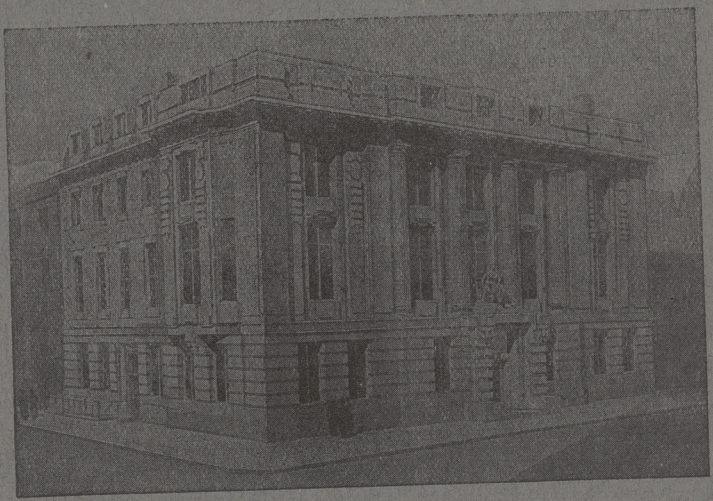

THE ROYAL SOCIETY OF MEDICINE, under the name of the Medical and Chirurgical Society, was founded on May 22, 1805, at a meeting at the Freemason's Tavern, by the chief London physicians and surgeons of that time, among whom were William Saunders (the first President), Matthew Baillie, Alexander Marcet, John Yelloly, John Abernethy, Henry Cline, Edward Jenner, Everard Home, Gilbert Blane, and Astley Cooper. They agreed "That a Society comprehending the several Branches of the Medical Profession be established in London for the purpose of conversation on professional subjects, ~~for~~ the reception of communications, and for the formation of a Library." The Society's first rooms were at 2, Verulam Buildings, Gray's Inn; here it stored its small collection of books and held its meetings. In 1810 it moved to larger rooms at 3, Lincoln's Inn Fields. By the development of its library, and by the great increase of its influence over science and practice, the Society became of such importance that in 1834 it received from King William IV a Charter of Incorporation under the title of the Royal Medical and Chirurgical Society of London. Next year it bought the lease of 53, Berners Street, and adapted the house for the needs of a working Society, with a handsome Library, a Meeting Room, and rooms for Council and Committees. Here it remained till the need of more Library space and of better accommodation for meetings induced the Council in 1889 to purchase the large house and garden at 20, Hanover Square. The house was largely reconstructed and adapted, and there the Society, in 1905, celebrated its Centenary.\*

Between 1846 and 1902 many Medical Societies had been formed for the advancement of special studies, and from time

to time an attempt had been made, by men of authority in the profession, to bring about the union of all the London Medical Societies in one powerful body which should be representative of every department of Medicine and Surgery.

By a Supplemental Charter, granted by King Edward VII, on May 28, 1907, to the ROYAL MEDICAL AND CHIRURGICAL SOCIETY the powers of its original Charter were enlarged; its name was changed to "The Royal Society of Medicine;" and the Society thus constituted was empowered to form Sections, and to admit members of other Societies to its Fellowship, and to Membership of its Sections.

The success of this final attempt was due to Mr. (now Sir John) MacAlister, the Secretary of the Society, who submitted a scheme which was approved in 1893 by Sir Andrew Clark, then President of the Society; but the sudden death of Sir Andrew Clark, on the day for which he had convened the first meeting to consider the question of amalgamation, put a stop to further action at that time. In 1905 Mr. MacAlister submitted to Sir Richard Douglas Powell, then President of the Society, a revised scheme which became the basis of the present constitution.

This scheme was carefully considered at many private meetings held at the house of Sir Richard Douglas Powell, who afterwards proposed that representatives of all the Medical Societies should be invited to attend a meeting to consider the scheme at the Royal College of Physicians. Sir William Church, President of the College, took the chair at a large and enthusiastic meeting, and the necessary resolutions were carried by large majorities.

Negotiations with the Societies were carried on by a committee, which had Sir William Church as its Chairman, and Dr. Arthur Latham and Mr. Pendlebury as Honorary Secretaries. These negotiations were continued over a period of nearly two years, till an agreement was reached and a committee of representatives appointed to determine the method of union and the necessary changes in the constitution of the Society.

