings of the Mess Committee and, in their absence, the Minutes will be sent to them.

Report of the Dress Committee

I have the honour to present the Report of the Dress Committee for the year 1943. This Committee is presently composed of myself and Captain C. V. Heward, Captain R. de W. MacKay having resigned at the end of last year on his transfer to the Black Watch and no successor having been appointed.

There were no changes in dress regulations during the past year.

There were some changes, however, in the Officer's uniform allowances and the arrangment presently in force is as follows:

1. To Officers who qualify for full allowance, the sum of \$125 is advanced on certificate of the Adjutant that the Officer concerned has provided himself with one serge, tunic and slacks; one greatcoat, Officers pattern; one Officers cap, either forage or field service.

On transfer from the active strength of the unit an Officer having received such an allowance is obliged either to turn in to the Quartermaster the above-mentioned items or to repay to the Paymaster for the account of the Officers Reserve Fund the sum advanced less depreciation at the rate of 2% a month for the first six months, 5% a month for the second six months, and 2% a month thereafter.

Such Officer is likewise entitled to a further \$10 if he provides himself with satisfactory summer drill. In the event of his transfer, he may turn in his summer drill uniform or repay the \$10 less depreciation at the rate of 5% a month. In both cases depreciation is figured from the date when the uniform is approved by the Adjutant, which date is mentioned in the Adjutant's certificate.

2. Provisional Under-Graduate Officers are given an outright grant not in excess of \$25 to cover the purchase of articles of dress which they require as Officers but not including serge, greatcoat or summer drill. On this basis provision was made for officers in this category to cover the cost of two shirts, one pair of gloves, one swagger stick, one set of pips, one tie and badges, which amounted to \$12.50. No repayment is made by such an Officer on transfer.

A meeting of newly appointed Officers was held shortly after the opening of the session in October, at which attention to dress of Officers, N.C.O.'s and men was stressed.

Report on Contingent Musketry for the year 1943

REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES OF THE BAND MCGILL CONTINGENT, C.O.T.C. FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st, 1943.

It is not to be expected that in the changing circumstances of the War and in the varying fortunes of our own unit the activities of the band and the report of them should not feel the impact of the different requirements constantly set up by the great gods who govern us. Our pipe-band strength in 1940 was 16. - Of these we have lost by enlistment 8, by death one. It has not been possible to find replacements who measure up to our required standards, so that though our lads have carried on splendidly, it cannot be claimed that the band is as fine as it was. It is true that their experience in putting up tents increases, that they have lost none of the arts of scrounging that distinguish all good pipers, that they remain a buckler and example to all our going troops, in much that may not be covered in formal instruction, but the fact remains that we are all four years older than at the time of our reorganization, and we can't all do the things we did. But that has only spurred your committee to greater efforts.

One of our keenest, best loved, and most efficient members (the fact that in his position as adjutant he may sometimes do something for me, has nothing to do with this laudatory discription) has determined that this report should make up in efficiency what the band may have lost. And he has assured me that, in view of the reports submitted in other years, that should not be difficult. With a most delicate approach, which I appreciate, he suggested the form this report should take, and to convince me of the enormity of my previous delinquencies, he quotes K.R. (Can.) and lest I forget to refer to it, he outlines what the appropriate sections include.

Report on activities... he does not indicate whether that is the activities of these members or not, but in v iew of what the padre has said of some of them, and the difficulty of discerning any activity of others, I pass that up. I mention only that I lean heavily on Capt. K. J. Doig and Capt. R. V. V. Nicholls, but I do wish to place it on record that the delay in marking the chemistry papers in May was in no way caused by the prior claims of the band committee.

The band itself has met every demand that has been made upon it. Having first impressed Col. Suplee of the 31st Infantry at the Mess Dinner at Niagara S ummer Camp, they took a prominent part in the ceremony of Retreat performed before the assembled garrison at Fort Niagara, N.Y. The whole ceremony reflected great credit on the Contingent and, it is believed, impressed the American troops with the value of tradition and the splendid story of the British Army.

The widespread recognition of the technical excellence of the band was shown by the request of the pipe band of the C. W.A.C. on their visit to Montreal that they might visit our armoury and have the advise and criticism of our own band. M.D. No. 4 supplied cake and beer. Our own Jock Smith, in great moderation, impressed the girls with the finer points of the drums and pipes, and in the absence of other committee members, the President of the Committee, inspired in such company, did all he could to uphold the traditions of the old Army.

Last year I reported that the band had increased in favour with God and Man. This year I have to say that, including the paymaster in the Trinity, the Committee now shares this distinction. For the first time we have been intrusted with funds. One Thousand Dollars was given to us, and was expended as follows:-

I have the honour to report on Camp Messing for 1943 as under.

The lot of Camp Messing Officer, like that of a policeman - or even an Adjutant - is not always a happy one, but Lieut. J.E. Swift, who was detailed for this duty at all three Camps, is to be commended on the cheerful and efficient way in which he carried out his duties.

As in past years, Sgt. Leigh Harding of the Victoria Rifles of Canada, supervised the cooks, preparation of Diet Sheets and other details. Due in no small measure to his diplomatic handling of the always unpredictable cooks, I am able to report no cases of poisoning or starvation among the troops at any of the Camps.

Several itmes of kitchen ware and one garbage pail were reported missing from Camp Niagara kitchens. I trust, Sir, that such shortages will not reflect on the unquestioned honesty of our Cooking personnel, nor is it, for one moment, suggested that responsibility for these missing articles lies on our lusty Pipers with their highly developed scrounging technique - attention to which was drawn, almost gleefully I regret to say, - in Major Brown's report on Band activities.

Some difficulty was experienced in obtaining extra Messing due to ration restrictions, but ingenious substitutions of un-rationed items permitted an adequate amount of hospitality to be extended to guests.

REPORT ON TRAINING for the year 1943

The Reports presented at the Annual Meeting cover the previous calendar year, whereas the training period runs from the beginning of October in one year to the early Summer of the following year, i.e., the conclusion of the Summer Camp period. This makes for a somewhat disjointed picture and, with permission, this report will include the Headquarters training for the 1943-44 season, which has just been completed.

Attention is directed to the reports on training submitted at the last annual meeting which, in Appendices "K" and "L" outlined the activities of "A" and "B" Wings up to the close of 1942. Headquarters training was continued as outlined in those Appendices, terminating for "B" Wing early in March 1943, and for "A" Wing at the end of that month. The only change was the addition of a fourth company to "A" Wing, comprising second-year medical students. The syllabus as drawn up for this company, comprised for the most past a comprehensive course in map reading, followed by thorough instruction in gas and the use of the respirator.

In order to accommodate the needs of students in the various Faculties, three camps were held.

The first was under command of Major J.C. Hope and set a precedent by being held in the Armoury, sleeping accommodation being set up in the B.W. & F. Room. The number attending the camp, was 19 Officers, and 117 Other ranks. Notwithstanding considerable apprehension expressed regarding the feasibility of this venture, it was a pronounced success, full advantage being taken of the excellent terrain afforded by the Mountain, and our old stamping ground, North of Loyola College. One day was spent at the ranges at Mount Bruno. Personnel from both "A" and "B" Wings participated in this camp, and training for the two Wings was conducted separately. One of the features for "A" Wing was two days engineering work under Major Greenwood.

No. 2 Camp was held at Niagara-on-the-Lake under the command of Major E. de L. Greenwood. This Camp consisting of 40 Officers and 430 Other Ranks, left Montreal on the evening of May 12th returning on the morning of May 25th in time for Convocation. The march from the Armoury to Bonaventure Station was held in the pouring rain, all ranks getting thoroughly soaked. This preliminary was indicative of the whole camping period, an unprecedented amount of rain falling during the two weeks, making for very uncomfortable camping conditions. The spirit displayed by the Cadets under these circumstances was extremely gratifying. After a couple of days, by common consent, the name of the camp was changed from Niagara-on-the-Lake to Niagara-in-the-Lake, and before leaving was dubbed Niagara-under-the-Lake.

There can be no question but that the weather interfered very seriously with the syllabi as drawn up, and full advantage could not be taken of the excellent training area adjacent to the camp. The days allotted to "B" Wing for the ranges were literally a complete wash-out, and when "A" Wing went to fire, the targets could not be seen from the 100 yard firing point. Notwithstanding the handicap of the weather, however, a lot of extremely useful work was put in, and very valuable assistance was extended by the permanent staff of the camp. For instance, one of the features of Niagara Camp is a comprehensive gas training layout, and the two Wings were successively turned over to Camp instructional cadre for a most interesting and useful day in this subject, including going through the chambers.

One of the highlights of No. 2 Camp was the supplying by "A" Wing of a guard or piquet of one officer, one sergeant and 22 men which, together with the Pipe Band, preceded to Fort Niagara, on the U.S. side of the river, and the ceremony of Retreat was conducted.

The whole of the U.S. Army post, numbering some 3500 all ranks, was turned out to witness the event, which was followed by the American troops conducting their own Retreat, according to their traditions. It was a great thrill which none of those, from McGill C.O.T.C. privileged to participate, will ever forget.

No. 3 Camp, comprising 22 Officers, and 161 Other Ranks, was held at Farnham Summer Camp under the command of Major G.F. Savage. The party left Montreal on Sunday, May 28th returning on Saturday, June 12th. Beyond a violent wind storm, which blew down the Officers' Mess tents, and damaged other marquees, the weather was good. At this camp the sharp line of demarcation between "A" and "B" Wings was dropped, the camp being conducted as one Unit, divided into platoons according to the years of training. Excellent range facilities were provided and free use made of them, and a well rounded cam period experienced. A feature of the camp was a demonstration of low flying, ground straffing and hedge hopping put on by the R.C.A.F. At the same time A-12 gave a very interesting and instructive demonstration of 2" and 3" mortars, carrier work, etc. One criticism must be made of Farnham Camp, and that is there was a constant demand for fatigues and what seemed an unnecessary guard had to be mounted in rotation with the U. of M. C.O.T.C., the only other Unit in Camp. Without wishing to argue the merits or demerits of training for guard mounting, the fact remains that men detailed for these duties miss their regular training, which, in many cases, cannot be made up, as for instance range work.

On the 12th August an Officers' Refresher Course was started preparatory to the opening of training in the Autumn. This consisted chiefly of Weapon Training, Battle First-Aid, and Methods of Instruction. From the 1st September onwards, Parades for this course were held twice a week.

Training for the season 1943-44 commenced early in October under conditions that varied considerably from any other since the beginning of the present War, in that all third and fourth year students in the technical faculties were required to train only one hour per week. Other students were required to train six hours a week for a total of 110 hours. In addition to this the hours allotted by the University were all in the day time, which for the most part, eliminated the opportunity of utilizing the extremely valuable services of the reserve Officers, and threw the whole burden on the permanent Training Staff.

