## Mibliotheca Celerians.

Dibliotheca Prima.

The Beginnings of Medicine and the works of the great <u>Discoverers</u> in Medicine up to the 19th century, arranged under certain early writers and national divisions, and then by centuries in alphabetical order. There is a list of the internal arrangement of this section with the general rules of cataloguing &c.

This section has been REVISAD and ISDEXED, but the indexing of the Harvey cards requires some attention as the order of the cards under Harvey has been altered. The heading 'Anaesthesia' will require looking over by some person acquainted with the history of the controversy; and the indexing of that heading has still to be done.

Dibliotheca Secunda.

This section has been revised, and the headings which will eventually appear in the index have been marked in pencil on the cards.

Up to a certain point in Literaria all the works of a man who has written on literary subjects have been included (instead of the works dealing with medical subjects being placed in Prima or Secunda). It will therefore be necessary for this section to be looked over again, and for the cards of the strictly medical books to be transferred to their respective places in Prima or Secunda.

Bibliotheca Biographica. He aradem Sphyng Dr. Jos Barrie July 16 1919

Medical Biography, arranged alphabetically under the subjects of the biographies.

This section has not been revised.

Biographies of an author are as a rule placed at the end of an author's works in the section in which he stands. Thus the section Biographica will tend to grow smaller. It could remain as a small section, or be merged in Secunda. This point has never been definitely settled.

Medical and General Bibliography.

This section has not been revised.

It will be necessary to decide if Library catalogues in this section are to be entered under their <u>authors</u> or under the mames Libraries or Institutions to which they refer -- and in the latter case, whether the library is to be arranged under its own title (e.g. Surgeon-General's Library) or topographically (e.g. Washington-Surgeon-General's Library).

It is presumed that the bibliographical books will accompany the medical books, whether they bear on medical bibliography or not.

Bibliotheca Historica.

The history of medicine and medical institutions. Mainly modern literature, which should not take so long to revise, when the question of its arrangement has been decided upon.

It has to be decided whether the arrangement of this section is to be (1) topographical \* with sub-headings of the different institutions &c., or (2) by large general subjects-headings as 'Asylums', 'Clubs', 'Hospitals', 'Dispensaries', 'Societies' &c.

INCUNABULA ( Books printed before 1500). What Too work in the Strave.

A small proportion of the Incubabula cards have been dealt with and fully catalogued in a manner approved by Sir William The remainder need careful re-cataloguing , and headings for the index will require writing .

It will be necessary to decide if 15th century editions of authors whose works printed after 1500 are in Prima or Secunda or Literaria are to betransferred to those sections, or if all incunabula, without exception, are to be kept together.

Gir William's idea was to include in the Index to the Catalogue

- (A) All main headings,
- (B) All the headings (including certain approved subject-head-

inge) which in most catalogues would be dealt with by means of cross-references be-g. editors, illustrators & the like).

As revision has proceeded the headings which are to go in the index have been written in pencil on the catalogue cards to which they refer. When the catalogue is printed each individual work will have a separate running number. This number will be marked on the card of the particular work in pelace of the shelfmark (which will not be printed). The shelfmark of the index-slip under the main heading (i.e. the little slip now in the book) will be erased, and the running number will be substituted for it. The index-headings written in pencil on the cards will then be transferred to index-slips bearing the final catalogue-number of the book, and these slips, together with those of the main headings, will then be alphabetically arranged for printing.

QUERIES.

Are there any special arrangements for the disposal of Books on the HEART. There are separate cards for these, and they have not been included in the Catalogue for some time.

The set of Sir William's own works will require completing and cataloguing, including numerous reprints.

Oriental headings and books will require special treatment.

Are there any proposals to add to the collection? A section of Indian Medicine, and one of Chinese Medicine, was once thought of The collection of such books would, however, take some considerable time, and special knowledge would be required in the cataloguing of them.
