Society. Sir Richard at lonce took the matter up, and, after conference with the leading members of the profession, it was discussed and approved in principle, by a large representative meeting at the Royal College of Physicians under the chairmanship of Sir William I Church, President of the College. A Committee was appointed to Society petitioned the Crown to grant a Supplemental Charter, which would empower it to admit to its Fellowship the members of the younger medical societies that had been established for the carrying on of special studies. The petition was granted, the new Charter conferring upon the Society largely increased powers, both as to the holding of property and in other ways; in particular empowering it to create Sections for the special studies. In making this change, the Supplemental Charter once more changed . the name of the Society, and it became THE ROYAL SCCIETY OF MEDICINE. The success of the Society under its new Charter (with Sir William Church as President, and Dr. Arthur Latham and Mr. Herbert S. Pendlebury as Honorary Secretaries) rapidly exceeded the most optimistic expectations so much so that its large house in Hanover Square (only acquired in 1889) was found to be too small for the growth of the Society's work and for its bibrary; and the council felt compelled to acquire a site in Wimpole Street, and thereon to erect a new and larger building. Under the guidance of the present President, Sir Henry Morris, most careful and elaborate plans were prepared to provide for the many and various needs of the Society, and the new building (with a hansome classical elevation, designed by Mr. John Belcher, R.A., and MR. J. J. Joass) is rapidly approaching completion. 15 Coverderi Dag. Dec. 1911
