There is an entry "we saw Coote's Paradise so called from a Captain Coote, who spent a  
great deal of time in shooting ducks in this marshy tract of land below the hill we  
are upon" Captain Coote (an the coots name for him?) was formerly of the 8th Regt of Foot  
a keen falconer who spent so much time shooting ducks in the marshes they were  
called after him. The road starts from Burlington Bay (head of) to Inverness

It goes to be Willis' Old Paradise or wise.

Gen. Simcoe went up to Inverness apparently in 1793 to Halland Park then Sac aux Claires where he  
remained for his furlough. "He rode 30 miles to the Michigamme Creek, then passed a terrible  
bog of liquid mud. The Indians with difficulty passed the river the gov. was in through  
it. He wrote to see a very respectable Indian named "Old Sait" who led over a branch  
of Halland's River. He advised him to turn off the western branch of it to avoid the swamp. They  
proceeded some 30 miles across Sac aux Claires . . . .