Syllabi for the first and second year men were drawn up based on the first and second months of the basic training syllabus. These syllabi, copies of which are attached, were followed with really remarkable fidelity. No set programme was laid down for the one hour students who paraded generally two hours every second week, and, in the case of the Engineers III and IV, three hours every third week. Students in this one hour group numbered approximately 400.

The six-hour group, including Macdonald College, numbered approximately 450.

A very open Fall and early Winter season was experienced and full advantage was taken of this to hold a great part of the training out of doors. For instance, marching periods were enlivened by simple schemes and different formations. Very successful periods were held on Fletchers' Field in judging distance, searching ground and similar exercises. The second-year students also were given patrol instruction on the mountain, together with map work, compass marching etc. There is no question that this type of training proved interesting to the students and broke up the early drill grind.

Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8 Platoons, all first-year students, represented the Contingent at the Armistice ceremonies at Dominion Square, where their marching, steadiness and general deportment were very favorably commented upon. nd r r ttee : loard - 3 -

Following the turn of the year, when weather conditions precluded outside work, stress was largely laid on Bren Gun training, in addition to which the splendid series of U.S. Army films known as "Why We Fight", was shown to the whole Contingent. There can be no question of the high value of these pictures.

In February a platoon drill competition was held which aroused the keenest rivalry. While this competition was won by No. 15 platoon, it was only by a very small percentage, and the result on the general efficiency of the men can hardly be overestimated. Also towards the end of the month Tabloid Sports were held under the supervision of the University Physical Department, which events were very interesting and thoroughly enjoyed by all participating. Following the platoon drill, competition battle drill on the Armoury floor was introduced, to which the platoons took very kindly and advantage was taken of this feature to do a lot of mutual instruction.

An innovation was the provision of periods for the second-year students in which they were required to give ten minute lecturettes. The result may be described as a shock to the officers of the Instructional Staff, who conducted and judged these efforts: the standard was surprisingly high and gave an insight, in some cases, into the ideas and thought actuating the boys, not before afforded. In those cases where weapons was the topic chosen, it was gratifying to note the very real absorption in instruction, particularly in the Bren Gun, that had been attained.

For the third and fourth year students taking six-hour training, special courses were given in Driving and Maintenance under the auspices of the 34th Res. Group, and in Battle First Aid under District instruction. Courses were also given in Methods of Coaching by Capt. McCullogh, M.M., which should prove of great assistance in the Summer camps when firing on the open range.

The prescribed number of hours training was completed in most cases in the week ending March 11, 1944, with a few platoons carrying over to the following week.

It is not known, of course, what conditions will prevail when another year's training has to be provided for. Should, however, the training be divided into six-hour and one-hour groups, as was the case in the season just terminated, consideration should be given to the one-hour group and the training carried out in the evenings, if agreeable to the University. The reason for this is that some of the parades were too heavy for the permanent staff to handle efficiently, and if this was carried out in the evenings, the valuable services of the reserve officers could be brought into play and a more advanced and consistent syllabus followed, or perhaps special to arms training.

It is pretty much of an axiom that officers and N.C.O.s should receive special training before taking over such duties, but where the students parade by faculties by years, all are of the same level which presents a problem during the period under review, and the solution to which is not immediately apparent.

The premanent training staff is deeply indebted to the very able assistance and cooperation rendered to them by Capt. C.A.V. Barker of No. 7 Coy (Macdonald College), and Capt. R.V.V. Nicholls, who took charge of Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8 Platoons (Science). Both these officers are members of the University teaching staff. Very valuable help was also rendered by the undergraduate officers, particularly Capt. A. McT. Stalker, who commanded No. 1 Coy (Arts, Commerce & Law) and Lieut. W.W. Woodhead who put his course in platoon weapons at Long Branch to excellent use up

until the time he was transferred to the R.C.A.F. It can certainly be said that the undergraduate officers measured up to the responsibilities they assumed. Mention must also be made of Lieut. A.T. Farmer, who was associated with the permanent training staff during October, November and December, 1948, during which time he demonstrated the qualities of a very capable officer.

During the Christmas break, H.Q., M.D. No. 4 operated courses in Battle First Aid and Methods of Instruction for the Officers and Assistant Instructors of the Training Staff. The instruction then received was put to very good use in the months that followed.

REPORT ON SIGNAL TRAINING FOR THE YEAR 1943

Signal Training in 1942 reached its peak when instruction was given to approximately 900 all ranks. Our 1943 training was drastically curtailed due to three factors -

- C.O.T.C.Syllabus does not call for any signal training,
- 2. District Courses under our supervision have been dispensed with and all signals instruction is now done under Unit supervision, and
- 3. a number of Air Cadet Squadrons, which had been receiving instruction, reached a standard of training which enabled them to carry on without further assistance from us.

In addition, the McGill Squadron was granted facilities of the Wireless School, and was placed under R.C.A.F. instructors.

Our 1943 instructional work was, therefore, confined to 5 Air Cadet Squadrons and assistance given to various Reserve Units.

At present your Officeri/c Signals is on command to 34th Fd.Regt. R.C.A. conducting a course in Signals Procedure.

Lieut. W.J.C.Meredith has done an outstanding job in conducting two bilingual classes for the Air Cadets and has received high praise from R.C.A.F. Training Command for his most satisfactory work.

Sgt. L.E.Copelstone was also commended for his work in connection with the Villeray Squadron.

During the year, four of our civilian instructors joined the armed forces and at the moment we have only two who are now earrying on instruction under our supervision.

CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS

The reports which have been presented tonight by the Presidents of the various Committees have given a picture sufficiently complete of our activities as a whole that it is unnecessary for me to enlarge on them.

When training started last Fall, our main concern was how best to adapt training to a restricted programme, which, in common with all University C.O.T.C's had been stepped down to Basic.

Officer training as such having been suspended throughout Canadian Universities, with no prospect of our training leading direct to Commissioned rank meant greater effort was necessary to insure that we eliminated everything that could be dropped to advantage, but introduced a instead everything that could be dropped to advantage, but introduced a maximum of practical work and mutual instruction on a plane suited to maximum of practical work and mutual instruction on a plane suited to University men, in particular those with from one to three years training behind them, no easy task in the face of what has been the general ing behind them, no easy task in the face of what has been the general trend, affecting adversely both University C.O.T.C's Reserve Units.

The problem was tackled with vision and enthusiasm, and I have no hesitation in stating that with the close of the Headquarters Training this year, the morale of the Corps is definitely higher than it was ing this year, the morale of the Corps is definitely higher than it was last Fall, and we are approaching the Camp Period confident that the Camp programmes of training will further step-up interest and morale, Camp programmes of training will further step-up interest and morale, and no effort will be spared to take full advantage of the latitude and no effort will be spared to take full advantage of our programmes. Which the District is lending to us in the arrangement of our programmes.

Every Officer and N.C.O. in the Corps has contributed to the success achieved under these difficult conditions, and I know I speak for all the volunteer Officers when I pay tribute to the splendid work of Major Morris, our Chief Instructor, so ably assisted by his A & T Staff, including the A.I's, who threw themselves so energetically and intelligently into the work.

I feel also I should make special reference to the good work of Captain Barker and the Officers and N.C.O's associated with him in the Captain Barker and the Officers and N.C.O's associated with him in the training of the Macdonald Company, all of whom have so efficiently carried training of the Macdonald Company.

The Undergraduate Officers and N.C.O's have proved a tower of strength to the Corps as, additional to the thorough manner in which they have discharged their duties, they provided that close liaison with the Student Body which is indispensable.

As heretofore, we suffered further losses of personnel, including Senior as well as Junior Officers, and almost a complete turn-over in A.I's; and it speaks well for the Corps that with each such loss there has been available a successor capable of maintaining the same high re-

Major Rexford's transfer to the Department of Army Education removed one of the most hard-working and efficient Officers in the Corps, but in the person of Major Greenwood the Corps have the support and backing of a highly qualified and efficient 2 i/c.

When in succession we lost such outstandingly good Officers as Majors Hope and Savage as Chief Instructors, we moved up Major Eric Morris, with the results to which I have already alluded; and he will be the first with the results to which I have been in the type of Officer and A.I's we to admit how fortunate we have been in the type of District. secured for his G.O. 139 Staff through the comperation of District.

REPORT OF THE REGIMENTAL COMMITTEE

for the period 1 Jan 42 to 31 Dec 42

INTRODUCTORY

During the period under survey, the general function of this Contingent has definitely altered. Two factors have become apparent. The first of these is that so far as the students are concerned, the function of the Contingent is to bring them up to a stage of training where they are ready to enter O.T.C's at Brockville or Gordon Head. It is no longer our function to prepare them for qualifying examinations.

The second fact that has become clear is that the whole training of the student body for the Basic years and for Pre-Officer training is a progressive thing, different only in the stage of training rather than in kind. As a result of this change, the Basic and Pre-Officer training depend much upon each other, and must work in the closest co-operation.

Another definite change during the year has come as a result of new regulations re the appointment of Officers. This has resulted in narrowing the field of choice when we replace officers who gonactive or move from our establishment to other reserve units. It has led to the appointment on our establishment of a number of undergraduates who have been trained by us, and our experience with this type of appointment up to the present time has been most fortunate.

In the latter half of 1942, the U.A.T.C. took firm hold in this University, and has been an additional new factor in this year's work. The relations between the C.O.T.C. and the U.A.T.C. have continued throughout the year on the most cordial basis. At the close of 1942 the strength of the U.A.T.C. was 323.

During this fall the McGill C.O.T.C. has been represented in the Services Hockey League by a team coached by Dr. Robert Bell. On the opening night of this league the Unit paraded with Pipe and Brass Band to the Forum under such slippery conditions that marching was very difficult and at times dangerous. A very exciting game developed in which the McGill team won against Air Force by a score of five to three. At the close of the year McGill was tied with the R.C.A.F. in the lead.

McGill C.O.T.C. also had a basketball team in the Services League in the Fall, and it was well up in the standing as the season progressed.

SUNDRIES

The Unit has had a P.A.D. scheme in operation throughout the year, and has had more than one practice of putting this into effect.

The year was marked by a renewal of calls from the Princess Patricia's for reinforcement officers. As the record of personnel shows, five cadets went forward to the Patricia's during this year.

Towards the end of this year also, Colonel Neilson of the Royal Canadian Regiment interviewed selected cadets with a view to drawing officer candidates from us.

During the spring and again in the fall the Corps purchased Victory loan.

Late in this year the Honour Roll was removed from the entrance-way to the Gymnasium. This was done because it had been found practically impossible to keep it up to date in regard to enlistments and casualties, with the result the Roll, at no time gave an adquate record of the Corps contribution to the services.

Up to the close of 1942 approximately thirteen hundred have passed through this Contingent and gone on Active Service while a number of other undergraduates had gone directly into Active Service.

As at Bruno in 1941, the camp in 1942 was made up of the C.O.T.C., the third detachment of the M.R.T.B., a detachment from Sir George Williams College, with the 6th C.C.S. attached for the period of camp.