The Societies all desired to set the general welfare of the profession above their separate interests, and thus to ensure the success of the scheme. On June 14, 1907, the Supplemental Charter, offered by the Crown, was formally accepted. The following Societies which had agreed to amalgamate immediately thereafter dissolved, and their individual members

who applied were admitted, without election, as Fellows or as members of Sections of the Royal Society of Medicine.

The union realized Sir Andrew Clark's hope of a Society which would "bring together for their common help all the investigations in the various departments of medicine, to provide a common centre for the collection, collation, comparison and criticism of their respective researches, to constitute a body sufficiently powerful to defend the rights and promote the just interests of the medical profession, and to create a fountain of honour for the reward of all who distinguish themselves in the Science or Art of Physic."\*

King Edward VII graciously confirmed and continued his Patronage of the Society under its new constitution. His Majesty King George, who had been an Honorary Fellow of the Society since its Centenary in 1905, graciously consented, on his Accession to the Throne, to be the Patron of the Society.

[Each Section is autonomous, has its own Officers and Council, and elects its own members.]

Registered medical practitioners, and others whose qualifications are satisfactory to the Council, are eligible as Fellows of the Society or as Members of its Sections. Women are eligible as Fellows, and as Members of most Sections.

### Fellowship

Applications for election must be made on forms obtainable from the Secretary, and each application must be supported by the signatures of *three* Fellows who are *personally acquainted* with the candidate.

The Fellows are the joint owners (*without liability*) of the whole property of the Society, valued at about £100,000.

### PRIVILEGES

- (1) Fellows may attend, and vote, at all meetings of the Society, and are eligible for office.
- (2) They may attend the ordinary meetings, and take part in any discussion, of any Section, but they are not entitled to vote at a meeting of a Section, and may be subject to restrictions as to the examination of patients, *unless* they are duly elected Members of that Section.



- (3) If elected to the Membership of any Section no additional subscription is required.
- (4) They have full use of the Library, the right to order any procurable book not already in stock and, if resident in the country, to have books sent to them carriage free.

- (5) They are entitled, upon written application, to receive gratis the monthly *Proceedings* of the Society, including those of all the Sections.
- (6) They receive, by post, announcements of all papers and discussions.
- (7) The free use of the Marcus Beck Laboratory, the Reading, Writing and Smoking-rooms, Conference Rooms, Museum, Microscopes, with facilities for examination of specimens, Dressing Rooms, &c.
- (8) Fellows abroad have a special privilege. On application to the Secretary they are entitled to receive, gratis, abstracts of articles, or to have notes, references, and memoranda on any subject prepared for them and sent to them by post. In fact, the library staff does for them what they would do for themselves were they able to use the Library.

The following resolution was confirmed at a Special General Meeting of the Fellows held on Feb. 18th, 1919:—

“That the annual subscription of Fellows living or having an address within one mile of the Society’s House be increased from three guineas to five guineas, and that any Fellow living or having an address in any street, square, or place, any part of which is within a radius of one mile from the Society’s House, shall be deemed to be within a radius of one mile and liable to the increased subscription.”

\* Members of Sections who have already paid an Admission Fee of Two Guineas pay no further admission fee on election to the Fellowship.

The following rider was also adopted :—

“ That in the case of Fellows who, during the recent war, have served abroad for twenty-four months or more, or have been unable to practise on account of War Service, the increase of subscription be postponed till October, 1920.”

(*N.B.—Fellows entitled to claim the foregoing privilege should communicate with the Secretary, giving necessary particulars.*)

### COMPOSITION FEES

A Fellow may compound for his annual subscription of £3 3s. by a payment in one sum of £75.

The Council now offers to Fellows another method of providing for their Subscriptions—better for the individual Fellow, and at the same time of advantage to the Society. If a Fellow lends to the Society £80 for twelve months the Subscription of £3 3s. is credited to him for that period, and so on from year to year. He is thus saved all further trouble, while the original sum of £80 is repayable in full at death, upon resignation, or upon due notice to the Society that he wishes to have it returned, and to revert to the method of annual payments.

