Dear Stokes,

You could do at Yale what is done at Jena, Heidelberg and other German universities - have a medical school as good as there is! There is no difficulty on the laboratory side. Put your anatomy, physiology, pathology and pharmacology on a level with your physics and biology. There is a difficulty in America and in England with medicine, surgery, midwifery, etc. as only in a few places, as at the J.H.U., does the medical school control the clinical material; but it would be an immense stimulus to medical education throughout the country if Yale could organize, to begin with, a department of medicine and surgery on the modern scale. Of course, to do that you must have control of a hospital, and this is by no means an easy matter to arrange: still, it is not impossible.
