As the Spring is now approaching we should be glad to know whether you have any intention of hiring or purchasing the Desire - in the first Case the Price you formerly paid for her trip to Newfoundland or perhaps something less will serve as a precedent - and in the Event of purchasing .. It is conceived what has been laid out upon her may be nearly equal to her wear & Tear since she has been the Property of the NW Co. -

Dear Sir

In a letter received Saturday from Mr Shaw he asks whether you will require one of the vessels belonging to the King's Posts to bring down the Flour for Govt. the first June. I believe you can now say decidedly if you will require one of them. (say the Service) for a trip to Newfoundland. Please inform us on these points. — He also writes for 100 Bbls Flour entire very early in the Spring this supply appearing much required at the Posts below.
