Nellie and her boy left us last week for their new home at Thornhill but means to return and stay while Jennette is away in Montreal after Xmas, the W's are not disposed to like the house at Thornhill, nothing could be definitely settled about the Deed, so they are renting the place for a year. Mrs W. missed Bud and nothing was right, now he has gone down perhaps they may take more kindly to the place.

C and B B have gone to Toronto with the two little girls but are to be hometto-night - they have had workmen over there for the kast month, new Banisters, Hall newly papered and painted, gas laid on and sundry other improvements, which call for a new Set of Drawing-room furniture which they have gone to town to purchase.
