Dear Jacobs:-

In spite of the rain we are having a very happy time here. Revere has caught some fine trout - a 3lb. sea trout today. I wish Mrs. Jacobs could have it for breakfast - they are delicious. He has been out every day 9 to 6:30 often soaked. Three fine days at last. This is a great country, - <sup>moors(?)</sup> moose, grouse-sheep - & fish, nothing else. It is a splendid life for these men - out all day & good exercise, often indeed, hard work. I wish more would come over and settle down to this sort of summer. Such a nice group of men in the lodge attached to this hotel. - fish and shoot all day; one of them, an old admiral of 78. This morning I saw about 200 sheep dipped - precaution against mange, played a round of golf & spent the afternoon with Grace on the rocks & moors. Had tea in a crofter's cottage - fresh scones, raspberry jam & better tea than Rumpelmayers. We joined R. & his <sup>gillie</sup> girlie at 6. . . Grace has been out since 9 on the kyle (inlet) and with me. Do you come to London before sailing? I am going to the B. A.A.S. at Dundae; Schäfer is President. <sup>which meets from the 1st to the 7th of the month & the 1st of the month - Schäfer - the</sup> Carnegie has asked us to stay at Skibo on our way down & the Howards want us to go to Colonsay, but Revere says he must have a couple of weeks at home.

I am trying to come to terms about the <sup>Royal</sup> Royal Library - but unfortunately <sup>Block</sup> Block (of Berlin) has given the family an exaggerated idea of its value. I have been promised \$2500 for it.