In order that training and administration of the camp might be carried out more easily, Major Greenwood and his Map Readers spent considerable time prior to the period of camp in making a large scale map of the area, four miles to the inch. A copy of this map was donated to A.12, and was much appreciated, since other maps of the area were most unsatisfactory.

For the first time during this war the C.O.T.C. moved into camp where other units were already in training. The Camp Commandant was Lt.-Col. F.S.Mathewson, D.S.O. The Commandant and his staff were just beginning their duties when we entered camp, and for the period of our camp they were the guests of our Mess.

Other units in camp at the same time were a company of the Veteran's Guard, C.A., under Major Green, M.C., and the Regiment de Chateauguay (Mit)C.A. At the end of our first week in camp the first detachment of the University of Montreal C.O.T.C. arrived. They were played into camp by our Pipe Band.

The advance party left Montreal Friday, 29th May, at 0800 hours, under the command of Major Savage. There were with him 2nd Lieut. D.D.Diplock and Sgt. B.J.Archambault. A fatigue party of fourteen reported to camp from No. 4 District Depot, and throughout the period of camp gave very satisfactory service.

The main party fell in on Sunday, 31st May at 1715 hours, and marched off, led by the Pipers, to Windsor Station. The Commanding Officer took the salute on the steps of St. George's Church. It then entrained without incident, proceeded by C.P.R. to Farnham. The Pipe Band then led the unit through Farnham into Camp.

TRAINING IN CAMP.

Reports of training will be found in the reports of "A" Wing and "B" Wing.

The six bicycles that had been purchased earlier in the spring were in camp and were found to be most useful in connection with training and administration. Groups of officers looking over ground for tactical purposes were able to proceed to the ground on these. They were well worth the money spent on them.

CANTEEN AND OFFICERS! MESS

A wet canteen was established for Other Ranks. There were also an Officers' Mess, a Sergeants' Mess and the Men's Mess. A report on the Officers' Mess will be found in the Mess Committee's report. Lieut. J.G. Brierley has submitted a report on Messing which is attached. A report on the canteen is also attached.

Partly because of experience from the previous two camps and largely because of the untiring efforts of Lieut. Brierley, messing and cooking arrangements in this camp of 1942 were excellent. There were very few causes of complaint, and once the camp was running properly, no serious changes were required in either personnel or method.

SPORTS

No special programme was arranged for Visitors' Day, because of the distance from the city and rationing requirements for gasoline and rubber. During the week-end in camp, however, quite a few of the cadets had visitors.

Saturday afternoon, 6th June, was set aside for a new type of Sports Day. Teams from the various platoons competed in some ten different events, requiring a fair average of prowess on the part of every member of the team. The scheme was one which the Camp Commandant had had experience with in England, and of which he gave us the details. It worked out extremely well, with the cadets working up an enthusiasm as the afternoon progressed. In the final scoring Platoon 18 of the M.R.T.B. ranked first, and Platoon 3 of the C.O.T.C. ranked second. A detailed report on this event is to be found in Lieut. MacKay's report on Sports and Physical Training.

On the day we arrived in Camp, squads arrived sent out by Captain Bowie to put up backstops for the period of camp. These were used to a considerable extent and at times were found very useful by other units in the camp. One difficulty with baseball and volleyball was that there was considerable difficulty in camp about getting the hay cut. It was finally cut during the second week in camp.

The final sports event of the camp period was a rather suddenly arranged Tug of War with the University of Montreal C.O.T.C. This took place on the night of the 12th June, while work was going on in connection with the breaking up of camp. In spite of the fact, a large group gathered, and there was great excitement while the McGill team succeeded in pulling the University of Montreal team over twice in succession. There followed much celebration and good fellowship.

On Sunday, 7th June, the Officers carried out their shoot. Owing to a breakdown in the arrangements about the Range, the shoot which had been planned for Saturday and Sunday, had to be carried out entirely on Sunday afternoon. It was therefore restricted to rifle shooting, and in this Lieut. Duff carried off the laurels, and so became the holder of the Morris Cup for the year 1942-43.

During the week-end several of the officers who were unable to be in Camp for the full period were visitors. The Commanding Officer came out on Saturday night, also Major Nicholson, Lieut. Nash and Dr. Foote.

CHURCH PARADE

The Church Parade was held in Camp on Sunday morning, when Major Shore came out to conduct the services for the Protestants, and Captain Levi to conduct the services for the Jewish members. The Roman Catholics paraded for their service with the Regiment de Chateauguay. At the Protestant service the C.O. read the lesson. The singing was led by a choir composed of the cadets of Sir George Williams College detachment. A group of the Veterans' Guard and of the 6th C.C.S. joined our parade for the service.

HEALTH

The health in camp was generally good. One serious accident resulting in a broken leg and several minor ones were the only mishaps. On 11th June, however, there was an epidemic of diarrhoea, and for a time the Medical Officer gave the order that drinking water must be boiled, resulting in considerable hardship, since containers for holding the water after it was boiled were not available. However, this order was later withdrawn, and the cause of the epidemic was located elsewhere.

MUSTER PARADE

for the unit was held on Thursday, 15th June.

During the period of camp General Panet, District Officer Commanding M.D.4 paid a visit, and also Brigadier Perry, Assistant to the Director-General of the Reserve Army.

The Unit left camp on the morning of Saturday, 13th June. Orders were given that we leave our canvas standing. The unit marched to Farnham Station, proceeded by C.N.R. to Bonaventure Station. We then formed up on the platform, and marched to the Armoury with the pipers leading. Cpl. Janet Morrisey marched in the parade. The salute was taken at the McGill Union by the Commanding Officer and the Principal; Colonel Magee and Lt.-Col. Morrisey were on the reviewing stand.

Report of Officers' and Cadets' Mess Committee McGill University Contingent (148th Bn. C.E.F.) Canadian Officers Training Corps, for the period January 1st 1942 to December 31st 1942.

Lt.-Colonel J.M.Morris and Officers of the Contingent:

During the year the Mess Committee held monthly meetings at which financial statements were examined and approved: also reports on stocks and outstanding tickets.

The Mess has been open with service available daily except Sundays throughout the year. Occasions on which special entertainment has been provided are noted below.

On March 27th the Annual Meeting of the Contingent Officers was held: about 50 attended. Refreshments were served.

On February 21st a cocktail party was held in the afternoon and a dance in the evening. This represented the entertainment offered the Rifle and Gymnastic Teams sent to compete with McGill by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

On March 11th the Officers Annual Dimmer was held. It was attended by Inspector-General of Eastern Canada, Major-General Tremblay and Brigadier-General E.deB. Panet, D.O.C., M.D. No. 4. Those present totalled 73.

On May 28th was held a dinner in honour of the Governors of McGill University and the Military Committee: about 75 attended.

On November 15th tea was served after the annual Church Parade. This was attended by the Officers and their wives and invited guests to the number of 150. About 1,000 cadets were served with hot soup and crackers in the Gymnasium and 100 cadets from Macdonald College, Ste. Anne de Bellevue, were given sandwiches, soup etc. in the B.W. & F. Room.

During the year the privileges of the Mess were granted on several occasions to McGill University and related organizations. These included the Engineering and Medical Ball held on March 20th.

For the period of the Summer camp in June the Mess services for Officers only were transferred to Farnham.

Overleaf is the statement of the financial condition of the Officers' and Cadets' Mess as at December 31st 1942. This statement has been approved by the Contingent auditors.

Re - Dress Committee.

I have the honour to submit on behalf of the Dress Committee, the following report for 1942:

1. Coveralls

During the month of November cadets in "A" Wing were issued with coveralls to save battle dress when engaged in outdoor or strenuous indoor training.

2. Caps, Winter Melton Cloth

These were issued to all cadets at the beginning of December.

3. White "Flashes"

These were issued in October and November to cadets in "A" Wing who had pledged themselves to go on Active Service not later than graduation. These took the form of a white lining for the peak of the F.S. Cap and a 2-inch white square worn under the badge of the winter cap. A $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch white loop is worn at the base of the shoulder strap on battle dress blouse and greatcoat.

4. Red and white "Flashes"

An attempt was made to obtain authority for all cadets not wearing the white "flash" to wear a distinctive red "flash" with a white edge (the McGill colours) on the F.S. cap: authority was refused by Headquarters, M.D. No. 4.

5. Boots for Harvesting.

By permission of N.D.H.Q. all those who took part in the harvesting operations during October were issued with army boots, prior to the beginning of the training season.

6. Officers' Dress Allowance

On the recommendation of the Committee to the Senior Officers and with the approval of the Commanding Officer the dress allowance for officers of the Contingent other than A. & T. Staff was increased from \$100.00 to \$125.00, the \$10.00 allowance for summer uniforms remaining unchaged.

This was due to the fact that the original sum had been based on a very advantageous arrangement made with a local wholesale firm for a large number of uniforms. This arrangement was no longer in force, since no group of officers of a sufficient number had recently been commissioned in the Contingent at one time. In consequence, newly appointed officers had been forced to buy their uniforms at prevailing retail prices, which had risen due to the war. This increase was made retro-active to 1st June 1942.

7. Free Issues to Officers

During the year the Commanding Officer authorized the issue at Contingent expense to Officers other than A. & T. Staff.

REPORT OF MUSKETRY COMMITTEE

for the year ending 31st Dec. 1942

During the year under review, three Musketry Competitions were held as under:

1. McGill C.O.T.C. versus Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

In January 1942, correspondence was exchanged between the M.I.T. Rifle Team and Major Greenwood in connection with the possibility of holding a competitive shoot. After an interchange of letters it was decided that the shoot should be held on February 21st, and that the general arrangements should be as follows:

On the morning of the 21st, a meeting was held to arrange the final details of the match, which commenced at 1430 hours. It was found that the M.I.T. had only seven members, and the McGill team was arranged accordingly. During the morning prior to the match, the M.I.T. team had an opportunity of firing with the S.M.L.E. rifle, and the McGill cadets with the M.I.T. match 22's.

The Cadets of the Contingent found shooting with the M.I.T. rifles in the standing position very difficult, although good scores were made in the prone and kneeling. The final results gave the McGill Contingent a win by 0.41 percent.

After the match, the visiting team were entertained at cocktails in the Mess, and later in the evening a dance was held, also in the Mess.

The Scarlet Key Society arranged for girls from the Royal Victoria College as partners for the M.I.T. students. A gym team from Boston Tech. was in competition with McGill at the same time, so that a considerable number of M.I.T. undergraduates were present at the dance.

The very grateful thanks of the Contingent are due to Major Heward and Lieut. Brewer for their untiring efforts to make the shoot a success, and to many of the other voluntary Musketry Instructors, also to the Scarlet Key Society of McGill University for the arrangements made to entertain the guests of the Contingent.

2. Annual Competition for Morris Cup

It was intended to arrange that the annual Officers' Competition for the Morris Cup (Rifle and Revolver Shoot) should be held during the annual training at Farnham Camp. Arrangements were made to obtain the use of the outdoor ranges on the first Saturday in camp, but owing to some slip-up in staff work, it was impossible to hold the shoot on that date. Consequently, the attendance on the Sunday following was not 100%.

