Dear Mr. Phipps,

We must have passed each other on the Atlantic.

When your letter came I was on the point of writing to Mrs. Guest to find out if you were still in England.

Your idea of reprinting the life of Pasteur commends itself to me very warmly, and I should be only too glad to write an introduction. The consent of Longmans and Co., who own the copy-right of the translation, and published the book would have to be obtained; I have written to them and will let you know their answer.

I spent a morning at the tuberculosis dispensary at the Johns Hopkins, and was delighted to see the work progressing so rapidly; it has really become a very important centre. I was glad to find several post-graduates there from other towns. We are making a renewed effort to stir up public opinion here, and have started an influential Appeal Committee to enable us to put three more exhibitions on the road.
