M. GILL War Memorial

The Executive Committee has announced that the overall total in the War Memorial Campaign has reached \$560,000. Of this, approximately \$60,000 is attributable to the Continuing Campaign—1946, which has as its objective completion of the Athletic Centre by provision of the Rink-Auditorium unit. This leaves a total of approximately \$40,000 to be raised during the remaining months of the year in order to achieve the 1946 interim objective of \$600,000.

The record of the War Memorial is a splendid and inspiring story, representing as it does the active work of many hundreds of graduates, and the generosity of approximately 8,000 of the 16,000 individuals on the lists of the Society.

McGILL's War Record

Since the last reunion of graduates, five thousand, five hundred veterans of the Second Great War have joined the great company of those whose achievement has made lustrous the name of Old McGill. Three hundred of these men we shall not see again. They live in our memory and their name is sacred in the University's story. Others who served, men and women, we have welcomed home with pride and gratitude. In the service of the King, or of Allied lands, their duty was performed with valour and with high effect; in the heart of McGill, their record shall not perish.

MACDONALD COLLEGE, Ste. Anne de Bellevue, P.Q.

A tour of laboratories at Macdonald College and a review of the research in progress will show why for years Macdonald's largest class has been its post-grads. Visiting alumni will be proud of McGill's contribution to Canada through her Faculty of Agriculture: nutrition studies from new vitamins and amino-acid metabolism to diets for cows; methods for pushing vital food production to a peak; cattle, poultry and crop breeding; "pepping up" the new wonder drugs; orchard practice; pest control . . . The ladies, too, might enjoy a visit to the cookery and textile labs of the Schools of Household Science.


DAWSON COLLEGE, St. Johns, P.Q.







HE history of the Medical Faculty of McGill University is closely linked with that of the General Hospital and the beginnings of Medical Education in Canada. The five founders of the Montreal General Hospital — Robertson, Caldwell, Stevenson, Holmes and Loedel — established at the same time the "Montreal Medical Institution" in a small, wooden house on the site of the Bank of Montreal, Place d'Armes Square. Twenty-five students assembled in 1824 to receive the first systematic course of medical education given in Canada.

After continuing as an independent enterprise for four years, owing largely to the exertions of Dr. Stevenson, the Montreal Medical Institution became the Faculty of Medicine of McGill University and thus prevented the lapse of the McGill bequest to the residuary legatees, the Des Rivieres family.

Thus, in the beginning of things at McGill, the Medical Faculty was probably the means of keeping the University in existence and, for many decades to follow, maintained its reputation as a seat of learning through the sound training received by its graduates in medicine. For some years the teaching in the Medical Faculty was carried on in the top floor of the central Arts Building. This was found too far from the centre of the city and Drs. Campbell, Wright and others of the Faculty built a new Medical School in Cote Street, next door to the Theatre Royal. The Faculty occupied this from 1853 to 1872, when a substantial cut stone building was erected in the University grounds by the Governors of the University. This building formed the front of the buildings almost completely destroyed by fire in 1907.

From 1872 until 1885 this building sufficed for the highest requirements of the medical education of that period. The necessity of further extension of laboratory teaching required in 1885 an addition to this building. This was cheaply constructed of brick and contained two lecture rooms, laboratories for chemistry and physiology and a small private working laboratory on the top floor for practical pathology and bacteriology. In 1893 J. H. R. Molson gave \$60,000 for the further development of the laboratory teaching and the increased room required by the larger classes of students. Two years later a substantial stone building was erected, connected with the old building and with the residence of Dr. Harrington. The Harrington House and an adjoining room or two formed the original J. H. R. Molson Laboratories for Pathology. The new stone wing still existing as part of the Laboratory wing gave a large assembly hall, extensive laboratories for physiology, well-equipped preparation rooms for chemistry, histological laboratories, students' rooms, etc. The gift of \$100,000 from the family of Lord Strathcona in 1898 enabled the Faculty to remove the unsightly and irregular brick additions erected in 1885, as well as the Harrington House, and replace them by stone buildings more in harmony with the other university structures. These additions and the alterations of the older parts cost the faculty about \$140,000, but they more than doubled the capacity of the former building.

Ample room and the most modern equipment were here provided for the conduct of laboratory and didactic teaching of classes of 200 students, as well as extensive museum and library space. This extensive and complete building

was only used for four or five years when the disastrous fire of April 1907 entirely destroyed the central building, a large portion of the front wing (the original medical building), and greatly damaged by fire and water the laboratory wing. This fire destroyed completely the departments of pathology and anatomy with the libraries, specimens and anatomical collections connected with them, as well as the museum of obstetrics and gynæcology and the valuable osteological collections of the pathological museum. Nearly half the museum, however, was saved and the fire-proof stack room prevented the spread of the fire in the library which was damaged only by water.