In spite of the fact that all the Officers of the Corps were not competing, the score made by Lieut. (now Captain) E.C.Duff was very creditable (53 out of a possible 60). Owing to lack of arrangements, no provision had been made for the revolver shoot, and it was intended to cancel the Farnham shoot and hold the regular annual competition at Bruno in the autumn if an opportunity occurred. As this did not prove to be the case, it was decided that the Morris Cup should be awarded to Lieut. E.C.Duff on the Rifle Shhoting only.

Subject - Messing at Summer Camp, Farnham, 31st May to 13th June 1942

Officers' Messing 1.

The details of the Officers' Messing were handled by R. Dumesnil under the supervision of Sgt. L.M. Harding. Dumesnil had as Mess Waiters four boys from the Shawbridge Boys' Farm. These, with the assistance of the Officers! Ante Room waiter, Years, were able to wait adequately upon the Officers during meal times.

2. Sergeants! Messing.

The Sergeants! Mess was operated by C.S.Milburne under the direct control of Sgt. Harding. While Milburne was adequate as a cook, he should not be employed again, as he is difficult to handle, is usually drunk, and always draws more supplies than the numbers he is serving warrant.

Men's Messing. 3.

The Men's Messing was carried on from three kitchens, under Sgt. Harding's guidance. This year an innovation was introduced. All meats were prepared in one kitchen, all vegetables in a second, and all pastries and flour dishes were prepared in a third. The pastry kitchen sent half of its dishes to the meat kitchen, and half to the vegetable kitchen, and the vegetable and meat kitchens exchanged half of their dishes. Serving was conducted on all items from the meat and vegetable kitchens only, no meals being served from the pastry kitchen.

Bread, butter, jam and similar staples were placed on tables in two double marquees where the cadets messed. Tea, coffee and milk urns were also placed in the marquees, and were served by civilian help. All other dishes were served to the cadets from the two serving kitchens. The cadets were paraded to meals by platoons, and no cadet was allowed to obtain a meal (except when parading with his platoon) unless he had permission from an Officer.

The system of preparing meals in the manner described proved most successful. It eliminated a great deal of waste, and it permitted the cooks to concentrate on a few dishes at a time. The alternative, where each cookhouse prepares the entire meal, is impracticable where equipment is scanty and ample civilian help is not available.

Supplies for the Camp were partly drawn from the R.C.A.S.C. and partly obtained by Corps purchase. All perishable supplies were handled by Desjardins, Master Butcher, who divided them into the quantities required by the Officers' Sergeants' and Men's Messes. Non-perishable supplies were kept in a separate storehouse, and were distributed under the supervision of Sgt. Harding. It was found practicable to issue supplies prior to each meal, and not just once a day, as refrigeration throughout the camp was inadequate.

It is strongly recommended that the system of Messing adopted this year be followed in future camps. The cadets were well fed on army rations, and the cost of additional milk, butter, tomato sauce, sausages and other additions to the menus exceeded by very little one dollar per cadet. The success of the messing was almost entirely due to Sgt. Harding, who was in direct charge of all civilian personnel.

One problem which caused great difficulty was that of garbage. Under existing regulations, garbage had to be divided into (a) swill, (b) tin cans and paper cartons that might be salvaged, (c) bottles and (4) dry rubbish that could be burned. The camp was most inadequately supplied with cans, and the cadets did not appreciate the necessity of segregating the various types of rubbish and garbage. It is recommended that in future camps the cadets receive at least one lecture on Camp Administration (dealing particularly with disposal of garbage, grease traps, flies and sanitary conditions in Mess tents and kitchens) during the first day at camp. It is also recommended that W.O(s and N.C.O's should receive, prior to Camp, at least one lecture on the necessity for parading men to cookhouses by platoons, for maintaining order in the Mess tents, and of ensuring cleanliness in and about the tents.

Beer will not be sold between 1200-1230 hours

- 3. Defaulters will be excluded from the Canteen except between 1630-1730 hours (K.R. 1053).
- 4. Cadets attending Hospital and doing Light Duty will be excluded from the Canteen unless written permission of the Medical Officer has been given. (K.R. 1054).
- 5. Civilian employees will be allowed to use the Canteen during the following hours:

Daily - 1100-1200 hours, 1530-1630 hours.

Sundays - 1530-1630 hours.

Beer will not be sold between 1100-1230 hours.

- 6. The Sale of Beer by the bottle for consumption outside this Canteen is expressly prohibited. (Rules for Mess, Para 46).
- 7. The Sale of Wines and Spirits is prohibited in the Canteen at any time, and no one is allowed to bring them into the tents. (Rules for Messes 47).

SUMMER CAMP SPORTS PROGRAMME

AND PHYSICAL TRAINING.

(a). SPORTS PROGRAMME

A tentative Baseball and volley Ball programme, prepared for the C.O.T.C. Summer Camp, provided for inter-platoon competition. Owing to the undermentioned series of factors the programme never got into full swing.

The first few days were, of course, taken up with the Camp getting settled in, then followed a series of Guard duties, night manoeuvres and other similar events which made it impossible to keep to any fixed schedule.

Facilities, however, were provided for both Baseball and Volley Ball and informal games were played througout the Camp period. In addition, sports equipment included a Soccer Ball and Rugby Football, both of which were used extensively in the evening.

A Tug-of-War was fought out between the M.R.T.B. and the C.O.T.C. with no conclusive results, the M.R.T.B. winning the first pull with their first team and the C.O.T.C. winning the second pull with their second team. A grand Tug-of-War, with twenty-five men on each side was pulled between the University of Montreal C.O.T.C. and the combined M.R.T.B. - C.O.T.C. forces. From this tussle the McGill combined Unit emerged victorious in two successive pulls.

On Saturday the 6th of June a successful combined M.R.T.B. - C.O.T.C. Sports Day was held following a programme suggested by Colonel Mathewson, Camp Commandant. Ninety Cadets in all participated in ten varied events, and the Meet was attended by about one-half the Camp and the majority of the Officers. Details of the programme and of the results were filed with the Camp Commandant for his information and a copy thereof filed in the Unit records.

As suggested in the original programme submitted, it is not advisable to attempt any forced programme of Sports on the Cadets in their spare time, and from observation and comments throughout the Camp period it appears clear to the undersigned that any attempt to enforce a fixed programme of Sports would have failed. It is, however, suggested that a Sports Day should be included in any syllabus either in spare time on a day set aside or allocating a specific drill period for such purposes. It is felt that the novelty of the Sports Programme suggested is mainly responsible for the complete success which the Field Day enjoyed and it is accordingly suggested that the programme carried out this year be used as a basis for any future Camps that may be held.

(b) PHYSICAL TRAINING.

Owing to necessary interference by other subjects on the syllabus, no adequate conclusions can be drawn as to the value of the Physical Training Programme suggested prior to the commencement of Camp. Of the ten day periods set aside for Physical Training only three were completed. The undersigned took the opportunity of supervising each Platoon in its Physical Training exercises at least once and the conclusions drawn are:

- (t) That the Physical Training Periods proved interesting and amusing to the Cadets:
- (ii) That the Cadets obtained a considerable relaxation:
- (iii) That the last period in the day was a satisfactory time in which to hold such exercises, as these exercises both proved of some beneficial physical value, and at the same time provided relaxation for otherwise tired and tensed muscles.

It is accordingly suggested that in view of the paramount importance placed by Military Authorities on Physical fitness, a serious effort in future Camp periods be made not to interfere with the regular Physical Training Programme.

REPORT OF C.O.T.C. 1942

- At the beginning of the year, approximately 170 Cadeta at McGill and 19 at Macdonald College were following A Syllabus. Major O.B.Rexford was Officer i/c Training, with Major J.C.Hope Chief Instructor, and Major G.F.Savage Instructor. 151 Cadets wrote the examinations 144 passed. The A Syllabus training was discontinued by N.D.H.Q., and those who had been successful were given no credit for their work until near the close of the year when A Syllabus was accepted as the equivalent of B Syllabus for Reserve Army candidates in certain cases.
- 2. Summer camp was held at Farnham, 31 May 13 June with 115 cadets in attendance. Training was carried out in all the usual subjects, and in addition, much time was given to route marching, motor cycling, tactical schemes and demolitions. Due to the courtesy of the 2nd Montreal Regiment in supplying an 18 pdr. gun, a certain amount of specialist training in Artillery was carried out under direction of Captain (now Major) E.B.Charters, and M.G. training was given on one week-end by Captain P.Bruneau and his M.G. Officers.

Outstanding events during the camp period included a very complete and exceedingly damp tactical exercise carried out by all the cadets under the supervision of Major E.del.Greenwood and Major J.B.Brown, during which Major J.B.Brown and Captain E.H.Kent gave an unrehearsed demonstration of commando tactics to an inoffensive and unappreciative member of the A. & T. Staff, vocal efforts by the camp songster, particularly in his rendering of Take me back to dear Old Blighty, and unending and bitter harassing of the Mess Committee with respect to hours of closing.

The Staff at A.12, the Camp Headquarters Staff, the Regiment de Chateauguay (Mit.), the Veterans' Guard and Lieut. Richards, the Camp Supply Officer, were extremely co-operative and helpful at all times.

- 4. 35 students completed their air training course in the spring. Part of this training was given by C.O.T.C. instructors, part by R.C.A.F. personnel and part by the Staff of McGill University.
 - 5. Four District Courses, as under, were completed and one, which began in November, is still in progress.

- 6. All these courses above, as well as the C.O.T.C. work, were carried out by the regular volunteer staff of the Contingent, under the supervision of Majors Rexford, Hope and Savage.
- 7. In October, the C.O.T.C. was re-organized into two wings - "A" Wing, pre-officer training, for approximately 404 cadets, under Major G.F. Savage, and "B" Wing, basic training, under Major J.C. Hope. Training started on 26th October, but was hindered to some extent by the Harvesters' Excursion. Parades were held twice a week, on Monday and Wednesday, three forty-five minute periods each night, starting at 2000 hours. Training was confined to three subjects - Fieldcraft, under the supervision of Major E.C. Morris, Weapon Training, under Major C.G. Heward, and Map Reading under Major E.del. Greenwood. Three Saturday efternoon parades were held before the snow came in the area of Loyola College. During these periods exercises were held in Fieldcraft, Judging Distances, Patrols, Searching Ground, Section Formations and Individual Stalking.
- 8. Macdonald College Company was also organized in two wings. "A" Wing, 68 cadets, was organized and trained by Lieut. Dumaresq, and the N.C.O's of "B" Wing.
- 9. In order to give the cadets practice in handling groups of men, no permanent N.C.O's have been appointed except C.S.M's and C.Q.M.S'S. Cadets are appointed each week to the various ranks, such as Coy Comd, 2 i/c, Pl Comd, Pl Sgt, Section Leaders, and carry out the instruction and drill under the supervision of the Contingent Officers.

