

This is to record the substance of my request presented to you yesterday.

The Editorial Committee of the Graduates' Society consider that the "News" should be used as the medium through which information pertaining to the University should reach the Graduates.

We feel that:- 1. The Graduates are always eager to get such information. 2. The University has everything to gain by its publication.

We consider that this information should be trustworthy and official, emanating from your office rather than picked up piecemeal by members of the Committee; and should comprise:-

1. Promotions or appointments.
2. New Departments and extensions of old departments.
3. New Buildings - Proposed constructions.
4. Alteration in policy in any department.
5. Any University activity of special note.

6. Activities of the Staff outside the University - ie., addresses to Societies. Publications in Scientific Journals with name of Journal, date, title and a few words of abstract.

Copy should be in the hands of the Editor, T.W.L. MacDermott, not later than February 15th, May 15th, August 15th and November 15th.

After giving the matter due consideration will you kindly give me a reply that I may lay before the Committee at its next meeting, particularly outlining the path through which the copy will reach us.

Secretary's Report Annual Meeting
of the Council of the Graduates'
Society held at the Engineering
Institute Tues. Oct. 2 @ 7.30 P.M.

Gentlemen:

On behalf of the Executive Committee I beg to report on the activities of the Society for the past year.

Your executive committee has held 18 regular meetings, and three special meetings, during this period. The first special meeting was called at the request of the Society's Representatives on the Athletic Board of Control, for the purpose of securing an expression of opinion from the Executive as to the advisability of retaining the services of the professional athletic coach, or ^{of} trying to secure a trained McGill graduate for the position. The Committee decided that in their opinion the services of Mr. Shaughnessy should be retained *for the present season* -

The second special meeting was called for the purpose of having the Director of the Department of Physical Education explain to the meeting the policy of the University on Athletics and the relation of athletics to the Department of Physical training. To this meeting were invited, the Principal, the past presidents of the Society (since 1919) ^{our} ~~one~~ representatives on the Board of Governors, the Athletic Board of Control and the Advisory Board of the Students' Council. The whole question was thoroughly discussed and many misunderstandings cleared up.

The third special meeting was that at which the Reunion Committee came into being. When the Reunion was first decided upon the Executive Committee planned to create a special reunion committee to undertake all arrangements. This scheme was later changed and they decided to take on the work themselves. To carry out the undertaking

properly it was necessary to add to their numbers and thus the Reunion Committee was built up around ^a ^{Consisting} the nucleus of the Executive Committee.

This Reunion Committee met fourteen times besides doing a great deal of outside work.

You can, therefore, see that your Executive Committee has not been idle having met altogether 35 times during the period under review.

Apart from the Reunion which I will deal with later the most important undertaking this year has been ^{the} ^{ing of} amendments to the Constitution of the Society. This work entailed a great deal of study and the ballots were not sent out until every detail had been carefully considered by the sub-committee who drafted the amendments ^{as well as} ~~and~~ by the Executive Committee later. As was announced in the September News the amendments carried by a very large majority

All graduates for whom we have addresses were again asked to join the Society and sent a free copy of the News. This resulted in about two hundred new members.

Last spring the University authorities decided to trace up as many past students as possible. As addresses were found for these, the cards were turned over to the Society's office, and we are looking after about 1800 extra names. These past students were circularized with a view to securing new members and over sixty joined up.

It is too soon after the Reunion to be able to give a detailed report but the following facts will probably be of interest:

The total registration was 1912 of whom 530 were from out of town (Island of Montreal). These figures do not include wives and daughters of graduates, who were not graduates themselves, so that well over two thousand people attended the Reunion. The majority of the functions were well attended and the victory by our team over Toronto on Saturday brought the whole to a very happy conclusion. As far as finances are concerned, it is impossible to give figures at this time, but it is almost certain that the guarantee from the University, will not be required and that the advances they made will be paid back in full.



Dear Mr. Hanson:-

With reference to your enquiry concerning the origin of the two small funds established by the graduates some fifty years ago, I have obtained the following information:-

(1) The first fund is referred to in the University Calendar of that date, as follows:

"The Graduates' Society of the University, in 1876, passed the following Resolution:-

"That the members and graduates be invited to subscribe to a fund for the endowment of the Libraries of the University; said fund to be invested and the proceeds applied under the supervision of the Council of the Society in annual additions to the Libraries; an equitable division of said proceeds to be made by the Council between the University Library and those of the Professional Faculties".

In terms thereof the following subscriptions have been announced to date, May 1st. 1883.....
Total.....\$3,020.00

The origin of the second fund is referred to by Sir William Dawson in his autobiography in the following terms:

"As to the future, the evening was signalized by the announcement of the intention of Mr. Peter Redpath, one of the Governors, to erect a costly and capacious museum building on the college grounds, and of that of the Principal to place therein, as a gift to the University, his own large geological collections; and the further announcement that the graduates proposed to commemorate the twenty-fifth year of the Principal's tenure of office, by the creation of a university fund, for the erection of a university building to bear his name".

In the first calender mentioning this latter fund we find the following statement:-

" The Dawson Principalship Foundation.

The Graduates Society of the University in 1880, and in commemoration of the completion by Dr. Dawson of his twenty-fifth year as Principal, resolved to raise, with the assistance of their friends, a Fund towards the Endowment of the Principalship, under the above name.

Details of the scheme are set forth in a circular issued by the Society; copies can be had from the Treasurer, H.H. Lyman, Esq., M.A., B.C.L. The following subscriptions have been announced to date, May 1st 1883. They are payable in one sum, in instalments without interest, or with interest till payment of capital, as subscribers have elected.

.....\$3010.00

The amount raised was evidently insufficient to endow the Principalship and the next statement contained in the calanders is the following:

The Graduates' Society of the University, in 1880, and in commemoration of the completion by Dr. Dawson of his twenty-fifth year as Principal, resolved to raise, with the assistance of their friends, a fund towards the endowment of the Fellowship under the above name.

The following subscriptions have been announced to date, January 1st, 1902. They are payable in one sum, in instalments without interest, or with interest till payment of capital, as subscribers have elected.

.....Total \$3,110.00"

It is evident from the foregoing that, although the first fund specifically mentions the Library, it remains entirely under the control of the Society and can therefore be diverted. It does seem, however, by the extract from Sir William Dawson's will, that he, at least, understood that the second fund would be used in some way to commemorate himself.