The laboratory wing was restored and modified to contain the necessary laboratory equipment for all departments in time for the opening of the session, 1907-08. Lectures were given at various University buildings and in the Hospitals. Competative designs were invited that summer for a building to occupy the northern end of the University grounds, opposite the Royal Victoria Hospital. This property was presented to the University by Lord Strathcona as a site for the new medical building after the fire. The firm of Brown and Valance were the successful architects in the competition and the handsome building we are opening is erected from their designs. The amount received from the fire insurance on the medical building was inadequate to completely build this edifice. The Governors agreed, however, from their scanty funds to add sufficient to build the east wing and the central block without the museum. Work was well advanced on this portion of the building when the Principal cabled from England in June, 1909, that Lord Strathcona had again come forward in our hour of need and given the University \$450,000 to enable it to complete and equip the whole building according to the original designs.

A brief statement of dimensions and structure of this new home of the Medical Faculty may prove interesting to our Alumni. It is the largest building of the University group, its frontage on Pine Avenue and the University Campus is 268 feet, its frontage on University Street is 171 feet and 114 feet on Carlton Road. The Museum wing is in the form of a cross, 74 feet square. The exterior of the building is of finely cut Montreal limestone, and the whole edifice is of the highest type of modern steel construction and thoroughly fireproof. The roof is covered with green slate and copper flashings. All the windows are fitted with steel frames and sashes. The corridors and halls have mosaic floors with marble borders. The walls are lined with low glazed terra cotta from Doulton's Works in England to a height of eight feet. The finish throughout is in quartered oak. Two wide marble staircases with wrought iron balustrades lead to the upper floors.

The Students' Entrance is on University Street and there are two major entrances by broad granite steps from the Campus.

The electric current for lighting, ventilation and power is generated at the University plant. An electric passenger elevator is provided in the East Wing, as well as a special lift from the preparation room to the dissecting room. Electric lifts are also installed for bringing books and material from the unpacking rooms in the basement to the reading rooms and to the museum.

The cost of the building and its equipment is between \$700,000 and \$800,000.

Lord Strathcona by this his latest and most munificent gift to the University has, in buildings and equipment, placed the McGill Medical Faculty in the foremost position among the medical schools on this Continent.

EXHIBITS AND LABORATORY DEMONSTRATIONS:

1. The Library Exhibits (in charge of Miss Charlton.) In the Reading and Journal rooms will be displayed (1) The Osler Collection of votive offerings from the Temple of Æsculapius at Rome; (2) Original illuminated diplomas from the Universities of Northern Italy, 16th and 17th Centuries (from the Osler Collection); (3) Early illuminated manuscripts and books on Ophthalmology (from the Casey Wood Collection); (4) Works on Tuberculosis from Hippocrates and Galen to Robert Koch; (5) Medical Canadiana, including the first diploma from McGill University and many historical letters, etc., connected with the early history of McGill University.

The Stack Room, Second Floor, will be open for inspection throughout the evening.

2. The Roentgen Ray Exhibits (in charge of Mr. Day) in room No. 87, adjoining the Museum, on the third floor; entrance from the Hall, exit to the Museum. (1) A series of skiagraphs illustrating

the use of X-Rays in Surgery showing bullets and other foreign bodies in situ, from the Montreal General and Royal Victoria Hospitals. (2) During the evening two fluoroscopes will be in continuous operation to enable guests to see the penetrating effect of X-Rays. (3) Radium emanations will be made visible by a Crooks Spintheriscope near the entrance to the room. (4) High frequency currents and their effects. (5) An exhibition of Geissler's vacuum tubes.

- 3. Pathological Laboratories: Second floor, East wing; Microscopical and Bacteriological Exhibits. The main laboratory will contain (1) Microscopes showing the well known disease-producing bacteria as well as culture tubes containing these organisms in a living form, under charge of Dr. Adami and Dr. McCrae. (2) Special exhibits from the General Hospital under charge of Dr. Rhea. (3) The following from the Royal Victoria Hospital under charge of Dr. Grüner. Series of microscopes showing blood cells taking up bacteria (phagocytosis), a second series showing action of blood cells on bacteria in health and disease (opsonic action), a third series showing the engulfing of waste products by cells of the body. Also other microscopes showing the so-called cancer parasite and the effect of polarized light upon crystals in the tissues. (4) In the private laboratories adjoining will be seen the ultra-microscopic effects and the dark field illumination; colloidal gold and silver and some living cells will be shown.
- 4. Museums: The Pathological Museum will be of special interest only to physicians and surgeons. The Anatomical Museum on the third floor contains many rare and interesting skeletons of the lower animals.

A valuable and interesting collection of Central African curios donated to the University by Dr. J. L. Todd will be exhibited for the first time in the Pathological Museum, Second Floor.

5. Physiology of Special Senses: (In charge of Dr. Robertson) in the private laboratory for Pharmacology, West Wing, First Floor; entrance from staircase. The exhibit will include models of the eye, ear, laryn and slides illustrating color and form, etc.






