My dear boy -

My darling Bag - Ah if you could only be here this afternoon - here in this nice warm room - all alone with me - and let me look at you - feel your hand and hear your voice -

There seems to be no doubt but that you are in the freshman team - even though you have not now your colors as yet - I hope your lip is all right, by now - I don't like the injuries to the nerves - Hermann is so eager to play this year - In the Hastings game he played thru the game with a piece of his shoe sticking into his toe, and a blood poison'd sore followed - It was very painful for a couple of days until it was lanced, and since then there has been no trouble. He wrote his mother about it, and she sent a letter back absolutely forbidding him to play another game of foot-ball - and also

wrote to Perry to see if it - that her orders  
were absolutely obeyed - Hermann was told  
he must play in the Mononine game  
wrote her, and telegraphed her - but nothing  
would move her. He declares he will play or  
do something desperate. He has changed &  
from last year. He is an old boy now and
