Dear Thayer:

We had a splendid crossing - fine weather and smooth seas all the way. We got here on Sunday, - on Saturday evening - and have had glorious weather. We found the Max-Müller house very comfortable, and Mrs. Bradford had secured for us an excellent man. The M - Ms have left their servants. Everything is new and strange of course, and it will take months to shade down and feel at home. Evidently the Bodleian will have to be my chief work-shop. The clinical facilities are good as far as they go, but there has not been any attempt made to foster practical work. A good deal is going on of interest in the physiological laboratory. I went to London on Monday to the College Club dinner, an old and unique organization among the fellows of the College going back two hundred years. Very select (only 22 members) and most interesting. The birds are wonderful - such choruses at 4 A. M. - but the doves are a nuisance, when they perch in the sill at 3:30 and bill and coo until 5:30.
