Dear J. William,

I am sending you the second edition of the paper "Why we are at War", just issued from the press.

I should think there would be no difficulty in your getting work in connection with the Red Cross. The wounded are beginning to come in. We have about 400 ~~here~~ in the Examination Schools, - only a few serious. Curiously enough the worst were in a batch of 67 Germans. The country is in fine form ~~here~~, recruits pouring in, everybody working, and extraordinary little fuss. We have got seven or eight Belgian professors here and their families, and some of them, poor devils, absolutely penniless. If you can squeeze a few hundred dollars out of any of your friends for them we shall be very much obliged. We are trying to get them settled in lodgings and small houses. Many of them are charming people - & some absolutely destitute.
