Dear Fearnside:

I am interested in what you say about the lumbar puncture. If you do not mind I will send it on to Ellis, as they seem to have had very remarkable results at the Rockefeller. Young Draper of New York who was here last summer was very enthusiastic.

There are no fresh cases of meningitis at Salisbury Camp but they have a few at Haslar. There have been 10 at Salisbury itself, seven fatal cases, and there are a few at Shorncliffe.

Many thanks for the Frost-bite paper. We have had a great many cases here and I saw a whole group at Paignton the other day. In many of them there never has been any actual frost but the vasomotor disturbances and the stasis leading to necrosis, sometimes severe and widespread. There is a class of case which I never remember to have seen in Canada, hyperaesthesia of the feet left after protracted swelling, such as you describe. The men are getting their nerves upset, too, with excessive use of bad tobacco.
