

To A.C. Klebs

Oxford, June 25th, 1910 ^{CUS 17/109.93}

....I was very glad to hear of you through old Brown, of whom we saw a great deal in Paris, and then we brought him back here for a few days with us. Both he and Jacobs give a very satisfactory account of your life, and I am sure all your friends are deeply grateful to Mrs. Klebs for having taken charge of you, and at last made of you a really respectable member of society.

We are sailing for Quebec on the 29th of July; the boy has to return for his school about the middle of September, but I shall stay over there until the early part of October.... I am very much surprised to hear that the Servetus monument at Vienne has not yet been erected; they were to have had the inauguration this year. I send you my address on him which will stimulate your theological interest. The Annemasse monument is very good. By-the-way I spelt the name wrong in my pamphlet.

May 29 - June 4

The girls were to be presented at Court - King Edward - took girls to Paris as usual. The next year found all their expenses to come back & be presented
