Dreyer has his limitations, I know, and is more of a modern bactericlogist than a pathologist. He has been over and I was very pleased to find him such a pleasant and congenial fellow. He talks English remarkably well. From all accounts he is a very stimulating teacher and I hope he will be able to get work out of the senior students and induce special men to come here fore research. Altogether, the appointment has been received much better than I could have anticipated. All of Bartholomew's men, Garrod, Church and others, are very much disappointed that Andrewes did not get it. He had also very strong local support.

I hear from Welch privately that the Rockefellers will not do anything for McGill at present towards the buildings, but that after everything was settled he thought they would be prepared to make some endowment for research.
