\* The meeting to which he refers was the 16<sup>th</sup> Session of the Association of American Physicians  
held in Washington May 12-14, under the presidency of his old medical colleague 'Silent' James  
Stewart, order for William Osler urging the attendance stating that the  
project was first for an occasional meeting. The most important one of the  
afternoon sessions was given over entirely to a symposium on disorders of  
the Spleen and order read one of the more important papers which led to  
a brief discussion. <sup>of the Association</sup> that a dinner <sup>which he was invited to attend</sup> followed <sup>to the great expense of some of the participants</sup>.

was read by title and was most interesting like the following year (Am. Journ. of  
Med. Sci. Jan 1904 p. 1-5's).
