Dear Dr. Cushing:

Any assistance that I can give you
would be a great pleasure to me, in the matter
of the W. O. biography. but unfortunately my correspondence
was too voluminous to keep and has been regularly
destroyed from time to time so that, so far as I know,
I have none of Oster's letters. As I remember
then I projected the change of the medical news to
a weekly, which took place in January, 1882, Oster was
one of the men I secured as a local correspondent
and I think that so long as he remained in Montreal,
all letters from there were by him. The publishers
should have a bound volume of the volumes with the authorship
of each unsigned article marked in it by me, and I have
so told Mr. McCrae but I do not know whether
they have been secured or he has been able to
unearth them.

I have endeavored, but in vain, to recall any -

circumstances of his life while here that even
worth recording, which you might not have, but
in vain. He always loved his practical jokes
and got off on me the Edgerton J. Davis letter
which appeared not long after he got here.
(Ind. News, Dec. 13, 1884, p. 673). It was a little
suspicious job, when it came and so published
it with a statement of whence it came, but at the
time I had no suspicion of his being in it. It was
a very clever piece of work concerning which Mr.
Duke greatly had many hearty laughs, after he
had acknowledged to me its authorship.