The Map work was made more practical. Very little time is spent in lectures, and a great deal in actual practice.

A great amount of time is also spent in getting the cadets used to the various weapons in use in the Army. Thanks to the co-operation of M.D.4, we are able to give a complete course in "Protection against Gas". The lectures in Military Law, formerly given by Lieut. J.G.Brierley, now overseas, are being handled by Captain R.dew.MacKay.

4. Re-Organization

In view of the revised regulations governing the qualification of Officers it was decided to change the organization of C.O.T.C. and M.R.T.B. and to include all students in training in the C.O.T.C. Urder the new set-up the C.O.T.C. was divided into "A" and "B" Wings.

nd r r ttee : 30ard "B" Wing trainins covers the subjects in the first and second months of the Standard Basic Training Syllabus 1941 in so far as possible.

To have a complete record it was arranged with the University that every male student be required to register for militaryntraining regardless of whether he was to take the training or not. The only exceptions to this rule being the students in the upper years of Medecine and Dentistry who have already been enlisted in the Medical and Dental Corps.

Enrolment was complicated by the fact that over 400 students took part in harvesting operations at the request of the Dominion Government. The period of these operations varied considerably so that odd groups kept returning for as much as three weeks after the return of the main group on 2nd November.

Starting the week of 1st November transfers to "A" Wing commenced, which continued intermittently for several weeks, and from the beginning of training up to the 1st December applications to transfer to U.A.T.C. were still being received.

The subject of enrolment and transfers has been dealt with at some length, because it has been a weak point in the organization and should be the subject of further study and improvement.

6. Training

Training commenced on Wednesday, 14th October.
"B" Wing was divided into seven companies, and lettered
A to F and Macdonald. A, B, C and D Coys parade for
two hours three times a week - E and F Coys parade for
three hours twice a week. Macdonald College Coy parade
at Ste. Annes for two hours three times a week.

The syllabus for intra-mural training for these Coys is attached hereto at Appendix B.

It would be well to note here with respect to Macdonald Coy, that owing to Major Cameron's and his Officers' increased academic responsibilities and their inability to carry on the military training, the entire task has been taken over by the instructional personnel of "B" Wing - including the "A" Wing training.

The platoons of "B" Wing coys were divided according to training into B l and B 2. B l Platoons were composed of those who had no previous military training. B 2 Platoons were composed of those who had had one year of training with the M.R.T.B. or the equivalent in some other unit. The Syllabus at Appendix "B" shows the differences in the training.

As at 19th December (at which date the University closed for the Christmas holiday) approximately half the syllabus had been covered.

7. Inspections

Between 10th and 19th December all companies in "B" Wing were inspected by Major O.B.Rexford, Second in Command.

8. P.A.D.

All companies are now organized for Air Defence and practice evacuations will be carried out at irregular intervals.

9. Musketry

All B 2 platoons have completed T's.O.E.T. and nearly all have completed their range practices.

B l Platoons have nearly all completed these tests and will commence their firing in the new year.

To stimulate interest in this branch of training the Musketry Shields presented by Major C.G.Heward will be awarded to the best B 1 and B 2 platoons.

In addition the C.O. has authorized a cash prize of War Savings Certificates to the best shots and the wearing of "Marksman's" Badges to the individuals obtaining the highest scores in both B l and B 2 platoons.

14. Changes in Regulations

Frequent changes have been made in the Training Regulations during the last fifteen months. At the beginning of the 1941-42 season, Senate ruled that all physically fit male British subjects were to take training, except those in the clinical years of Medecine and Dentistry.

In October 1942 the Principal ruled that 2nd year Medicals were doing clinical work and should be exempt from training.

On the 21st October, the new "Consolidated War Services Regulations (1942)" came into effect which rules that all male students irrespective of nationality were to train.

This was soon followed by a list of classes who were to be exempted. Some of the more important groups being citizens of neutral countries, U.S. citizens holding Reserve commissions in the U.S. forces, theology students, and research workers whose activities were furthering the war effort.

On 21st December the regulations regarding 1st and 2nd year Medical students were revised, and a syllabus largely based on R.C.A.M.C. advanced training was put into force. This syllabus contains subjects common to all arms, which is being undertaken by "A" Wing, consequently all 1st year Medicals were transferred from "B" Wing at the year end.

MUSKETRY INSTRUCTION

Report for 1942.

1. Match with Massachusetts Institute of Technology

An indoor range competition between teams selected from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston, and the Contingent took place on the 20th February, 1942. Candidates for the McGill team began practices early in January. These were continued until the date of the match. Eliminations from the candidates were made from time to time. Mr. E.G.Brewer acted as chief coach for the McGill team, and was ably assisted by Mr. C.G.Palin, who was in charge of the records of the practices and the match.

The match was divided into two parts. In one part both teams used the McGill rifles (S.M.L.E., small bore 22 with open back sight), and the Canadian Army indoor targets, the practices being five rounds grouping, five rounds application and five rounds snapshooting (6 seconds exposure): all practices fired at 75 feet and in the prone position. In the other part the teams used the American rifles (Winchesters, Remingtons, etc. with peep sights) and American gallery targets. The practices in this part were each ten rounds application, one practice prone, another kneeling, and another standing.

The McGill team won in the first practice: the M.I.T. team in the second practice, and in the aggregate which was scored on a percentage basis the McGill team won by four-tenths of one per cent.

A cocktail party and a dance were held after the match.

2. Musketry Instruction to Air Cadets

During the months of February and March, at the request of the Officer Commanding the Westmount Air Cadets, the instructors gave a series of instructional classes in elementary musketry, and conducted indoor range practices, for classes of the Air Cadets of that Contingent.

3. Corps of Military Staff Clerks

A request was received from Headquarters of M.D.4 to give indoor range practice to the personnel of the Corps of Military Staff Clerks at Headquarters, M.D.4.

This was commenced, but it was found that many of the firers required preliminary musketry instruction, and classes for this purpose were organized and carried out, after which the range practices were completed.

4. Offier of services to M.D.4.

As the services of the Musketry Instructional Cadre were not extensively required during the early part of the year, an offer was made to Headquarters of M.D.4 to make those services available for the instruction of Instructors for other units in the district. This offer was apparently welcomed at the outset by Headquarters, but no steps were taken in that connection for several months, although the matter was taken up on several occasions with the appropriate officers. The offer was therefore withdrawn.

5. Instructional classes in Light Machine Gun (Bren) for the Instructors.

Classes were held in the early part of the year at which the instructors were given courses on the Light Machine Gun by Sergeant Myles, Sergeant Palmer and Corporal Bradley. These classes were very useful and of great benefit to the instructors. They were followed by a series of mutual instruction classes continued by the instructors themselves.

6. Vickers Machine Gun Instruction

During April and May the instructors also took a course of classes in Vickers Machine Gun mechanism, stripping and assembling, under Lieutenant L.T.C.Beveridge, who had offered his services in this regard. The lessons were found to be most useful.

7. Expedition to C.A. (A) T.C. No. A-12, Farnham

Arrangements were made with Lt.-Col. A.T.Howard, O.C. C.A. (A) T.C. No. A-12, Farnham, to proceed to that Training Centre, and eleven instructors went out for one Sunday in the month of May and spent the day examining the various weapons, L.M.G. anti-tank gun, 20 and 30 mortar, towny gun, etc., and firing on the ranges. Most instructive and useful practices were held, and the reception given to the instructors by all concerned at the Training Centre was most cordial.

8. McGill C.O.T.C. Camp, Farnham, - June 1942.

Eleven instructors attended at the C.O.T.C. Camp at Farnham. Preliminary instruction was given on June 3rd and June 4th to those cadets who had not previously been at camp, and range practices were carried out on June 5th, during which 92 cadets carried out five practices of five rounds each, one practice being fired at 100 yards and four at 200. The butt parties were supplied by the cadets. On June 7th and June 8th two instructors attended at camp and carried out range practices for 16 cadets who had not fired on June 4th.

end or ttee r Board ttee 9. Course for instructors at Small Arms Training Centre, Long Branch, Ontario.

Arrangements were made for the instructors to attend a special course at Long Branch, and ten instructors did so for one week commending October 3rd. A special and intensive course was arranged by the Officer Commanding the Training Centre, and it proved to be most beneficial to all those taking part. They were brought up to date on the latest methods of small arms training, were assisted in the preparation of syllabi, and received most valuable help from all concerned.

10. Autumn and Winter Training

Since the beginning of the autumn term the instructors have been giving instruction in small arms training to numbers 1, 2 and 3 Companies, and this instruction is still continuing. The weapons so far covered are the rifle (S.M.L.E. and S.17) and Light Machine Gun, with brief demonstration with the anti-tank rifle and with the Reising Gun.

11. During the term a special course of musketry and small arms training was given to a class of officers from the Reserve Battalions in the District.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SIGNALS COURSE

Conducted by Signals Wing of McGill University Contingent C.O.T.C. for Military District No. 4.

At the request of the District Signals Officer, the Signals Wing of the C.O.T.C. was asked to conduct their third Signals Course - Part I. (Signal Training) All Arms.

Captain W.Bowie, i/c Signals, felt that owing to the commitments with the Air Cadets, there would not be sufficient instructors available, but after a consultation with the Second in Command and Captain Warner it was decided to undertake this work.

Plans were immediately made - Captain Bowie taking over the supervision of the R.V.C. Training and the Air Cadets -Captain Warner put in charge of the course and relieved of all other duties.

Owing to the loss of three excellent Instructors who had gone on active service, Captain Warner asked Major Rexford to secure the services of L/Sgt. H.W.Hiscocks of the 4th Bn. Black Watch of Canada and this being arranged successfully, preparations were completed to commence the Course on the 19th, October 1942.

The armoury of the Canadian Grenadier Guards was selected for holding the course and all their Signal facilities were placed at the disposal of our instructors.

The Course was offficially opened by the D.S.O., M.D. No. 4 on Monday evening, 19th October at 2000 hours. Eight officers and 40 other ranks were registered, representing 12 Units from the district.

The Course ran for a period of eight weeks from 19th October to 18th December, inclusive. Parades were on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights from 2000 hours to 2200 hours.

Some 20 lectures were given covering all subjects in the syllabus: reading and sending on Lamp and Buzzer was given sufficient time to bring the class up to the required speed and practical demonstrations and practical work took up the balance of the time.

and or tree r Board ttee A special feature of the Course was the Sunday morning voluntary parades which were held every Sunday during the Course attended by 80% of the class. This speaks very well for the interest taken and was in no small measure a factor in the success of the school.

During the Course, the class was inspected by the D.S.O., by Col. Rolland of the C.G.G., by Major Rexford of McGill C.O.T.C. and by Brigadier-General Penet.

The work of the Instructors was excellent, particularly that of L/Sgt. Hiscocks, who was called on to do extra duties owing to the illness of Sgt. Smyth for the latter part of the course.

