

I am afraid history repeats itself, and see some unpleasant analogies between the attitude of the Serbs towards the non-Serbs of Yugoslavia and that of the Young Turks whom we remember. And even the new Turks do not seem to be handling their Kurdish problem much better than their adversaries handled the Macedonian one.

I should like to come round and see you one of these days if and when you are at all free, to have a talk with you about East European affairs.

I have read Conwell-Evans's book through. I have come across what seem to me to be several marked errors of appreciation and one or two of fact. Thus on p.30 Talaat Bey is made to refer to massacres of Armenians committed by his subordinates in 1910.

This is all wrong. The Adana massacres were committed while Talaat was a fugitive from C'ple just after the military mutiny of April 13/09 by old regime officials and fanatical mobs. Talaat was no doubt a Thug but he had no more connexion with the massacres than the man in the moon.

Your Turk(p.78) interests me. If it was Halil Halid or Dr. Nazim I cannot think that his opinion was worth much. Nazim, you will remember, ran the Turcification campaign and had much to do with the massacres of '15-16 and perished very properly on the gallows in '26.

The upper class may have its weaknesses but I composed think that proletarian diplomacy (vide Russia passim) or middle class business mens' diplomacy would do our reputation any good abroad. The influence of big business (e.g. M. 
I have discussed the question, how can British help best be given to the Albanian movement for linguistic & educational progress, with Albanian & other European friends & have come to the fell--owing conclusions.

Best build on foundations . There is a Normal school at Elbassan , which is about to be respende . The teachers are coming back , save these who have been exiled & these who have not recovered from their beatings . The Government has authorised its reopening . Such a school is a disseminating centre for ideas & - pregress. & can therefore do more than an elementary or even a secondary school founded independently. Moreover, while the Government might withhold its consent to the foundation of a school under foreign auspices or might only permit it under conditions which would nullify its effectiveness, the fact that the Elbassan school is now authorised gives hope for believing that here there is a foundation on which to build.

As to the question of Protestant schools: there
I am of the same opinion. If you know of any one
who would prefer to aid the denominational schools
that exist in Albania, he would do bester to aid
the existing schools, for the reasons given above. I am of the same opinion . If you know of any one education

- Help spread over three or four years will be more effective than one larger donation given all at once.
- 4. The country to be taked penetrated is , in my humble spinion, the strip between the sea & the lakes. Further North one either competes with the Catholies, whem it would be a mistake to alarm, or else adadada enters districts which are still simmering with rebellious activity: Isa Beletin may be a very fine fellow, but I should'nt care to found a school within 50 miles of him .

If you agree with these views please write & let me know. I think that the sooner help is given become fewerted r the better .Otherwise the movement may take a revolutionary shape . You must remember that the Albanians are poor & cannot themselves aid an educational movement as other communities in he hear East have done.



Otherwise they would have made further progress. But geographical conditions have made them poor & comparatively ignorant & as long as they remain ignorant they will be a source of trouble in the Balkan peninsula! Every educated Albanian is an asset for peace & better Government in European Turkey! Such , in rhetorical form , is my reason for asking you to aid their educational movement.

For the question 'How much' would be needed?'

I can only answer that in my spinion such a movement deserves all it can get. But ifyou could let me know how much is at all likely to be raised by persons in sympathy with the movement in England - I could obtain from the albanian School a statement of what they hopped to do with the money.
