of-town loans. The large reading room is decorated by three allegorical paintings by Matthews, presented by Mrs. Henrietta Zeile.

Forty-five per cent of the sum available annually for the purchase of books, exclusive of periodicals and special endowments, is expended by the Librarian as requested by the heads of the five departments of the Medical Faculty located in San Francisco. Fifty-five per cent is spent by the Librarian on the recommendation of the Library Committee for the purpose of covering the various subjects in Medicine not included in the above departments, such as dictionaries, encyclopedias, bibliography, veterinary medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, anatomy, bacteriology, chemistry, embryology, physiology, etc., and to enable the Committee to build up sections of the Library which are relatively deficient. Forty-five per cent is divided among the six departments approximately as follows: fifteen per cent of the total fund for Medicine, ten per cent for Surgery, five per cent each for Obstetrics, Pathology, Pharmacology, Hygiene and Public Health. This arrangement is revised annually by the Faculty according to the relative strength of the various subjects in the Library.