At the conclusion of the Course a dinner was given by the whole class to the instructional staff with the D.S.O. as a special guest. This was the first time on record such a thing had taken place and spoke well for the enthusiasm of the class.

The D.S.O. Captain Pauline, thanked Captain Warner for the work done and gave an instructive address to the class. Captain Warner thanked the Instructors for their excellent work and after some entertainment the course concluded.

The results of the final exams have since been received and were very satisfactory to the D.S.O. - 44 passing out of a total of 48. The highest marks on the written paper was 95% (the best ever secured). Most of the class passed the reading, sending and practical tests 100%.

General.

In March 1941 about 600 cadets sat for examination "Common To All Arms" and Special to Arms, with much more satisfactory results than in December 1940, as under:-

It was decided that the cadets generally needed a good deal of smartening up as a result of their indoor work during the winter, and it was agreed that the work between April and the date of going to Camp should consist mainly of drill, Musketry and practical work.

The issue of Canadian Army Training Memorandum No. 1, followed by the establishment of an Officers Training Centre at Brockville, suggested the strong probability that from now on the function, if not the operation, of the Contingent might be materially affected, particularly as we realized that our subsequent training was likely to be confined strictly to Undergratuates and Graduates, which meant that recruits for the C.O.T.C. would consist largely, if not exclusively, of ex-M.R.T.B. members.

On April 18th a Refresher Course in drill for Officers and N.C.O's of the Contingent was started and carried on for four weeks.

Arrangements were made with M.D.4 for all members of the M.R.T.B. within the age limits of 20 to 24 to attend two weeks Camp. They were sent in three detachments, as follows:-

nand cor er ittee er Board ittee The Camp at Three Rivers was conducted under very favourable circumstances, and the members of the M.R.T.B. were attested in the C.O.T.C. for the period during which they attended Camp. They were comfortably accommodated in a building in the Training Centre, and facilities for shooting, field craft, P.A.G. etc. were most satisfactory.

At Mount St. Bruno the Detachment was under canvas, and carried out the same training as the other detachments at Three Rivers. Shooting had to be carried out at Mount St. Bruno with Ross rifles.

Owing to the age restriction, it was decided to allow those members of the M.R.T.B. under 21 and over 24 who are of good officer material to attest in the C.O.T.C. and become members of the Corps.

From April 8th it was decided that no further cadets were to be accepted for the C.O.T.C. until the autumn. It was decided that this year Camp for everyone should be obligatory, and orders were issued to this effect.

During April it was decided that an allowance of ten dollars be given to all Officers on the establishment toward the purchase of summer drill uniform, on somewhat the same basis as for the serge uniform.

On April 23rd the Regimental Committee approved the investment of \$20,000.00 of Corps Funds in War Loan Bonds.

In May instructions were received from M.D.4 to s.o.s. all members of the C.O.T.C. who were not graduates or undergraduates. The Commanding Officer and all officers in the Corps felt very strongly about this ruling. These cadets, while neither graduates nor undergraduates, had been selected and attested in the Corps, on a basis which the Commanding Officer had frankly discussed previously with National Defence Headquarters and M.D.4. The Officers of the Corps were of the opinion that as it was the intention to take to camp, and submit for practical examination, only those cadets in that category who had already passed either their Common to all Arms, their Special to Arms, or both, to date, that an exception should be made, and that the authority be granted, conditional upon adherence for the future to the rule that only graduates and Undergraduates be attested and trained.

The Commanding Officer took full responsibility for the situation as it existed, and with his Officers considered that it would be not only a breach of faith, but would unfairly discourage, if it did not actually lose to the National War Effort, some excellent Officer Material.

With the consent of M.D.4 the Commanding Officer visited Ottawa, and obtained authority for these cadets to complete their course as planned, and it is a matter of satisfaction to record that not one of these cadets failed to pass satisfactorily.

nand for er ittee er Board ittee It was felt that a large number of cadets who had obtained qualification since the beginning of the war and who had not entered Reserve or Active Service Units might be interested in continuing their connection with the Contingent. It was decided that the formation of a Reserve Company parading once a week might be a means of keeping these men in touch with the Contingent, and after having communicated with a large number of them, it was further decided to hold a parade at 2100 hours on the 30th May, with a view to the formation of such a company: Major J.G.Nicholson, M.C., being appointed Officer Commanding this group.

Subsequently, it was found that about 35 only out of the 75 who paraded were interested in going Active Service. It was decided that no time should be wasted on any of the others. Parades were inaugurated for the 35 in question, but the attendance proved so unsatisfactory that this plan was terminated.

On May 17th-18th a Bivouac Scheme and Map Reading
Exercise was held in the vicinity of St. Sauveur. Approximately
9 officers and 39 cadets attended. The weather was very cold
the first day, but favourable on May 18th. The cadets bivouacked
in the open and cooked their own food, and on the 18th spent
the day on practical field sketching. Instruments for this work
were generally borrowed from McGill University. The cadets
attending were members of "H" Company, who had failed Common to
all Arms and were repeating their preparation for this examination.

The success of this operation was such that Major Greenwood's suggestion that the Corps should invest some \$1200 in the purchase of Plane Tables, Abney Levels and some extra Compasses was adopted, and a second Bivouac Scheme of the same nature was carried out with equal success between the 31st May and 1st June.

On May 28th the Regimental Committee authorized the investment of \$\$,000.00 in War Loan from the McGill Graduates Society Fund. A resolution was passed to rent a Safety Deposit Box for holding these and the Bonds previously purchased, and that any two of the following Officers should have access to and control of the contents of this box:-

On June 11th Principal James unveiled a plaster allegorical group sculptured by Cadet Martineau of the McGill C.O.T.C., to typify the transition from student to soldier. It is the intention eventually to have the group cast in bronze, but it was decided to defer this step until after the war.

The Contingent annual Camp was held at Mount St. Bruno from 15th to 25th June: for further details see below.

In July an invitation was received from Dr. L. Pidgeon, asking the C.O.T.C. to consider the Erskine American United Church as their Church, and stating that the annual Church Parades should be held there. This invitation was gratefully accepted, and our Padre, Rev. G.G.D. Kilpatrick, D.S.O., M.C., was instructed to make the necessary arrangements accordingly.

nand or er ittee er Board ittee On July 30-31 the Commanding Officer attended a meeting in Kingston regarding the future of the Canadian Officers Training Corps. He reported that Colonel Lawson, D.M.T., had agreed to recommend that C.O.T.C's continue to give Special to Arms training, and that due credit be given to cadets attending Brockville for such training. He also considered that as a result of the discussions there that the M.R.T.B. would in future be treated as a Reserve Unit as regards clothing, equipment, etc.

Colonel Magee had given him the Syllabus of the Artillery training given at Brockville, and asked him to state whether the C.O.T.C. could train in accordance with this Syllabus.

This subject of training was fully discussed, and it was the unanimous opinion that while we were prepared to conduct an Artillery, or any other Special to Arms Course for the benefit of cadets obligating themselves for Active Service, that such training should receive adequate credit at Brockville, and this was later dealt with in full detail by the Commanding Officer, at the meeting called by Colonel Girard on September 19th, later dealt with in this report.

On the week-end of August 22nd-24th thirty Officers and N.C.O's took part in a trip to Pointe Platon. The party proceeded to Quebec by boat (C.S.L.), and motored from there to Platon. They bivouacked for the night of the 23rd after having held a night march by compass.

On the 24th, owing to inclement weather, the Map Reading Exercises which had been contemplated had to be cancelled, but a Movement by Road Scheme was held, which was instructive. All members of the party returned by motor car to Montreal on the evening of August 24th. Those taking part in the expedition are much indebted to Captain and Mrs. A.J. deLotbiniere for their hospitality.

About the middle of September confirmation was received from Ottawa that the M.R.T.B. would be treated as a Reserve Unit, as far as clothing and medical attention was concerned, and that all members, regardless of age, would be allowed to go to Camp. Their training was to be carried out in a progressive hasis. The first two years at the University would cover elementary Basic Training and the third year would correspond to one month Advanced Training. The second month Advanced Training, however, would have to be done at a regular Training Centre.

In September, Major A.T. Field, M.C., Officer Commanding M.R.T.B., left the Corps to report as Second in Command at the Mechanic's Training School, London, Ont. About this time most of the Officers of the M.R.T.B. attended the O.T.C. at Brockville, and with the exception of Lieut. R.M. Calder, Adjutant, did not return for duty to the Contingent. Lieut. C.F. Carsley was taken on the strength of Headquarters, M.D.4 as Staff Learner. Lieut. M.A. Ross, towards the end of the year, was promoted to Captain, and given an appointment in connection with the establishment of Instructional Schools for Instructors. Lieuts. Macdonald and Drysdale, on completion of training at Brockville, reported to Borden for Advanced Training with the Armoured Corps. Lieuts. W.A. Clark, and G.A. McVey were sent to the Advanced Training Centre at Farnham, Captain Payan attended the Junior War Staff Course at The Royal Military College, Kingston, and was later sent overseas.

On the 10th October Lieut. R.M. Calder, Adjutant M.R.T.B. left for the O.T.C. Brockville, and was later appointed to the Canadian Forestry Corps, leaving Canada about the end of the year. In October the Contingent was informed that a R.C.A.F. Detachment would be formed from Undergraduates, and instruction would be given to cover I.T.S. training with the assistance of McGill University and the R.C.A.F.

On October 22nd numbers for the various courses to be started on 27th October were:-

On October 29th a special Sub-Committee was detailed to discuss the possibility of making a donation in cash to the War Effort for the purchase of equipment such as carriers, machine guns, motor cycles etc. At this date the matter is still under advisement.

On November 10th a practice Black-out was held.

The Annual Church Parade was held on November 23rd at Erskine American United Church. Roman Catholics and Jewish Cadets paraded at St. Patrick's Church and Shareth Israel Synagogue respectively. Our Chaplain conducted the Protestant Service.

On return to the Armoury the Contingent, 1477 strong, (277 C.O.T.C., 1200 M.R.T.B.), marched past Principal James, who took the salute in front of the McGill Union.

Early in November the Commanding Officer obtained six N.C:O. Instructors to help with the instruction of the M.R.T.B. All but two of these N.C.O's have been recalled on Active Service.

nand for er ittee er Board ittee On November 12th a large representative meeting of the Officers of the C.O.T.C. was present at a luncheon to meet Major Bell from Ottawa, representing the Director of Military Training. There was a very full discussion regarding the possibility of making some use of the McGill C.O.T.C. and particularly of the voluntary instructors, who had done such excellent work in the past in connection with Artillery, Machine Gun, and Engineering training. Major Bell promised to do all he could toward giving the Contingent more scope.

With respect to Special to Arms training under our instruction, the following sen ior Instructional Officers are lending co-operation to M.D.4 as follows:-

Lt.-Col. W.C. Nicholson, D.S.O., M.C., is lending his service to instructional work at the 6th Duke of Connaught's Royal Canadian Hussars.