Fellows liable for the £5 5s. Subscription may enjoy a similar privilege by depositing with the Society the sum of £133.

### Members of Sections

Applications for Membership of a Section must be made on the forms obtainable from the Secretary. Each application must be supported by the signatures of Members of the Section.

### PRIVILEGES

- (1) Members of a Section may attend the meetings and take part in the business of the Section, and are eligible for office. They are entitled to attend the meetings of Sub-sections attached to their Sections, but not to take part in the business of such Sub-section unless enrolled as Members. (They are not entitled to attend the meetings of other Sections or those of the Society, but are usually welcome to attend as guests.)

- (2) They are entitled to receive the *Proceedings* of their Section.
- (3) They may obtain the full use of the Library on payment of an Annual Library Subscription of £2 2s.

## Members of Sub-sections

Membership of Sub-sections is limited to Members of the Section to which the Sub-section is attached, and all candidates for Membership of a Sub-section must be approved by the Council of the Sub-section.

Members of Sub-sections do not pay any additional admission fee or subscription for that privilege. The *Proceedings* of the Sub-sections are included in those of the Section to which they are attached.

## The Library

The Library, which has been enriched by the addition of the libraries of the Obstetrical, Odontological, and Ophthalmological Societies, and the collections of other societies, contains over 100,000 volumes, and is the largest and most comprehensive medical library in the British Empire.

Copies of all important medical publications, British and foreign, are promptly ordered, and, any obtainable book, not already in the library, is procured on the request of a Fellow.

The library is open daily from 11 a.m. to 6.30 p.m.

Fellows are entitled to use the Library for purposes of reference, and to take out books for home reading. Eight books may be taken out at one time—or a larger number if required for special purposes, on written application to the Honorary Librarians. Members of Sections may obtain these privileges on payment of a special Library Subscription of £2 2s. per annum.

### **Odontological Museum.**

The Society possesses a very valuable Museum of Odontology originally collected by the Odontological Society of Great Britain. The museum is housed by the Royal College of Surgeons, and displayed in a special room at the College in Lincoln's Inn Fields. Additions are constantly being made to the Collection which is under the care of Mr. J. F. Colyer, F.R.C.S., the Honorary Curator.

### **Marcus Beck Laboratory**

This laboratory, generously provided and furnished at the cost of Mr. Roger Beck in memory of his brother, Marcus Beck, is available for the use of Fellows for purposes of research and experiment, on written application to the Secretary.

### **Meetings**

The Society meets from time to time, as announced, for the reading of papers, and to discuss important medical questions of general interest.

For dates of Meetings of Sections see the respective Calendars and the Diary on p. 45. Additional Meetings are held from time to time and announced on the Diary Card (issued, on application, to Fellows and Members every week during the Session), and in the Medical Journals.

### **The Epidiascope**

The Society possesses two of these instruments (installed at a cost of about £500), and Fellows are invited to make the fullest use of them.

The chief use of the epidiascope is to project opaque objects. As these are projected (largely magnified) in their solid form and natural colours, large diagrams and lantern slides are no longer needed. The objects are simply placed on a brightly illuminated stage, and the image is shown upright on the screen with precise definition. Photographs, coloured drawings, book illustrations, &c., are by this means better projected than by the aid of lantern slides. The colour rendering of a highly magnified reproduction is perfect.

Diagrams on cardboard or paper can be projected *in the act of being drawn*, thus greatly facilitating demonstrations.

If specimens in glass jars are to be shown, the specimens should, when possible, be placed in flat jars, as jars of cylindrical form to some extent distort and interfere with the definition of the parts not in focus.

Fellows wishing to use the epidiascope at meetings should give notice not later than the previous day.

PRIVATE DEMONSTRATIONS

By arrangement with the Secretary, Fellows can have the use of the epidiascopes for private demonstrations.

**Kinematograph**

A kinematograph manufactured by Messrs. Pathé Frères has been installed for use at meetings, and is also available for the use of Fellows by arrangement with the Secretary.

**Papers**

Offers of lectures, or of papers for reading before the Society should be sent to the Secretary.

Papers offered for reading before one of the Sections should be sent to the Hon. Secretaries of that Section. Each paper must be accompanied by a short abstract.

