My Dear Sir,

In the recent arrivals from Scotland, are several families of Emigrants, strongly recommended to me, and for whom I shall be desirous to do all I can, to settle them.

I give this note of introduction to you to a young man of the name of Wood, one of six brothers, all men and mechanics - also a brother in Law named Scott,

they have friends in Montreal  
& many letters of recommendation

I advise them to look round  
about for a month, and then  
assure them that you will  
put them in the right way to  
make enquiry -

I advise them, and they are  
anxious to sit down together  
in a sort of village - for which  
I would give them a lot of  
1200 acres to begin with,  
quite as much as is good

for them - after having made  
their settlement, they may  
have their full quantum  
to which their industry shall  
entitle them -

I advise them to look at  
the townships in view of you  
and us near to Montreal as  
they can -

I think it unwise in me  
to interfere particularly about  
any emigrants, but there are  
a set of men who, I am sure  
will do well -
