Dear Sir William,

Your letter must have arrived a day or two after I left for my summer leave last Monday week, when I ran over to Ireland with Isabel. I am greatly relieved to receive it, because when at Cambridge on the preceding Saturday Shipley gave me very disquieting news about you, saying he had heard that you were thoroughly broken down.

I have just made enquiries about No. 3 General and find that Lt.-Colonel Bazin is still Acting O.C., and as he, as surgeon, and Rhea have been working together over these bones, you will find him thoroughly sympathetic and willing to help you. Shall I write a supporting letter to Bazin on the subject? On the whole I think that you need only to say a word to him and he will do all that lies in his power.

Rhea has just been to see me, and he is going to write to you.

I trust that you are well, and that the report about you is, as Mark Twain wrote about the report of his death, "grossly exaggerated".