Lt.-Col. A.S. Nops, V.D., in charge of our Army Service Corps training, is lending his services directing a course at District Headquarters for R.C.A.S.C. training.

Major St.C.C. Holland is to conduct Part II, Special to Arms Training, Syllabus C, Artillery (Mobile) at the Headquarters of the 2nd Montreal Regiment, R.C.A.

Captain W. Bowie is in charge of the District School, R.C.C.S., for Signal Instruction.

On November 20th a Centenary in connection with the birth of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was held in the Gymnasium-Armoury. The Hon. The Minister of Defence for Air inspected the R.C.A.F. Detachment of the Contingent in the afternoon, and this Detachment was present at the evening ceremony.

On 6th December, 102 cadets under Captain Charters proceeded to Shawbridge in the afternoon by bys. They were billetted at night in the Gymnasium of the Shawbridge Boys' Farm, and on the following day took part in a compass march across country to a position in the vicinity of St. Sauveur. On arrival there they occupied a defensive position, and after refreshments, embussed for Montreal about 1600 hours. The Commanding Officer, Second in Command and Chaplain attended this scheme, and despite the cold weather it was considered a very satisfactory exercise and most instructive to all who took part in it. The Contingent is very much indebted to Major Willcock, Superintendent of the Roys' Farm for putting the accommodation at the disposal of the cadets, and for all his help during the scheme.

On 13th-14th December six Senior Officers of the Contingent visited the Advanced Training Centre at Farnham on the kind invitation of Lt.-Colonel Howard, E.D. They had the opportunity of using Bren Guns and Tommy Guns and experienced movement in Universal Carriers.

On 19th December the annual Contingent Shooting Competition was held, in which Officers, N.C.O's, Orderly Room Staff and all attached Instructors took part.

Camp. Mount St. 3runo

As stated above, the Contingent moved into Camp at Mount St. Bruno at 0900 hours, Sunday, 15th June. Captain Savage with Advance Party reported on the 15th June.

The average attendance during Camp was 71 Officers, 675 Other Ranks, and 58 civilians.

A great deal of time and energy was spent prior to Camp by Lieut. Brierley and others in arranging for cooks, cook's helpers, etc.

Thanks to the kindness of Major Willcock of the Shawbridge Boys' Farm, all the Mess Waiters were provided by the Farm. Sgt. Harding of the Shawbridge Golf Club was engaged to look after the Messing under the supervision of Lieut. Calder. Lieut. Brierley was unable to remain at Camp for the whole period, and was relieved on his departure by Lieut. Calder.

Although the C.N.R. stated that they could not release the members of the Band to attend Camp, thanks to the efforts made by Major J.B. Brown, arrangements were finally made whereby Drum Major Smith and his men were allowed to attend.

Verbal authority was received from M.D.4 for all attached Instructors to attend if they so desired, and permission was given for them to war uniform during the period of Camp. \$10.00 was allowed from the Officers' Reserve Fund towards the purchase of such uniform.

All cadets were issued with ties, and the dress laid down for Camp was slacks, shirts, ties, anklets for Other Ranks, and shorts if desired for Officers.

M.D.4 provided a piquet of 15 men for fatigue duties from No. 4 District Depot. This number was subsequently increased to 30.

At great discomfort, but with undaunted spirit, Mrs. McCrohon of the Orderly Room Staff volunteered to help out with the clerical duties in the Orderly Room at Camp. She was billetted in doubtful comfort at St. Basile.

Arrangements were made for G. Johnson, caretaker of the Sir Arthur Currie Memorial Gymnasium-Armoury, to run the Canteen if he could get his holidays at the same time as the Camp period. The general supervision of the Canteen and Officers! Mess was placed under Lieut. R.M. Calder/

No. 6 Casualty Clearing Station was attached to McGill C.O.T.C. for rations for the period of Camp.

Captain G.M. Hyde was put in charge of entertainment, and arranged for a movie during the first week, and a concert party during the second week.

Visitor's Day was held on the Sunday spent at Camp, and the Sports etc. on that day were well organized by the Contingent Chaplain, Chaplain (Hon. Major) G.G.D. Kilpatrick, D.S.O.

Guest Night in the Officers' Mess, at which the D.O.C., Brig.-General E. deB. Panet, C.M.G., D.S.O. and Principal James and other guests were present, was held on Thursday, June 26th.

Major St.C.C. Holland arranged for radios for the Officers! and Sergeants' Messes, and for a Loud Speaker Car to be used for Instruction.

M.D. 4 laid down that the instruction at Camp should entirely comprise practical examinations in the various arms. All cadets therefore, with the exception of "D" Group were exempt from such duties as Guard Mounting, etc., and marks were given for their practical work as it proveeded. All cadets except two were successful in passing their Practical Examinations.

This made it difficult to arrange anything except that strictly laid down in the Syllabus for practical examinations. At the same time the following were carried out, in addition to curricula -

Demonstration in Demolitions. Two minor, and one major, in the form of a Night Raid.

Officers' Rifle and Revolver Competition.

Artillery Demonstration with 4.5 and 6th Howitzers.

Instruction on Bren Gun, 3" Mortar, and Tommy Gun.

Demonstration of Universal Carriers.

Shooting with Vickers Machine Gun.

Shooting with Lewis Gun.

Treasure Hunt, in which the elder brother of the Second in Command particularly distinguished himself.

On the final night the Contingent was instructed to defand the Camp against a possible attack by the Unit taking over, i.e., the Sherbrooke Fusiliers Regiment. This involved a sleepless night for practically all ranks, and many alarms and excursions, to say nothing of a varied display of S.O.S. signals, by rocket, Verey lights etc. The C.O.T.C. contended that the Camp had been well and ably defended, and all the attackers annihilated. The Sherbrooke Fusiliers on the other hand stated that the C.O.T.C. defenders had been decimated, and the Camp overrun by their Blitz.

On June 28th the C.O.T.C. retired in good order to Montreal despite a very heavy rain storm, which thoroughly dampened the victorious ardour of the Sherbrooke Fusiliers before they were able to take over the McGill tents.

In addition to attached N.C.O's from other Units for the purposes of the School, the Commanding Officer was able to get fifteen N.C.O's from the Machine Gun Training Centre, Three Rivers, to assist with the instruction of "D" Group.

A number of cadets from other C.O.T.C's were also attached for discipline, rations and training to the McGill Contingent, i.e.:-

5 Officers and 72 Other Ranks under Major C.H.M. Church from The University of Bishop's College were also attached in the same way as last year, except that a portion were incorporated in "D" Gwoup.

The successful termination of the C.O.T.C. camp for 1941 was marred by the untimely death of Sgt. (Cadet) F.A. Doughty, a veteran of the war 1914-18, who died of heart failure very suddenly on the Stadium as his group was being dismissed.

These were considered disappointing, but Major Cameron had difficulties in giving the necessary instruction due to shortage of Officers.

17 cadets from the Company attended Camp with the Contingent at Mount St. Bruno.

Sergeant A.A.R. Ramsay was detailed for futy at the Contingent Orderly Room during the summer, and was of very great assistance. He also attended most of the Bivouac Schemes etc., and was extremely useful in the Quartermaster's department.

In the autumn the Macdonald College Company attested in the C.O.T.C. 36 cadets for the Syllabus "A" training. At the same time arrangements were made to train 126 cadets in Basic (M.R.T.B. Training) under the supervision of Major H.S.L. Brown, who had been promoted Officer Commanding, M.R.T.B.

Major Cameron's difficulties had considerably increased by this time owing to the loss of further officers, and Major Rexford arranged for certain C.O.T.C. officers to travel out to St. Annes to give the necessary lectures etc. Major H.S.L. Brown exercised supervision of the M.R.T.B. Detachment, as had been done last year.

At the close of the year the whole question of the Macdonald College Company was under consideration, owing to the extreme difficulty they were having in obtaining efficient instructors.

TRansport

In May it was decided to provide some means of transportation for the Contingent, and the Commanding Officer and Regimental Committee authorized the purchase of a Ford Station Wagon. This vehicle has been of very great use since its purchase, and had completed 5067 miles up to the 31st of December. It was used extensively for the different Map Reading schemes etc., and by Officers travelling out to Macdonald College etc.

In October the purchase of a second-hand Indian Motor Cycle was approved. It was felt that this would be of great value in instructing the candidates for Syllabus "A". It was pointed out that we had an amount on hand generously donated by Dr. W.J. LeRossignol, a graduate of McGill University, which approximated the cost of the motor cycle, and it was falt appropriate to allocate his donation to the specific purchase of the motor cycle and side car, and a suitable inscription has been placed upon the machine.

Various Functions.

McGill Convocation.

McGill Convocation was held on May 29th when H.R.H. Princess Alice was given an Honorary degree. The M.R.T.H. supplied a Guard of Honour for this occasion, which was inspected by H.R. the Earl of Athlone. Miss Dorothy Thompson incidentally was also granted an Honorary degree and gave a very inspiring address.

Students'Rally.

On 22nd October the C.O.T.C., M.R.T.B. and a number of Units in the District took part in the Student's Rally, which was held on the Stadium. The Commanding Officer and Officers entertained in the Mess after the Rally.

St. John Ambulance Association

On 14th November the Armoury Floor and Officers' Mess was loaned to the Quebec Provincial District St. John's Ambulance Brigade for their Annual Inspection, when Lady Louis Mount Batten inspected the Brigade.

Sundry

During April arrangements were made for certain Officers of the Contingent to give instructions to Other Ranks of the Reserve Company of the Black Watch (R.H.R.) of Canada on a Sand Table Scheme.

On April 16th a Route March was held in which all members of the Contingent took part.

On or about May 28th a silver Challenge Bowl was presented to the Commanding Officer and Officers, for Officers' Rifle and Revolver Competition, by Major Greenwood, A/Regimental Adjutant.

Arrangements were made with Hon. Lt.-Col. Morrisey to purchase a copy of the coloured film taken by the associated Screen News at the C.O.T.C. Camp at Mount St. Bruno, held in 1940.

During the year Major St.C.C. Holland very kindly arranged to have the colour of the Officers' Cap and lapel badges altered to green-gold free of charge. The Corps is indebted to Major Holland for many arrangements he had made from time to time of like nature, such as the provision of radios and loud speaker car at the camp held in 1941.

Amnual Inspection.

On February 12th the Contingent was inspected by the Inspector -General for Eastern Canada, Major-General T.L. Tremblay, C.M.G., D.S.O., E.D., A.D.C. On this occasion there was no parade or march past. The Inspector General visited, however, the various classrooms and listened to the instruction which was being given to the cadets.

Certain preparations had been made to great his entrance into one classroom where a demonstration of demolitions was being carried out, with the hopes of load effect. Report of Officers' and Cadets' Mess Committee for the period January 1st 1941 to December 31st, 1941.

During the year 1941 the Mess Committee held monthly meetings at which financial statements were examined and approved; also reports on stocks and outstanding tickets.

