Dr. said she was very popular, but a martinet and lived a secluded life. He knew her well and attended her proflessionally but had no suspicion that she was a woman, tho' her features were feminine.

But this gentleman thinks the tale too long by some thousands of words! I have offered to reduce the pages, but as yet without effect!

It is too ridiculous; for apart from the unque career of Dr. Barry I had hoped the novel was good of its kind(?)
