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From Dr. Malloch's Journal
Friday, Sept. 13, 1918.

W.O. and I left Brown's Hotel and walked up Bond Street to take the tube to the British Museum. Visited MSS room. We called for W.O.'s watch being mended and we caught the 1.30 train to Oxford. Such an interesting caricature of W.O. in a newspaper (?Toronto). "Time to call in the doctor". He stands on Lord Lansdowne's doorstep. Sir William Osler, P.M. is written on a bag on the ground, and he carries a large can of chloroform. A man Radin has written an article in Medical Pickwick for Aug. '18 on "The Literary Flavor in the Writings of Sir William Osler". I have found an article about Dr. Egerton Y. Davis - "The relation of medical literature to professional esteem" by Bayard Holmes, M.D., Chicago - reprint from editorials in 'Lancet-Clinic' for Aug. 7 and 21, Sep. 11, Nov. 28, 1915. W.O. much amused. Still uses the name occasionally. Lady O. told a story of his going to Atlantic City and that she was first recognized. W.O. spoke of duration of those with valvular lesions. W.O. gave me reprint of introduction to Life of Pasteur translated by Mrs. Devonshire, and edition owned by Mr. Henry Phipps (500 copies).
