Just a word of explanation of these letters. Letter of 1912 was in answer to an invitation given him to deliver the address in medicine at the Canadian Medical Association. The card and letter of 1919 were acknowledgement of a small engraving of Dr. James Currie of Liverpool, (a friend of Burns and the editor of his poems) who first introduced the cold bath treatment for Typhoid Fever. I called Sir William's attention to a statement made by the late Rev. John Watson (Ian MacLaren, the author of "Beside the Bonnie Brier Bush") that Dr. James Currie of Liverpool was the protolype of Dr. William MacLure. Rev. John Watson was stationed at Liverpool during the writing of "Beside the Bonnie Brier Bush". This will explain Sir William's remarks in his last letter.
