Dear Dr. Rowntree: -

The place for you to go to is the Hopkins. If you could arrange to work for six years and wish to really get at the roots of things, attach yourself to Dr. Barker's clinic and gradually work into line. The clinical advantages here are slight and you could not begin to do the sort of work with me that you could with Dr. Barker at the Johns Hopkins. Of course, it means a great sacrifice for you, but you have youth, and probably brains, and if, attached to these, you have the necessary perseverance with enough cash to keep you floating, six years of hard clinical work should put you in a first class position in the profession.
