(AC. Kfels) Glad to hear from you, and to know your family is off to America. I should think you could be very helpful close to the firing line, as there must be a deuce of a lot to do. ... We are swarming here with wounded. The big Examination Schools and Town Hall are full - largely Belgians. We have 16 Belgian professors here, all of whom we have got comfortably settled, either in lodgings or in their own houses. Lady Osler wrote at once to friends in America, and we raised a very good sum, and in addition the Rockefeller Foundation has offered to subsidize the science people, so that I think they will be fairly comfortable. But it is a shocking business, as most of them are absolutely destitute, and nearly all of them have fine eugenic families I am knocking about visiting the camps and the hospitals. I have just come back from the American hospital at Paris Singer's place in Devonshire, where there are 200 wounded. The American Red Cross unit is there It is a devil of a business. I am afraid it will make an unbridgeable gulf between Germany and this country for many generations. Hope your mother is better.
