Arrived at Oxford. Sir Wm. has a Paracelsus (Dutch) not mentioned by Sudhoff, also 1st ed. of Browning's poem. He talked about Dr. James Hamilton who lived between Dundas and Flamboro' 1818 onwards. W.O. wrote obituary notice of him quoted in Caniff's Physicians of Upper Canada. <sup>#</sup> Dr. Strong has been here writing book on trench fever, or rather seeing it through the Press. Matter quickly arranged by Sir Wm. Saw old note-books of Sir Wm's upstairs - lectures in Montreal - notes of questions asked of students at J.H. H. - drawings, including amoebae from cyst of liver, 1st case in America in which they were found. .... Read Bibliotheca Osleriana introd. in typescript. He says that if he dies before the catalogue is finished "which is not unlikely", the work could be supervised by S. Gibson "and Lady Osler and my good friends A. Mackall, W. W. Francis, and Archie Malloch could see that my wishes were carried out." The story of the building up of the library is told in W. O.'s best vein. He looks pretty thin but is quite cheery. Such a touching and restrained reference to Revere in this introduction.
