Who declared unto us the said Notaries, that:

WHEREAS on the *twenty first* day of *January* now
last past,

The Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada, formed by the Union of certain Railway Companies in the Province of Canada (by agreement duly ratified, of the Directors of the several and respective Companies forming the said Union) under the Provisions of the Acts of the Legislature of the said Province, 16 Vict. Chapters 39 and 76, relating to the Union or Purchase of Railways, WITH **The Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada**, a Body Politic and Corporate, incorporated by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada, passed in the sixteenth year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty seven, intituled "An Act to incorporate the *Grand Trunk Railway of Canada*," did give, through the ministry of T. DOUCET, one of the undersigned and his Colleague, Notaries, notice unto *Thomas Duro & James Duro*,

both of the Parish of Sachin, Farmers,
that the said **Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada**, did require for the construction, maintenance, accommodation and use of **The Grand Trunk Railway of Canada**, a certain piece or parcel of land whereof ~~the~~ the said ~~Thomas~~
~~and James Duro~~ *is* the proprietor in possession, to wit:

being part and portion of *their farm*
situate in *the said parish of Sachin*,
containing in superficies *sixty nine perches and fifty*
five hundredths of a perch

the said piece and parcel of land being bounded at one end by *Dame*
Marie Mc Pail widow Hugh Mc Pail
at the other end by *Dame Charlotte Desautels widow Bernard Desautels dit*
Samuel Desautels and on both sides by *the remainder of the said farm*
of the said Thomas and James Duro
as staked out on the ground and as marked under the number *seventy two*

on the plan of the said Railway and book of reference deposited according to Law.

AND whereas in and by the said notice the said "**Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada**," did declare that they were ready to pay the sum of *thirty*
one pounds two shillings and six pence
current money of Canada, as compensation for the said piece or parcel of land, premises and damages, being, to wit: the sum of *eleven pounds*
two shillings and six pence said current money of Canada, as compensation for the said land and premises, and the sum of *twenty*
four pounds
said current money, as compensation for damages.

AND whereas the said "Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada," did, by the said notice name and appoint the above named *Joseph Caspard Saviolette* as their arbitrator, if their offer above mentioned should not be accepted, the whole under and by virtue of the Statutes now in force in this Province :

AND whereas the said ~~Thomas and James Darr~~ did, within the time limited by law, refuse to accept the said offer made by the said "Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada," as aforesaid and did name and appoint the above named *Edward Guin* as his arbitrator in the premises :

AND whereas the said above named *John Dunn* was duly chosen and appointed third arbitrator in the premises by the said *Joseph Caspard Saviolette* and *Edward Guin* by vote before *J. Douce*, one of the undersigned and his colleague, Notaries, on the sixteenth day of January

NOW THESE PRESENTS and We the said Notaries Witness that the said *Joseph Caspard Saviolette* and *Edward Guin* Arbitrator and *John Dunn* third arbitrator above named, ha ~~ve~~ declared and by these presents do declare that, after having been duly sworn before a Justice of the Peace for the District in which the said piece and parcel of land lies as aforesaid, faithfully, and impartially to perform the duties of ~~his~~ office, ha ~~ve~~ proceeded to ascertain the compensation to be allowed for the said land and damages, and after having heard the parties, and witnesses brought forward by them respectively, having examined the ground and on the whole maturely deliberated, do hereby award and declare that the offer made to the said

~~Thomas and James Darr~~ for the said piece and parcel of land and damages is *insufficient* and that the said *James Douce* is entitled to recover and receive of and from the said "Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada" the sum of seventy six pounds two shillings and six pence currency, being to wit ; the sum of nineteen pounds two shillings and six pence currency for the said piece and parcel of land and the sum of fifty seven pounds, said currency, for all damages generally whatsoever

And to cause these presents to be signified wherever the same may become necessary, the parties have constituted their attorney, the bearer of a Triplicate or copy hereof, to whom all necessary power and authority is hereby given and granted.

Of which Act Done and Passed at the City of Montreal, in the office of T. DOUCET, one of the undersigned Notaries, on the day, month and year first above written, in *Triplicate*, one of which, at the instance of the said appearers, parties hereto, remains deposited and of record among the original *minutes* in the said T. Doucet's office, so that authentic Copies thereof may be delivered when required, and the other two are to be respectively served upon the said "Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada," and upon the said ~~Thomas~~ *James Daws* these presents bearing the number *six* thousand *eight* hundred and *seventy five* of the original Deeds remaining of record in the office of the said T. Doucet, and the said *arbitrators have* signed with us the said Notaries,


these presents having been first duly read in their presence, the whole in *Tripli-*cate as aforesaid.
