SUMMER SESSION.

1883.

The Eighth Summer Session of the Faculty of Medicine will begin on the 12th of April, and continue 12 weeks.

The Classes are chiefly practical and demonstrative, and are designed to supplement and extend the teaching of the regular Winter Session.

The records of qualifications of candidates for the degree show that a large majority of the senior students take either one or two Summer Sessions, and this is regarded by the Faculty as the best indication that the extension of its work in this direction meets a real want, and is duly appreciated.

For the past four Sessions there has been an attendance of between 40 and 50 students, including usually several from other schools, who are received on the same terms and have all the advantages of regular students.

The special advantages of attendance upon a Summer Session

- (1) The benefit derived from the practical and demonstrative classes.
- (2) Dresserships and Clinical Clerkships are more easily obtained at the Hospitals, and the student has more time at his disposal to follow up the cases.
- (3) Cases of Midwifery are obtained in greater numbers at the Lying-in-Hospital.
- (4) Systematic study can be carried out more effectively than at home.

The advantages offered by the city of Montreal for the practical study of Medicine and Surgery are unequalied in the Dominion. In the wards of the General Hospital there is always-and more particularly in the summer months, when navigation is opened-a large collection of interesting medical and surgical cases. In the out-door department there is a daily attendance of between 60 and 70 patients, which affords excellent instruction in Minor Surgery, routine medical practice, and Diseases of Children. The Eye and Ear Department will afford to the student an opportunity of studying practically, under skilled direction, these important branches. At the University Dispensary there will be Demonstrations on Gynæcology, on Diseases of Children, and on Diseases of the Skin.

Dresserships and Clinical Clerkships may be obtained on application to the Attending and Out-door Physicians.

Special Clinic every Saturday at I p. m. during the Session, at the University Dispensary.

Morbid Anatomy-Consisting of twenty demonstrations in the autopsy room of the Hospital. Students will make the post-mortems in rotation, and receive instruction in the method of performing them, and keeping record of their observations.

All students desirous of attending the above courses are expected to register their names with the Registrar within one week after the beginning of the Session, and to pay a fee of \$15, when a ticket will be issued admitting to the lectures, which ticket must be presented. Enregistration and payment of the fee are compulsory upon all students, whether attending one or more of the classes."

A printed certificate of attendance will be issued at the close of the Session.

The following courses will be also conducted during the summer, and may be taken by enregistered students:

Operative Surgery-A complete course of operations on the cadaver, including amputations excisions, ligations, etc. The students perform the operations in rotation; fee \$5, to cover cost of material.

The Microscope in Medicine-A course of twenty-four lessons. Microscopes, reagents, and material provided. Fee \$10.
