Above the colophon is the signature *Georgii Antonii Vespucci liber*.
Giorgio Antonio Vespucci was the paternal uncle of Amerigo Vespucci,
he was a dominican friar and savant who gave public lessons in
grammar and literature to the youth of Florence. Amerigo was
placed with him at an early age and received practically the whole of
his education under the direction of his uncle.
