Dear Libman:

I do not come out until the autumn of next year, the Lectures are in October. They have arranged a pretty full programme for me at Yale, and I am afraid I shall be talked out. I have had three remarkable cases of chronic infectious endocarditis recently. A man at present in the Infirmary came in May with extensive purpura, big spleen and marked anaemia, no heart symptoms or signs. We of course thought it was some type of splenic anaemia. He returned a few months later with the same type of irregular fever, spleen smaller, less anaemia and well marked aortic insufficiency. He has now an embolic aneurism of his femoral. One of the other cases had only fever between September and June, no physical signs.
