

Liverpool June 28<sup>th</sup> 1813

Dear Henry

I have been informed by Murdoch  
McKenzie that you wished to know if I intended  
to put my Terrenceville Villa in a state of re-  
pair - This story you know is almost  
as old as acid as mouldy as the ruins which  
are the subject of it. When I thought them  
it was agreed between you & me to make  
the house habitable for a Christian and  
even for a Gentleman - When I was up  
last you said men were too scarce and  
the price of labour too high to do it about it.

I leave it all to your own Discretion  
what improvements you are to make so  
as to make it look Decent & Comfortable -

You know my sentiments on economy  
Henry means to build Country seats &  
may act accordingly -

I shall be off for the Pools this  
evening. I have written Rask for  
P. Cornier of the Ship Active which leaves  
this tomorrow for Terrenceville with a letter  
to Mr. Porteous. This man has taken

2 Keys total and as Boy smoked sal-

to Rad! —

The transports with the troops  
arrived this morning — I have seen none  
of the troops as yet — We have no news of  
any kind here — I am in great hurry  
to be away
