Many thanks for your book, which makes very good reading. You have marshalled the facts clearly and put them in a very telling way. Young Max-Müller of the Foreign Office took it with him on Sunday evening to show to the Publicity Committee. I hope you will send copies to some of the leading men over here. I am sure it would be much appreciated. You do not say whether you have sent to the "Spectator" and to the papers here. If you have not, I wish you would send them on to me, so that I could send them to the Editors, with a private letter.

It is splendid the amount you have been able to send, and it is good to hear that you are helping so much in other ways.

At present, the base hospitals in France seem to have a full supply of doctors, but it will be a different matter later when the million of men who are in training here now cross the Channel. They have not yet accepted the hospital unit offered two months ago by McGill University, at which the men are feeling a little badly.
