My last will and

Kenneth MacKenzie

I Kenneth MacKenzie a Native of Scotland
now residing in the North West or Indian Territory
and from a partner of the North West Company, Do
hereby make and declare this to be my last will and
Testament, revoking all others should any appear in
my name.

I first give and bequeath unto my natural daughter
Margaret MacKenzie (born at Fort William on the
1st June 1814) one half of my Estate, property and
Effects real and Personal and what Native or kind
Soever or wherever Situated — and not hereafter —
disposed of in this my last will and Testament.

I further give and bequeath unto Louisa MacKenzie
the Mother of the before mentioned Margaret
MacKenzie the sum of Twenty five pounds.
