In 1878 we find John Billings
lecturing on the system of med.
education to be pursued in the
Johns Hopkins University.
His statements were the
following

"The history of medicine shows
that many skilful men were
incapable of appreciating evidence.
This knowledge will depend
largely on a knowledge of the
right-use of words. Hence too
the value of the study of languages.
Logic and all other studies are
 requisite for the man who will
teach as well as practice."
