So glad to have your letter which I have sent on at once to Archie Malloch as they have had a series of remarkable pneumonia cases this winter, many corresponding closely to what you have described, some of the lesions looking like large tubercles. I have asked him to write and send you sections. It must have been a most interesting experience. Perhaps you will be over before long. We have not seen Thayer yet but I believe he is in France. We are kept very busy - so many coming and going, and we are trying to keep track of the many friends we have, Canadians and Americans, who are in France or England. Some one turns up every day. There are a dozen nice American boys here in the Orthopedic dept. - Erving, one of the first J. H. H. graduates has just gone back.

Give your father my love. What good work he is doing. It is nice to think of you back at the old stand. How pleased Welch must be.

Thanks for your kind words about the dear laddie. It is a terrible loss, as he and I were remarkably close to each other, even for father and son.
