You may have seen that a play - "Dr. James Barrie" was produced at a matinee at the St. James' Theatre. She died in 1865, and the statement is that the report of the autopsy is in the War Office Records, Victoria Street - at least, so Colonel Rogers says in a preface to the book "The Modern Sphinx". Sept. 16. 1914. I received this book with letter over-page from Col. Rogers.

I had a copy in Baltimore - the one-volume-edition which I lent to Maj. Venable and never saw again. I was interested in Barry as our old Dean in Montreal, Dr G. W. Campbell, used to tell us about her when she was stationed in Canada. She lived in the house at the corner of Durocher and Sherbrooke Sts. - the one with pillars. Dr. C. said she was very popular, but a martinet and lived a secluded life. He knew her well and attended her professionally but had no suspicion that she was a woman, tho' her features were feminine.
