Ca. near 23. The books drawn out by Bathurst - dep. - ment of finances. In 1815 the expenditure exceeded revenue by 19,000. The Home Gov. appears to be indebted to the Provincial Treasury 60,000 for military advances which it might call for any day. A. L. items of deficit amounted in all 120,000. Seems that there was in the Provincial Chest monies not paid. The balance at the disposal of the Legislature was 40,000. Governor wanted the House to remedy this confusion.

The Governor asked as in the other colonies a statement of the money required be laid before the Legislature & the whole sum voted. To assist & urge the Governor to use the counsel in defeating any thing unpleasant attempted by the Assembly.

p. 221. Assembly asked for an out of civil list. Given by order of Govt. 1792, 1797, 1810 & 1818. The Governor replied that he could not communicate private instructions from the King. Disposition of Revenue - General, pt. business in lumber & oak mills etc. Assembly wanted the task brought out. Defended by Friends but in 1823. Caldwell was obliged to confess that he had not money to pay the expenses of the remainder of the year. The chamber declared he should have had 100,000 ^{in 1823 funds} ~~in 1823 funds~~. 23. On 20th Nov 1823 Gov. informed assembly he had not secured.