The Mess has been open with service available daily except Sundays throughout the year. Occasions on which special entertainment has been provided are noted below.

On March 24th the Annual Meeting of the Contingent Officers was held. About fifty attended, and refreshments were served.

On May 29th the model of a scultural group, designed and executed by Mr. Stanley Martineau, was presented to the Contingent by him. It was unveiled by Dr. F. Cyril James. At this ceremony were Senior Officers and representatives of the University and their wives.

On May 30th a reunion of qualified cadets, under the sponsorship of Major Nicholson, was attended by about 200. Supper was served.

On October 22nd a Students' Rally took place on the Campus, after which the Officers and their wives, also Officers of other Units taking part in the parade, met in the Mess for refreshments.

During the year the privileges of the Mess were granted on several occasions to McGill University and related organizations. These included the Annual Dinner of the Graduates Society on February 18th, the Convocation Dance on May 28th, and the Junior Prom on December 5th.

The ceremonies marking the celebration of the Centennial of Sir Wilfred Laurier's birth were held in the Gymnasium on November 20th and the Mess was placed at the disposal of the University on that date also.

For the period of the summer camp, June 14th to June 28th, the Mess services, for Officers only, were transferred to Mount Bruno. During this camp a very successful Mess Dinner was served on June 26th. It was attended by more than 100.

During the year 1941 there has been little on which this Committee can report.

The question of the purchase of coloured F.S. caps for the cadets similar to the pattern now authorized was discussed and discarded as being too expensive.

The C.O. suggested that to distinguish the McGill Contingent a red peak with a white edge be worn on the drab F.S. cap by all cadets instead of the white peak as authorized for C.O.T.C's. Authority was asked from M.D.4, who replied that there was no peak other than white permitted by N.D.H.Q.

Authority was granted to re-imburse from the Officers! Fund to the extent of \$10.00 all Officers not permanently employed who wished to purchase "summer drill" uniforms.

This allowance was later extended to civilian Musketry Instructors who attended Camp. Such instructors who had previously held commissioned mank were permitted to wear the badges of their previous rank and any decorations for the period of Camp.

With the formation of the R.C.A.F. Group in November arrangements were made with No. 3 Training Command to issue all members of the group with Air Force uniform. The red peak with white edge mentioned above, while not yet authorized by R.C.A.F. Headquarters, has been permitted, as the white peak in the R.C.A.F. denotes "air crew". On the occasion of the visit of the Hon. C.G.Power, Minister of Defence for Air, the Group formed a Guard of Honour wearing the red and white peak, and occasioned favourable comment. Due to a shortage of Air Force greatcoats this group has not yet received an issue. It is hoped, however, that there will be received in the near future.

At the request of the University, arrangements are being made to equip the M.R.T.B. with rubber heels, in order to save the armoury floor. This arrangement has not yet been put into effect.

Canadian Officers Training Corps mand tor Report of Musketry Committee er littee for period ending 31st December 1941 er Board ittee During the above period Musketry for M.R.T.BL instruction was carried out in accordance with Basic Training schedule. A certain amount was done in the Miniature Range by the C.O.T.C. in the early months of the year. Due to the abolition of the Common to all Arms Course, and the introduction of Syllabus "A" the C.O.T.C. had no Musketry instruction after May 1941. At Camp at Mount St. Bruno, Infantry (M.G.) carried out some shooting on the range with Vickers, and certain C.O.T.C. cadets had an opportunity to fire with Lewis gun. The M.R.T.B. carried out firing on the range as laid down in Basic Training Syllabus, at Three Rivers and at Mount St. Bruno. OTHER SHOOTING At Mount St. Bruno a competition was held amongst the Officers for the Officers' Shooting Cup. This consisted of five rounds and two sighters at 200 yards with the rifle (Ross), and five rounds with revolver (.22). The competition was won by 2nd Lieut. L.S.Brown, Macdonald College, who thereby became the

first winner of the Colonel Morris trophy.

Prior to Christmas a shoot was held for all members of the staff including attached Instructional staff.

No other competitive shooting was held during the year, and as a result it was impossible to award the various shields.

It is recommended that in preparing the programme of work for C.O.T.C. Camp to be held at Farnham, periods be allotted for shooting on the range, and for the Annual Officers' Rifle and Revolver Competition. Possibly the other shooting trophies belonging to the C.O.T.C. might be put up for competition during this period.

M.R.T.B. inter-company shoot and competition against M.I.T. will be included in next year's report.

Report of the Camp and Commissariat Committee for period ending 31st December 1941.

This report may be conveniently divided into two parts, the first dealing with preparations for camp carried on in Montreal and the second with work in the camp itself.

The work of the Committee prior to camp was almost entirely devoted to the question of cooks. M.D.No. 4 had hoped to supply us with a full cooking staff but about a week before Camp opened found that it was impossible to obtain any personnel for our kitchens. It was, therefore, necessary for us to go out into the highways and byways to compel cooks to come in. Some compulsion was required.

Here I should like to thank all those officers who had heard from a friend that a cook was just around the corner. The cook never was but the sympathetic co-operation of the said officers was most appreciated.

The cooks who finally passed our Medical Officer - several refused the test at the last moment - were in large part found by Captain Doherty, Secretary of the Veterans' Assistance Commission, and by the Protestant Employment Bureau, to whom our thanks are due.

The second part of the Committee's work in Camp was largely the concern of Lieutenant "Bob" Calder. Apart from one attempted knifing and the difficulty of remembering which cooks would only cook when intoxicated and which cooks could only cook when sober, Mr. Calder had little trouble with the personnel, due largely to the tact and skill of Sergeant Harding of the Victoria Rifles who acted as O.C. Civilian Cooks.

Sergeant Harding also obtained for the Officers' Mess about fifteen mess boys from the Shawbridge Boy's Farm and we are greatly indebted to Sergeant Harding and to Major Willcock of the Farm in this regard.

The Committee in Camp had two other matters which occupied much time. The Canteen of which George Johnson was in charge was at first designed to serve all other ranks but after several days the sergeants were able to organize their own canteen.

Both canteens were operated successfully and a total profit of \$564.09 was turned over to the Corps to provide messing for the cadets.

The messing depended largely on the regular army rations which were regularly drawn, but these were greatly supplemented by Corps purchases, which included everything from 5 lbs. of strawberry punch powder to 5 packages of bicarbonate of soda.

As appears from other reports the total Mess expenses (officers and cadets) amounted to \$4,752.84 while receipts from various sources were \$2,722.39, leaving a net cost to the Corps of \$2030.45. The cost per man per day was 19.15 cents.

In the above period, liaison with the daily, weekly, monthly and annual publiciations in the Montreal district, and in newspapers outside the district where necessary, was maintained and I feel, somewhat strengthened. All publicity was prepared, within the proper limits, for the purpose of keeping the general public informed on the progress made in the general training, and in the larger field, on the very great contribution being made to the national war effort by the C.O.T.C. and M.R.T.B. In this task I have had the benefit of the sound direction of the 3. Commanding Officer and the most wholehearted co-operation of all the officers of the Regiment, without which it would have been wholly impossible to have achieved worthwhile results. Co-operation on the part of the press has been, generally speaking, 4. good. In this co-operation the newspapers have been reflecting the general will of the people at large "to get on with it." There has been occasion, of course, in which error has crept into published stories. - Undergraduate and Graduate bodies. I would like to refer particularly This has been most helpful inasmuch as it places information in the hands of those in the best positions to give assistance and encouragement.
- Co-operation from the daily newspapers in Montreal has, on the whole, been satisfactory. A detailed report on each item printed would not be useful here. The record can be seen in the clipping book kept in the Orderly Room for that purpose. However, special reference can be made to the stories covering the different camps, tactical manoeuvres, the Guard of Honour for His Excellency the Governor-General, and the visit of the Air Force Group to St. Hubert.

1. INAUGURATION

In accordance with resolution adopted by the Senate of McGill University whereby all British students who were physically fit were required to undergo Military Training, and under orders of Lt.-Col. J.M.Morris, M.C., V.D., the McGill Reserve Training Battalion re-commenced operations in September 1941.

(ii) Companies

The Battalion was originally organized into eight companies seven in Montreal, and one in Ste. Anne de Bellevue. Subsequently the seven Montreal companies were re-organized in six companies (B company eliminated).

Students who had acted as N.C.O's in 1940-41 session of training and others who had had previous school cadet training were selected for acting rank as N.C.O's in the Second Year and First Year Platoons respectively.

(iii) Platoons

Companies were organized for Training to 3, 4 and 5 Platoons according to the strength of each company, and placed on a syllabus according to the year of training.

3. ENROLLMENT.

- (i) Enrollment commenced on the 28th September 1941 and was carried out in three categories.
 - I. Those students who had completed 110 hours of intra-mural training at the Armoury and attended a fourteen-day camp during the season 1940-41.
 - II. Those students who had completed 110 hours of intra-mural training at the Armoury during the season 1940-41, but who had not been permitted to attend Camp on account of age restrictions.
 - III. Students who had not previously been enrolled in the M.R.T.B.
- (ii) The number of students enrolled in these three categories was 1607.

4. EXEMPTIONS

- (i) Students in the second year of training were permitted to volunteer for Officer training in the McGill C.O.T.C., and in the Air Force Wing of the McGill C.O.T.C.
- (ii) Medical students in their third, fourth and fifth years were required to attend a course in Military Medecine instead of Basic Training.
- (iii) Students who were attested in Reserve Units in Montreal were permitted, on the certificate of their Commanding Officer, to continue training with such units, in the place of attending M.R.T.B. parades.
- (iv) Students who were acting as instructors for R.C.A.F. Radio Mechanics' Course were likewise exempted from attending M.R.T.B.

5. TIME TABLES

Time Tables were arranged in co-operation with the University. All companies paraded for six hours each week; some two parades of three hours! duration and some three parades of two hours. Reference can be made to the weekly Time Table attached.



The Serving Room has been open for sales on week days during the period covered by this report, and similar service was arranged at the Contingent camp at Mount Bruno. The Committee was handicapped in the first six months of its operation due to the fact that they could not keep a treasurer. Their appointments proved so good that the appointee was almost immediately seduced by the Air Force, the Navy or other needy organizations. However, we now have a treasurer who well answers our requirements as to efficiency and permanency, we hope.

Under Accounts Receivable the item of \$278.42 has been accepted by the Contingent as correct and \$6.50 for members accounts has since been liquidated.

Thanks of the Committee are due to Mess Sgt. Grelle and Cpl. Johnston for the faithful and efficient manner in which they have performed their duties and my personel thanks I offer to the members of the Mess Committee for their cheerful and able assistance.

I respectfully request that the band be regarded with understanding. I cannot hope that all can bring an equal appreciation to its accomplishments. We do not all attain the same cultural heights. But we can as opportunity offers, expose ourselves to the advantages of our possession of an outstanding Pipe Band, and learn a fine appreciation of skill in the chanter and the proper tuning of the drones.