Papers which have been read before the Society or before any of its Sections, may be published elsewhere—even before they appear in the *Proceedings*—provided due acknowledgment be made that they are the property of, and have been read before, the Society.

**“The Proceedings”**

The *Proceedings*, which form an annual volume (bound in 3 parts), are published in monthly numbers from October to July.

Each monthly number contains a record of the papers which have been read before the Society and before the Sections, together with reports of the cases and specimens shown and of the discussions at the various meetings.

The *Proceedings* of each Section are separately paged, and the volumes are so arranged that at the end of the year the *Proceedings* of any Section may be bound separately.

Fellows, on written application at the beginning of each session, or upon election, are entitled to receive, carriage free, the complete monthly volumes, and a Member of a Section to receive the *Proceedings* of the particular Section to which he belongs.

### **William Gibson Research Scholarship for Medical Women**

This Scholarship, endowed in perpetuity by the gift of £6,000 by Miss Maud Margaret Gibson as a memorial of her late father, Mr. William Gibson, of Melbourne, is managed by the Council of the Society on the advice of a Special Committee as provided by the Trust Deed. The income of the fund (after payment of expenses), approximately £300, is awarded for a period of two years to a qualified medical woman upon the nomination of the Scholarship Committee, without examination or thesis. Full particulars are announced when the time approaches for making an award. The first scholar appointed is Miss Mary Esther Harding, who will hold it until Midsummer, 1921.

### **The Society's New House**

Opened by His Majesty the King, accompanied by Her Majesty the Queen, on  
Tuesday, May 21, 1912

The Society's house in Hanover Square, planned and arranged in 1889 when the Fellows numbered about 800, proved to be quite inadequate after the Amalgamation, when nearly 3,000 Fellows had to be provided for.

It was moreover felt that the house of a Society which represents British medicine throughout the Empire should be of a character consistent with the importance of its objects, and should not suffer by comparison with similar institutions in existence in the capitals of other countries.

The essential requirements of the Society, which were set forth by the Council in June, 1909, and issued to the Fellows as "A Report on the Question of Increased Accommodation," have been met in the new building (see cover), designed by the late Mr. John Belcher, R.A., and Mr. J. J. Joass, F.R.I.B.A., and erected and equipped at a cost of over £50,000. Towards this sum over £21,000 has been contributed by Fellows and their friends. As the interest on the balance (about £30,000) is a heavy drain upon the income of the Society the Council hopes that the whole amount will be made up by voluntary contributions, so as to retain the entire income of the Society for its important objects. The Treasurers will very gratefully receive and acknowledge contributions.

The best means of perpetuating the generosity of Donors are under consideration, *and suggestions are invited.*

The house contains three Meeting Rooms, seating 400, 150, and 70 respectively, the two largest having annexes for the examination of male and female patients; a handsome Library on the 1st Floor, with private rooms for study—in which books and papers may be kept for a Fellow's use, a Laboratory, and a number of rooms for the Councils and Committees of the Society and of its Sections. For the comfort and convenience of Fellows rooms are also provided for private conferences, as well as Tea, Smoking, and Dressing Rooms.

## REGULATIONS AS TO PAPERS AND MEETINGS

(1) A Member intending to make any Communication is requested to send notice to one of the Hon. Secretaries. He is requested also when sending notice to state approximately the time such a Communication will occupy. He will subsequently receive due notice of the date of meeting for which his Communication will be placed upon the Agenda.

**ANTERIOR LOBE PITUITARY GLAND TABLETS.**—Tablets representing  $2\frac{1}{2}$  grains of the desiccated substance are supplied in bottles of 25 and 100; 5 grains, in bottles of 50 and 100.

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**PITUITARY GLAND TABLETS.**—Tablets representing 2 grains of fresh whole gland are supplied in bottles of 25 and 100.

**PITUITRIN.**—A physiologically standardized extract of the posterior lobe of the pituitary body. Supplied in ampoules of 0.5 and 1 c.c., also in vials of 10 c.c.

**PINEAL GLAND TABLETS.**—Each tablet represents  $\frac{1}{2}$  grain of fresh pineal gland substance from young cattle. In bottles of 25 and 100.
