He was in such fine form - only 83! If only dear Isaac could have been with us!

You will have had my birthday greetings by this time - the Class Association address. We had a very interesting meeting here, and the Presidency of it has brought me into touch with a new group of people.

I am getting Revere's books in order and my literary ones picked out. They should go out in September or October - if freight is available. Some of the more precious ones must go by hand. Some friends sent the 1859 Omar, Fitzgerald's presentation copy to Max Müller.

I hope matters will settle down now in the U.S. & that the Peace League will be accepted. The Anglo-Saxon has got to stand together - 'tis the only hope for the world. The labor people are the difficulty - even without going so far as Bolsheviky, they may wreck the whole show.
